


Alive with fears and excitement, the Seniors had a year that they'll always cherish.

























In Loving Memory of Mark Blalock



Coach Higley stated "The team was young but gained a lot of experience which will help them in the years to come." The team played well enough to win the first two matches and then a


couple more after a loss to one of the better teams in the league. This helped the team gain some confidence in themselves.











Runners Race



Science Reveals Life!








OWA: Work Study

Language Dept. Grows








J.V., Freshmen Gain Experience


The J.V. and Freshmen wrestling teams both had trying seasons and worked hard to do their best. Both teams had great potential and were made up of much individual talent.






JV's Work Hard










Seniors Move In New Directions








MHS Loses Faculty


