## Students Shape Their Future

Though they were few in number, the students who participated in the business classes will be a step ahead of everyone else in getting a job. The Business Department lies in a section of the school where many students ventured only to stop at their lockers.

On any morning a passer-by could have found the ladies of the junior Intensive Office Education program working to type up the morning announcements. I.O.E. is a vocational program where students focus on the skills needed to land a job in the business world. During the two year course, the students completed a variety of tasks for the school. They typed the Northeastern Conference wrestling tournament programs, Honor Society programs, and other such jobs. They often donated their time to work on these chores during free periods.

Across the hall is the Occupational Work Adjustment class. Designed for students with problems, the O.W.A. course aided them in finding part-time jobs, prepared them for future job interviews, and showed them how to fill out applications. The students went to class for five periods then went to their respective jobs. They received a grade based on their working habits. In sixteen years, over sixty percent of the students enrolled in the program have graduated or received a G.E.D.

Other courses offered through the Business Department were Business Law, Accounting, Personal Typing, Typing I, and General Business. The enrollment of the personal typing class has increased due to the fact that it is now a pass/fail course. Possibly, this is one step closer to making the future generation more keyboard literate.

## Learning Gets Personal

Did you ever try to find room number two hundred and get lost? That room and other learning centers, although somewhat hidden, are just as much a part of our school as any other room. Students in these rooms have the same curriculum as the rest of the school. For example, in English they read and study authors such as William Shakespeare, John Steinbeck, and Jack London. Also, they learn algebra and geometry. With only six to ten students per class, these students have the opportunity to go at a pace that is fit for them and to get personalized help when it is needed.

Although teachers of these classes enjoy their job, it is not an easy task. They have to be able to teach one subject as well as another. Mrs. Morgan, who is afraid of crowds, finds her small classes to be of comfort. Miss Rihaly stated that she likes to get to know the students as individuals. As a tutor to all Madison schools, Mrs. McCue enjoys working with students who have a different outlook on life. Students and teachers in this program have the chance to make some very personal memories.

What has come out lately is a new album, "Blood Sugar Sex Magik," which hit the top of the charts as soon as it was released. The album is the second with the current band members, who formed six months after the 1988 death of founding guitarist Hillel Slovak and the subsequent departure of drummer Jack Irons. The album features a quieter, more thoughtful side of the Chili Peppers, but there is still plenty of sonic funk.
