## The Elements Come Together

Mitochondria, decomposition, Doppler effect, homeostasis, transmutation, inertia, allele, vapor pressure, critical mass, cilia - wonderful words like these are native to the science department. When asked to define or explain words like these, most students groan. By by the end of their science career, most students have a general appreciation and understanding for these words and science in general.
Students were offered a wide range of courses that dealt with science. General Science established the foundation for all the science courses. In this course, students gained a basic knowledge of the science field. Biology 1 introduced students to the study of life. In this course, students studied such things as cells, genetics, evolution, ecology, and anatomy. A more advanced course, Biology 2, allowed students to further their understanding of the life sciences. Students engaged in a more in-depth study of areas covered in Biology 1. Students also performed more complex dissections, such as the fetal pig, cow heart, and sheep brain. If the student's interests weren't in the life sciences, courses covering the physical sciences were an
alternative. Chemistry 1 took the students deep into the study of matter and its interactions on the molecular and atomic levels. Students studied such subjects as formula writing, structure of atoms, and laboratory techniques. Students also expanded their knowledge of chemistry by taking Chemistry 2 . This college level course built on ideas learned in Chemistry 1. In Physics, the other physical science course, students studied the interrelationship between matter and energy. Areas of study included motion, force, heat, light, sound, and electricity. Students also had the option to take Earth Science or Computer Science. Earth Science taught students about rocks and minerals, erosion, earth movements, and geological history. Computer Science provided students with a general understanding of computers and the skills necessary to use them.

Although many words and concepts of science were hard for many students to grasp, the science department adequately provided a wide range of courses to help the students understand key ideas and give them a basic science background.

Among the three languages offered is Spanish, taught by Mrs. Karen Battes. It included several exciting activities. Students played Spanish versions of both Jeopardy and Bingo, sang old and new songs in Spanish, and had a chance to learn such key words as amigo and lapiz, which mean friend and pencil. They also learned about native foods by making menus of Spanish design. ## World Affairs!

President George Bush and President Mikhail Gorbachev of the Soviet Union met several times during 1990 on economic matters and also on the war in the Persian Gulf. The Cold War ended and an era of cooperation has begun. Gorbachev is struggling to unite and reform the Soviet Union. The country is in a critical economic condition, and the Communist Party and the government agree that reform is needed, but they disagree on how to achieve it. Gorbachev is seen here during a summit meeting with President Bush. It was a time of change in Eastern Europe also. Communism no longer ruled that part of the world. Demonstrators demanding an end to the communist party domination lit candles and placed flowers on bloodstained sidewalks where police attacked protestors in the largest such rally in twenty years. Thousands of students marched for five hours to commemorate student, Jan Opletal, who was killed by Nazis fifty years ago. When demonstrators tried to reach central Wenceslas Square, police attacked them with tear gas, dogs, and clubs. Food was a very scarce commodity in the Soviet Union. As shoppers grumbled, even bread - cheap and always plentiful - joined a growing list of hard-to-get items that included tobacco, paper, and gasoline. Anatoly Znamensky, a sixty-six-year old retired taxi driver, said, "Vegetables, fruit, cheese, butter, meat - they appear and disappear. But with bread there was never a problem, until now." Russia is finding it difficult to feed itself.

# War in the Gulf The Crisis Hits Home 

On August 2, 1990, Saddam Hussein, leader of Iraq, invaded and took over the country of Kuwait. The United States quickly sent over troops to aid Kuwait. Over a period of five months, the U.S. and other allied countries tried to negotiate with Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait. The U.S. held sanctions over that time, hoping to weaken Iraq and cause them to leave. Unfortunately, sanctions and peace talks were not getting Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait. Eventually, President Bush gained support from many other countries and was given the go ahead to use force to remove Iraq from Kuwait. President Bush gave Iraq til January 15,1991 , to totally withdraw from Kuwait. Since Saddam did not leave by then and showed no intentions of leaving, a day after

the deadline President Bush ordered an air attack, which turned Operation Desert Shield into Operation Desert Storm. The people of Madison have shown their support with ribbons tied around trees, flags hanging in doorways and moments of silence at athletic events. A tape of a pep assembly was sent over to Saudi Arabia to be viewed by the soldiers that live here. The conflict of the Middle East has brought Americans closer together and shown us what we really can do.

Jim Henson was a puppeteer with an enormous following. On May 16, 1990, at the age of 53, he died from a severe case of pneumonia. During his career, he created an endearing menagerie of creatures, characters of timeless appeal. In 1969, Henson's creations - Kermit, Big Bird, and Cookie Monster - first appeared on public TV's Sesame Street. Then in 1976, The Muppet Show was born. His creations will live forever - Miss Piggy, Fozzie Bear, Gonzo, Bert and Ernie, and many, many others.
Filmmaker Spike Lee (shown here in this picture with his sister Joie) says he is looking for the day when he no longer has to sell himself to the movie industry like some new kid on the block. "Each time out is another struggle, another battle, another war," he says. But he seems to be winning the war. His second movie, "She's Gotta Have It," won him the Cannes Film Festival prize for best new director. His third, "School Daze," was a huge mon-ey-maker, and "Do the Right Thing," was received with rave reviews. The 33 -year-old Lee is on a roll. Watch out Cecil B. de Mille.

Nelson Mandela was given a life sentence in 1962 for plotting to overthrow the South African government. He became one of the world's most influential prisoners, but in February, 1990, at the age of 71, Nelson Mandela was released after lengthy negotiations with President F. W. de Klerk.

David Souter became the latest member of the Supreme Court in October. He is known in his adopted home state of New Hampshire as a brilliant legal scholar, a diligent judge, and a private man who never married. The 51 -year-old Supreme Court justice was described by one Congressman as "a classic conservative with great reverence for the Constitution and the law." Souter is seen here with President Bush after his nomination was announced.
