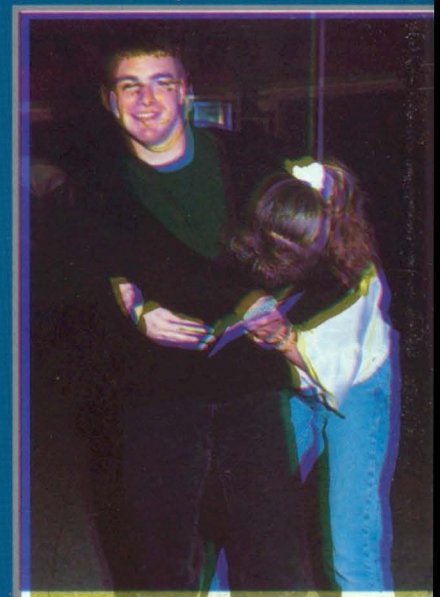

Juniors Jump Ahead

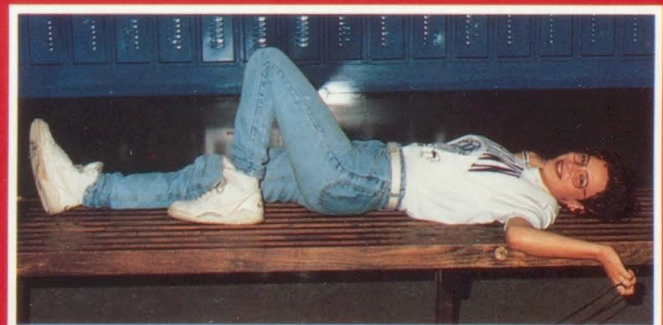
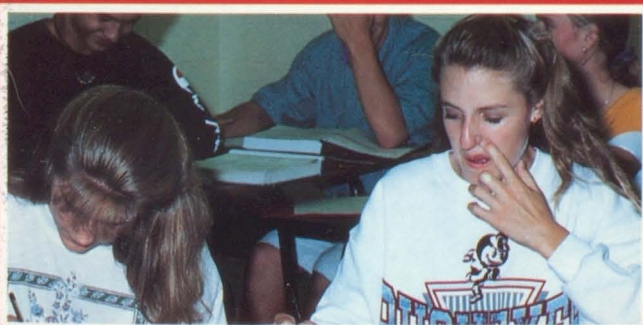
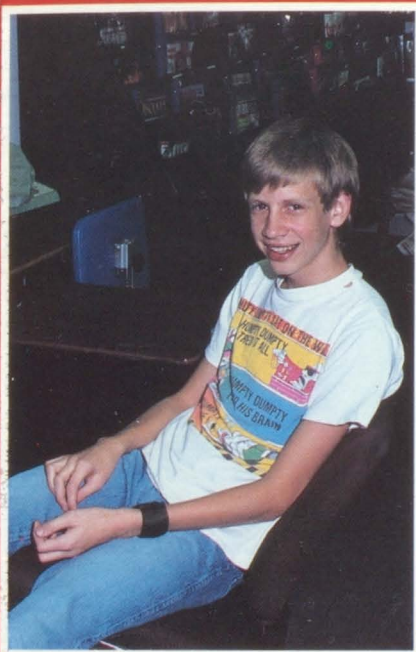

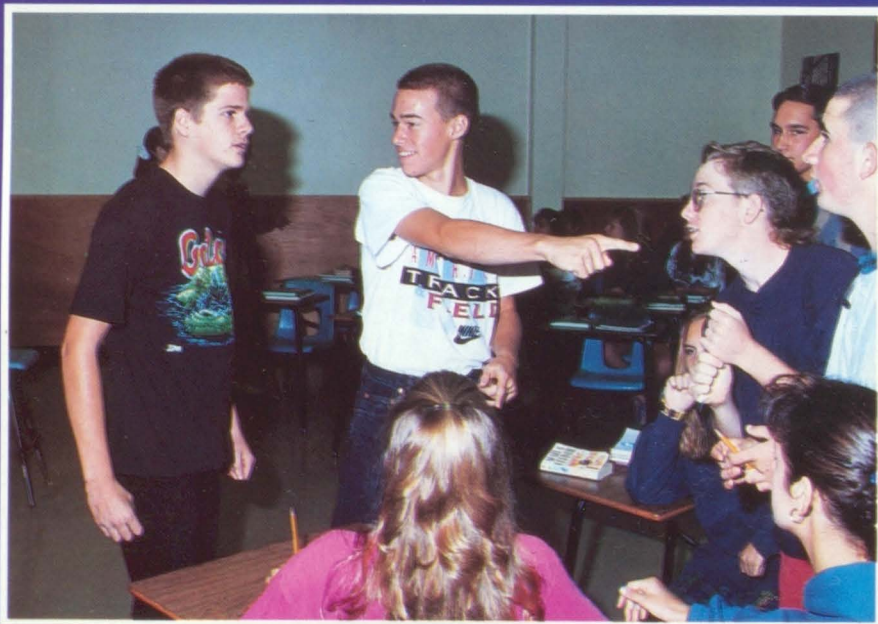
Sophomores Get Ready for the Future

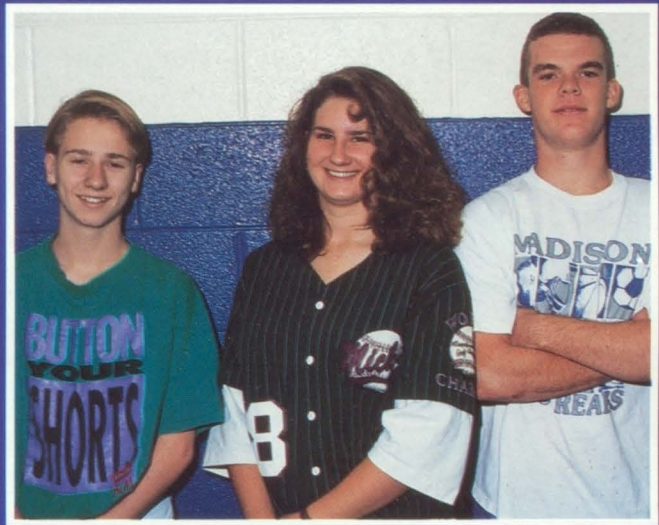
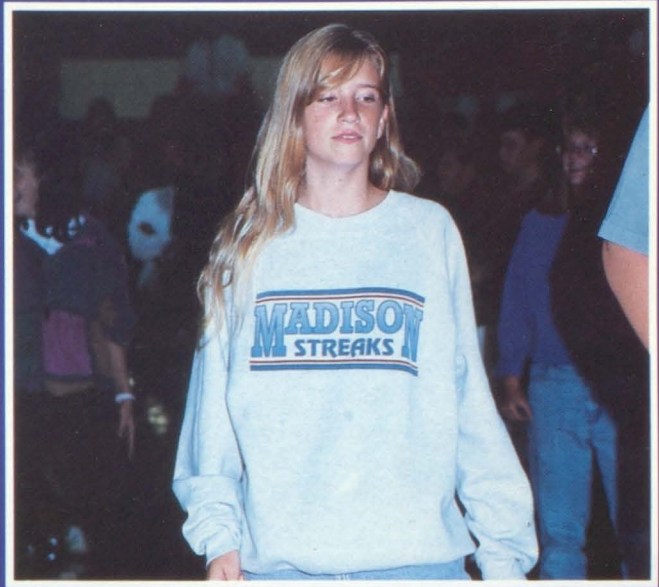
The sophomores had loads of spirit. Last year, they came in second place in spirit week, which is great for beginners, and this year they planned to show even more

enthusiasm. Beth Swank commented, "I think growing from our freshman to sophomore year has given our class much more spirit!"

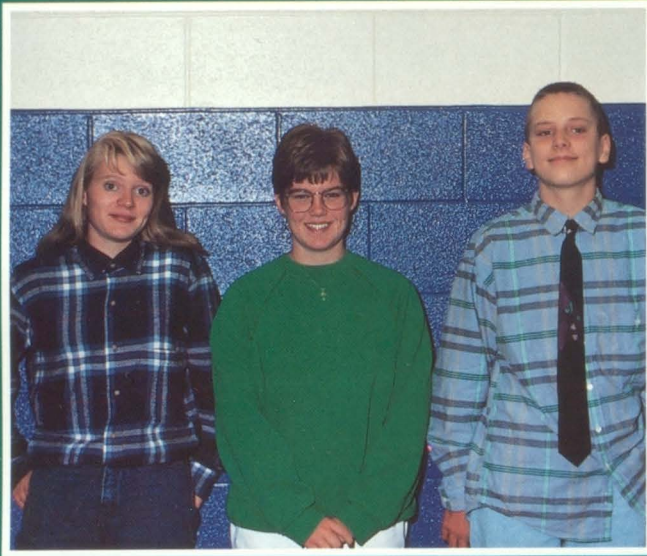

Large Freshman Class Contributes

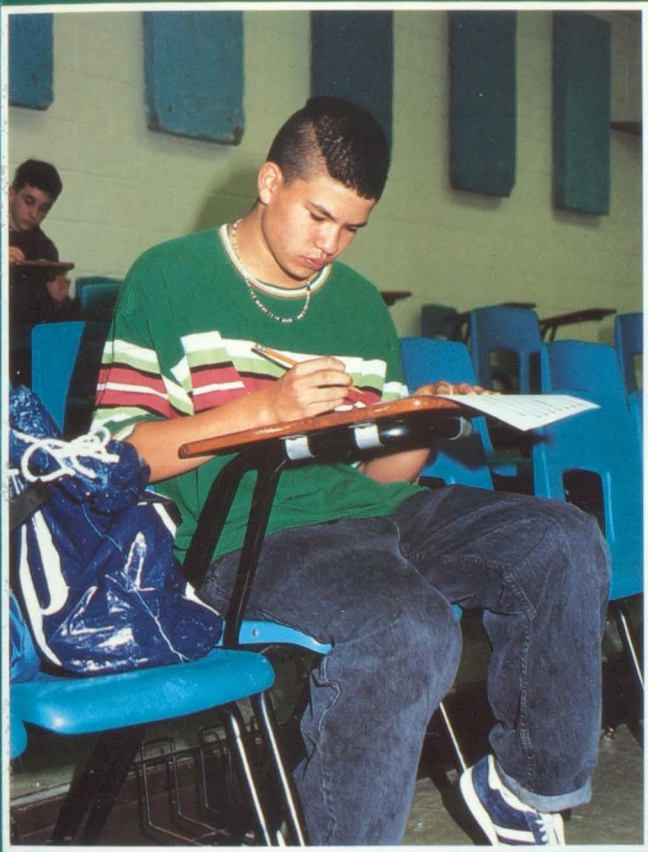

Anticipating the Future

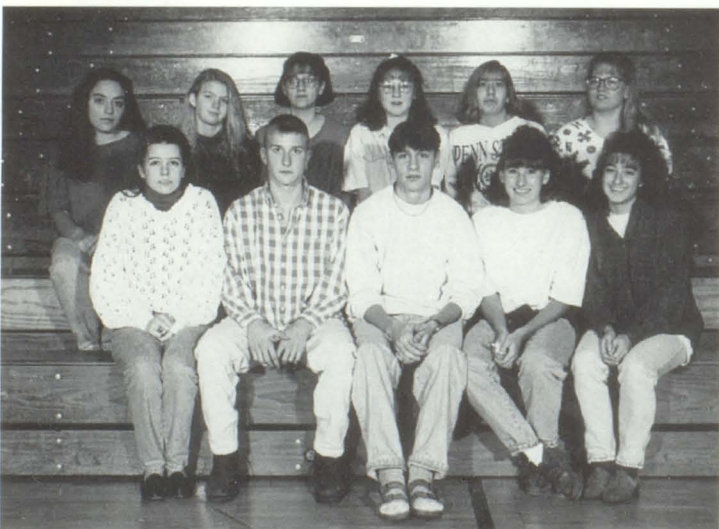

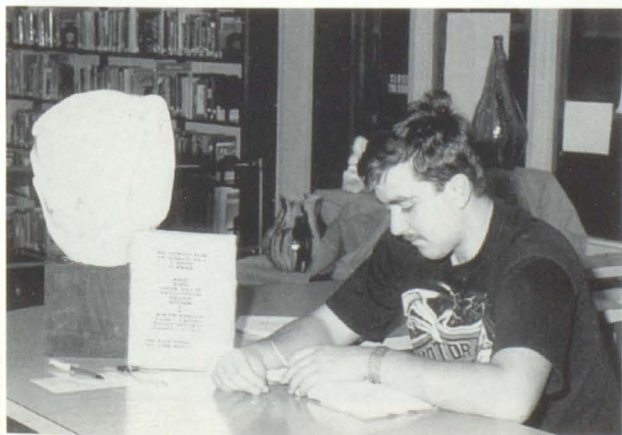
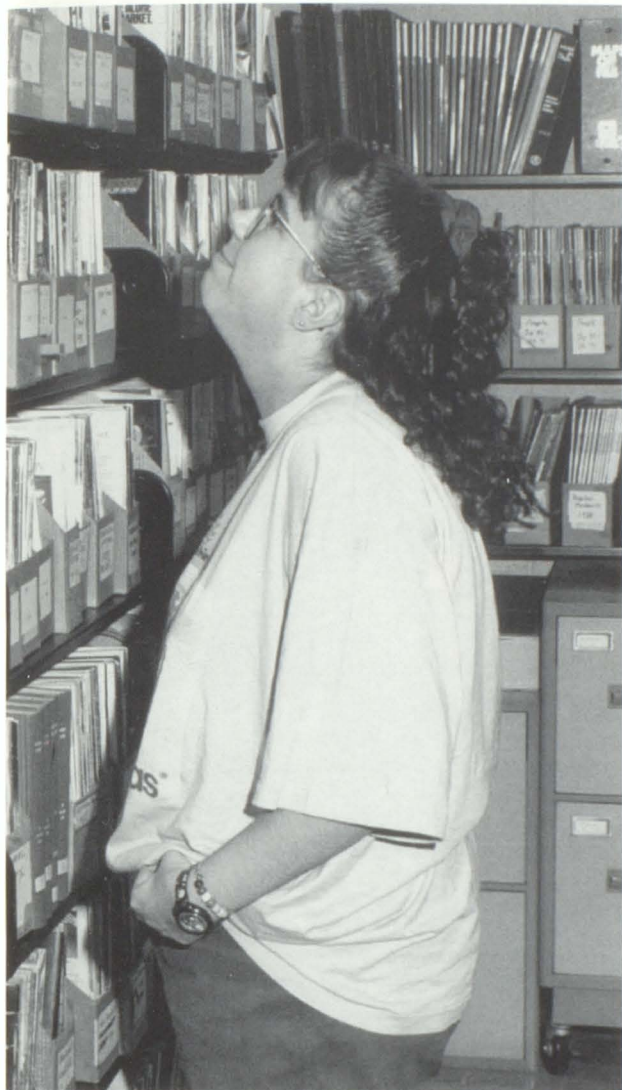
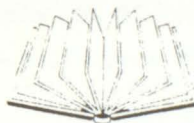
Library Heads Ground Breaking

Groundwork in Language Arts

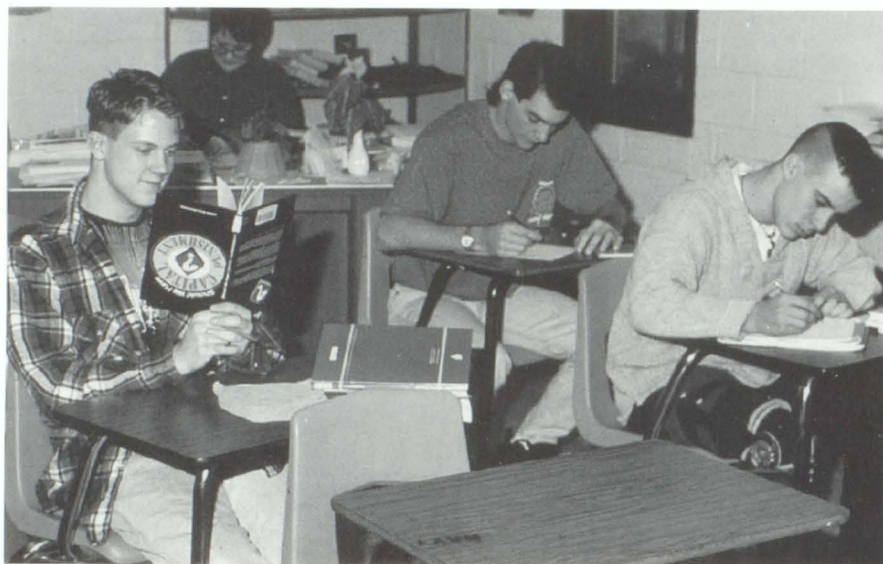

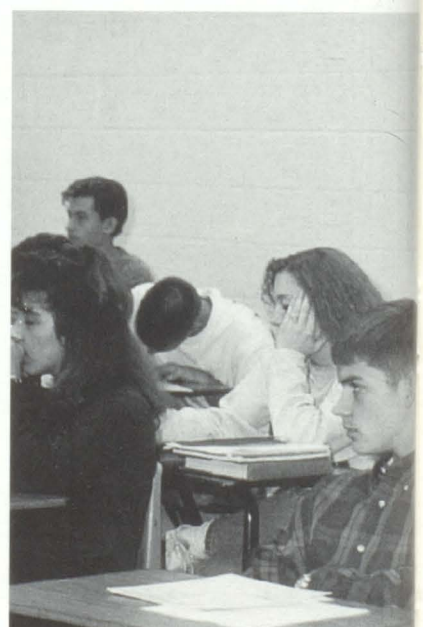
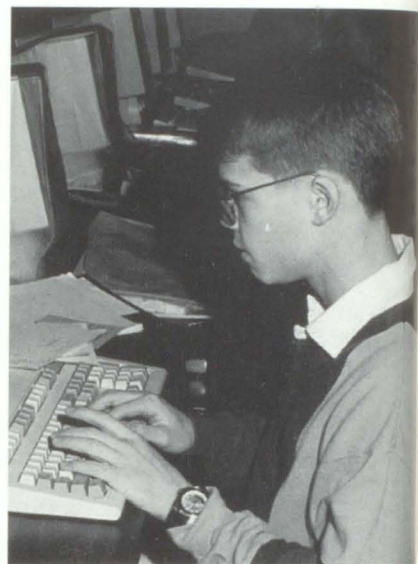

Future Translators of the World

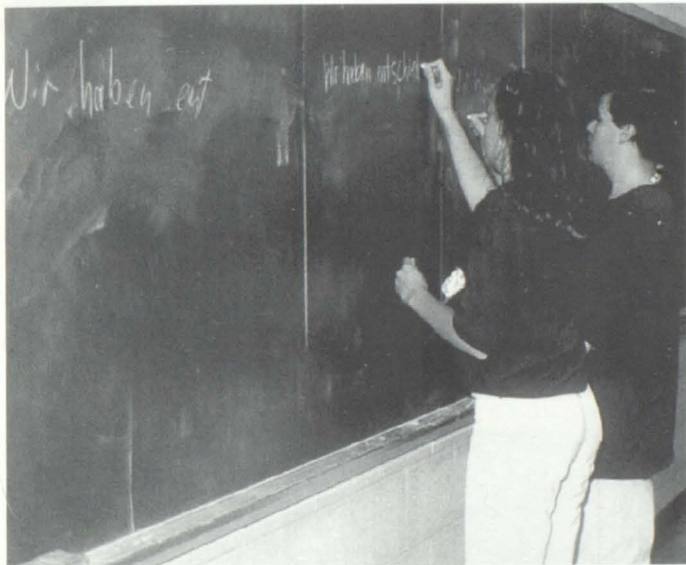

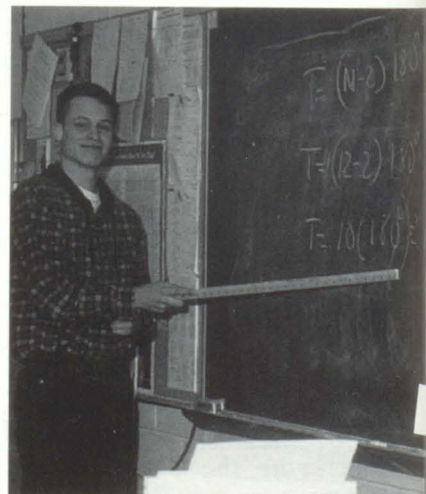

Scientists of Tomorrow . . .

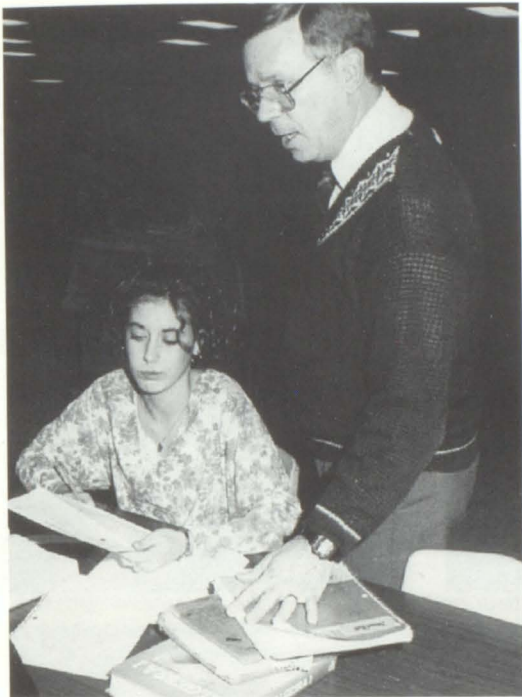
The Science Department of Madison High School offered many opportunities. Students could learn new and interesting things as well as have fun. General Science, Chemistry, Earth Science, Anatomy, Biology, Ecology, and Physics were the classes most students took to prepare themselves for the future. Projects such as dissecting, "counting dots," and mixing chemicals were a basic part of the day in science classes.

Science covers many topics; the courses within the department vary greatly. Special projects that were going on in Earth Science, taught by Mr. Piker and Mr. Daly, introduce students to topographic maps, the study of geology, understanding of weather elements, and a survey of astronomy and oceanography. Chemistry classes, taught by Mr. Mallick, did an experiment that introduces oxygen being prepared and then observing some of

its chemical and physical properties. Students used that experiment to begin a study of composition-decomposition reactions and endothermic-exothermic reactions. Physics, taught by Mr. Daly, had a program that included almost thirty per cent more material than what was in the textbook. Computer software is also becoming available to help students learn physics on their own. Several sections of Biology, including Biology AP, General Science, and Computer Science, taught by Mr. Hanes, Mr. Deel, Mr. Spohler, and Mr. Pelich respectively, rounded out the department.

Students appreciated all the scientific facts and information they learned as they prepared for the future in a rapidly advancing technological world.

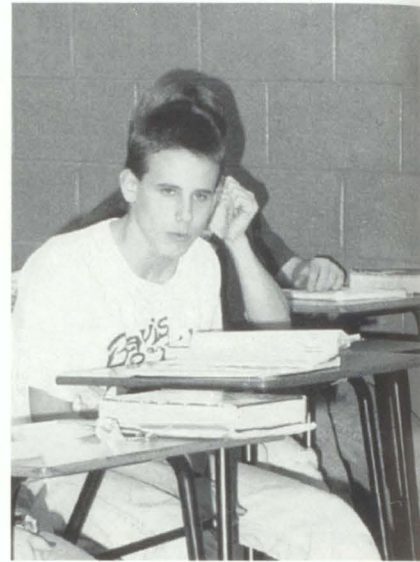
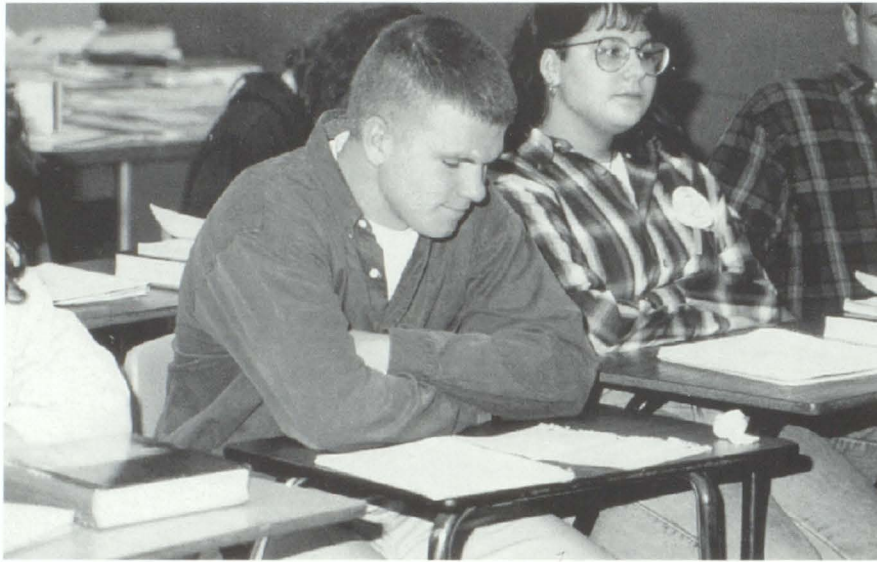
Changes Make History

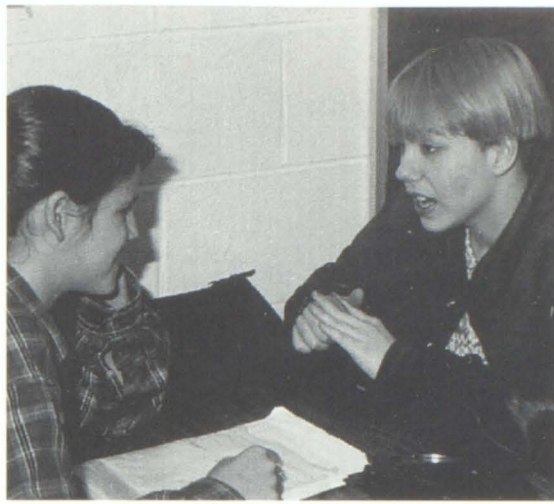

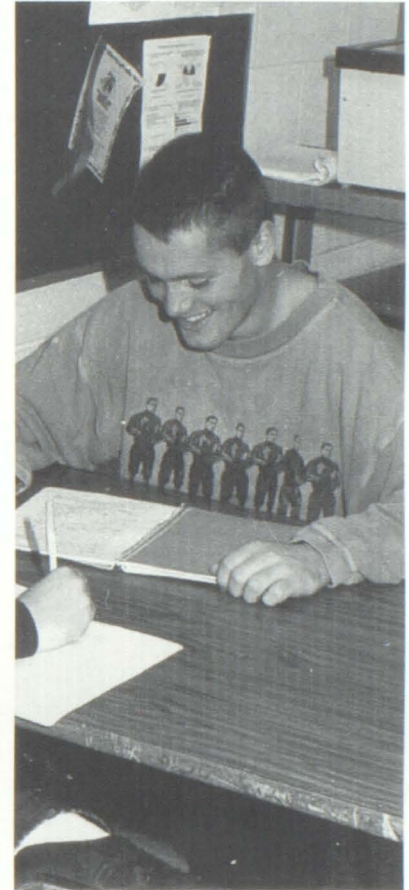

Special Opportunities Build Careers

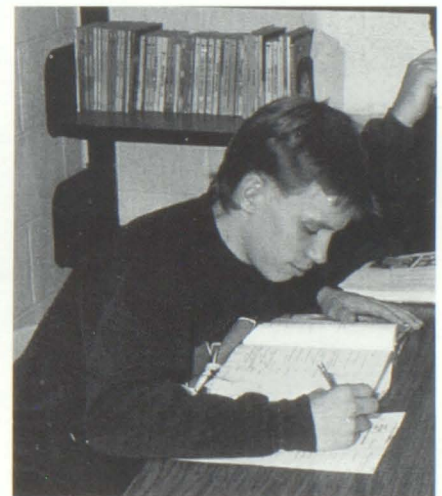
After the seventeenth year of OWA in Madison, many of the students in high school right now have no idea what OWA is. It stands for Occupational Work Adjustment. OWA is a statewide, one year program for students having problems in normal academic surroundings.

OWA provides a job for teenagers of fourteen to fifteen years of age. First and third period of every school day, Mr. Sears and his class of sixteen students talk about OWA related subjects such as attitude, grades, insurance, taxes, budgeting, discipline, costs of marriage, and raising children.

OWA has nothing to do with low intelligence. In fact, all of these students have the potential to do average or above average work. OWA is a great program that introduces teenagers to work, helps them to do better in school, and helps them become more successful in their later careers.

J.O.G.S. stands for Jobs for Ohio's Graduates. During '93-'94, thirty-two students took this new course, which prepares students for jobs either immediately after high school or following post secondary education or military service. Students met two times a week during their scheduled study halls. They elected officers and held meetings using parliamentary procedures.

The curriculum covered career development, job attainment, job survival, leadership skills, and self development. Career association, an extension of the program, includes sponsoring community and charitable events. "J.O.G.S. is an educational and informative course that will help students prepare for their futures," stated Vicki Kavaras. The Class of '94 had the opportunity to make this program a valuable part of the senior curriculum.

Building More Than the Future

The three Industrial Arts classes improved greatly during the 1993-94 school year. Drafting, metals, and woods all got brand new machinery valued at \$83,000. Drafting class, taught by Mr. Jack Becka, Mr. Fred Morrison, and Mr. Bob Peterson, got two new computers, a copying machine, an AUTO-CAD Release 12 program, an architectural AUTO-CAD, and a CNC milling machine which is used to create metal pieces. The metals class, taught by Mr. Morrison, received four new lathes, a plasma cutter, a gas welding machine, a milling machine, a Heliarc

machine, and a gas welding machine. The woods class, taught by Mr. Bob Peterson, received \$25,000 worth of new machinery.

These changes allowed more projects to get done and more students to get involved. Enrollment in metals class increased this year, and a lot more beginners took Woods. The drafting class has stayed almost the same. With the new machinery, industrial arts projects are easier and more fun to do. Whether it is drawing a floor plan, building a spice rack, or even cutting metal scraps, the job is easier for the students thanks to the new equipment.

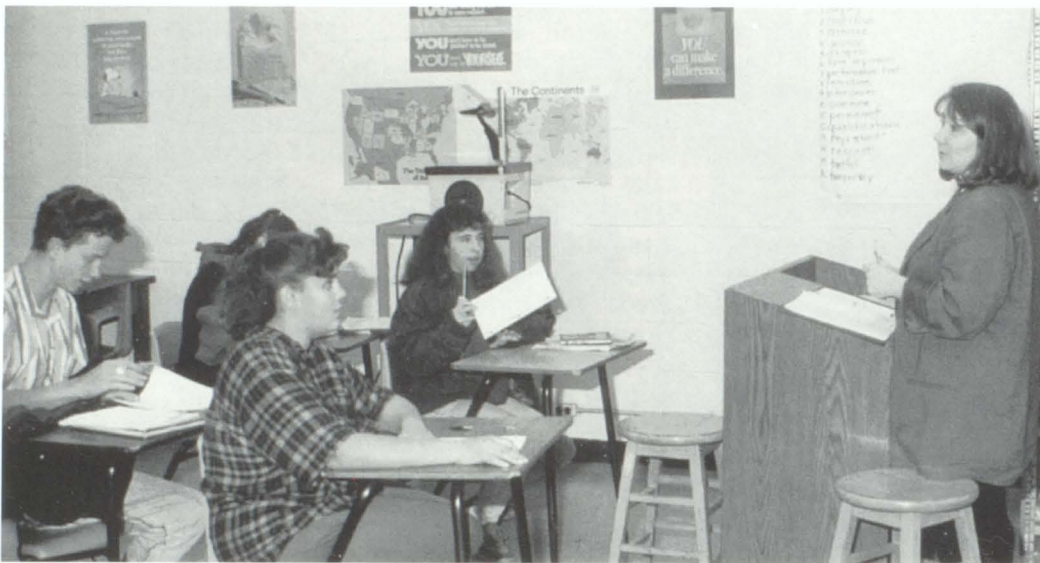

Breaking Business Barriers



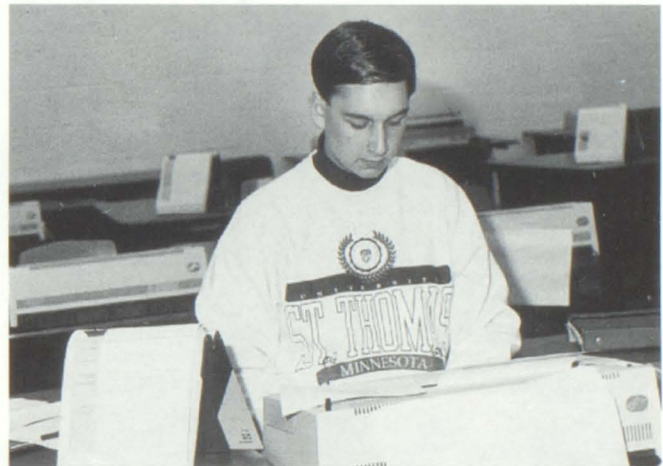
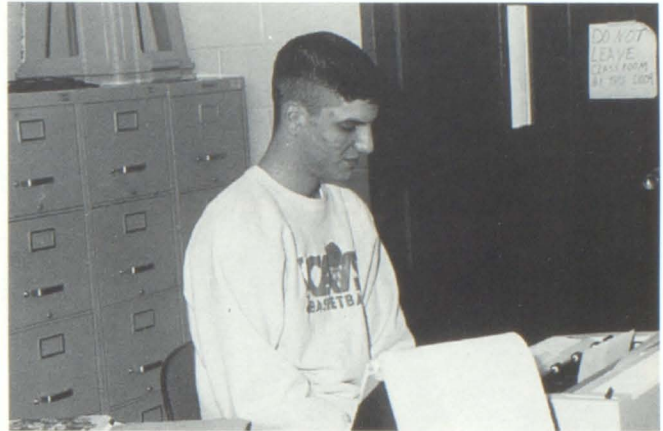

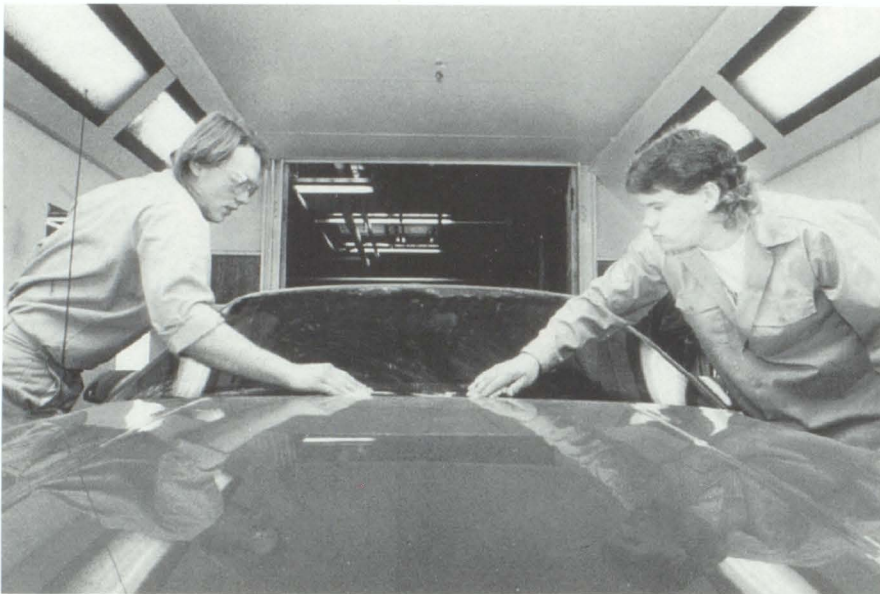

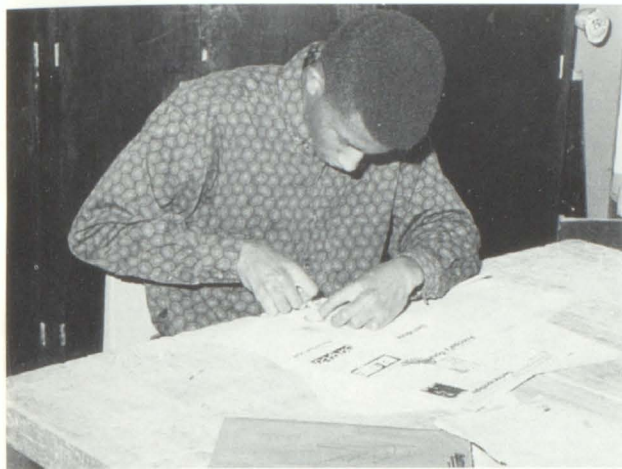
The Streak's photographers were Kelly Gould and Aaron Birk. Both worked extremely hard at being in all the right places to get the pictures. They also developed their own photographs.

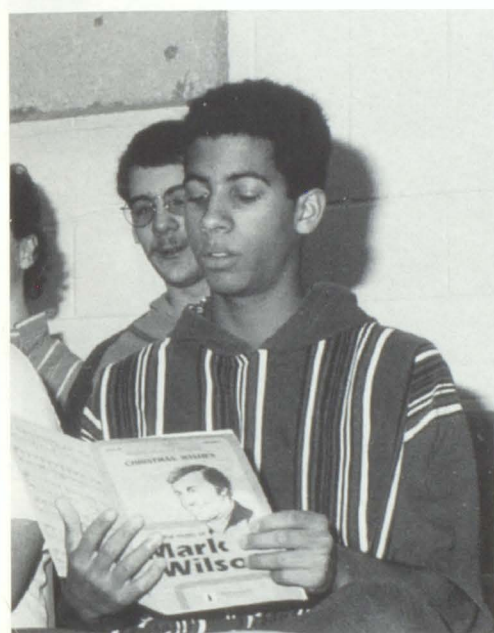

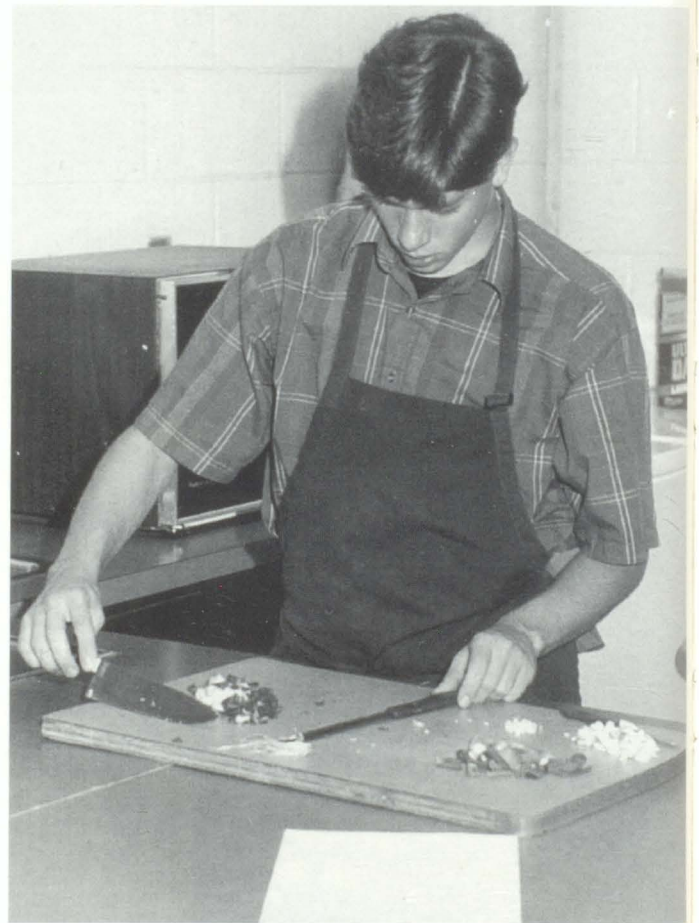

Breaking Ground Through Other Options

Both the Post-secondary Enrollment Program and the Independent Study option offer excellent opportunities for students. In both areas, people are breaking ground and working toward future careers.



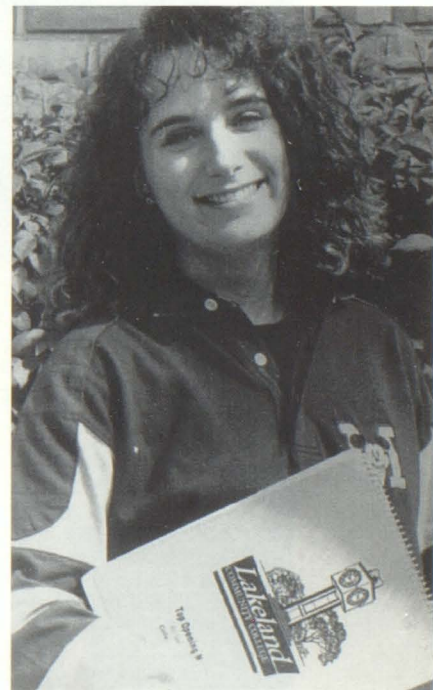

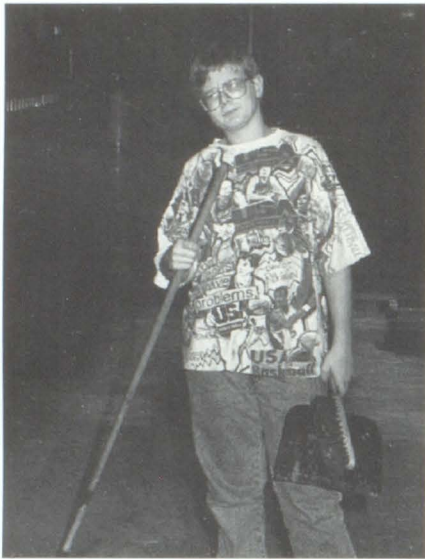

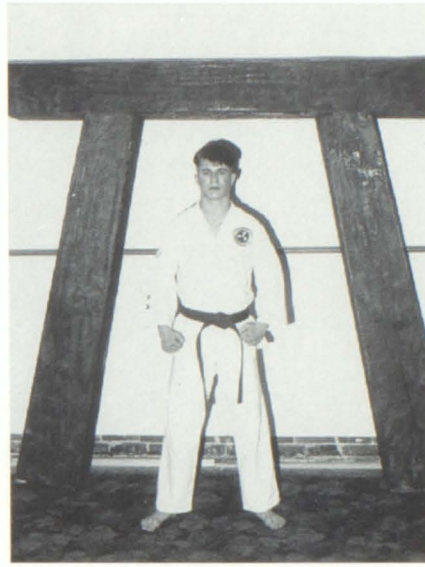

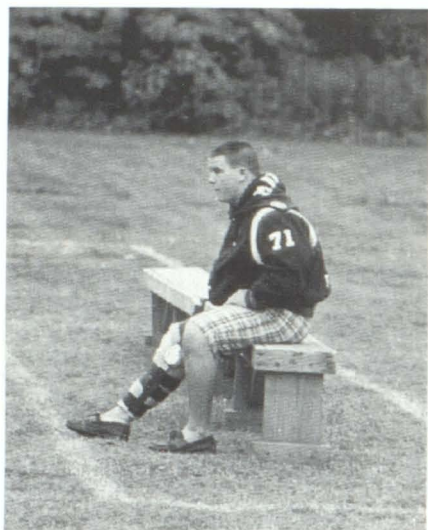


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THE PERFECT SEASON

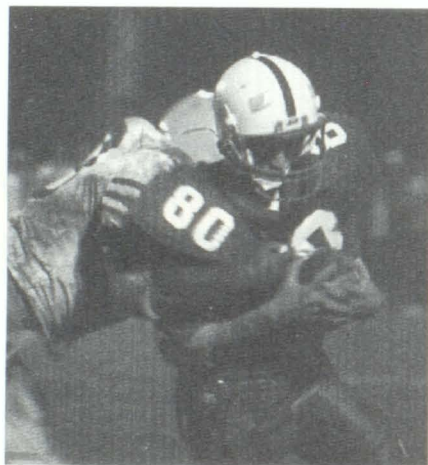

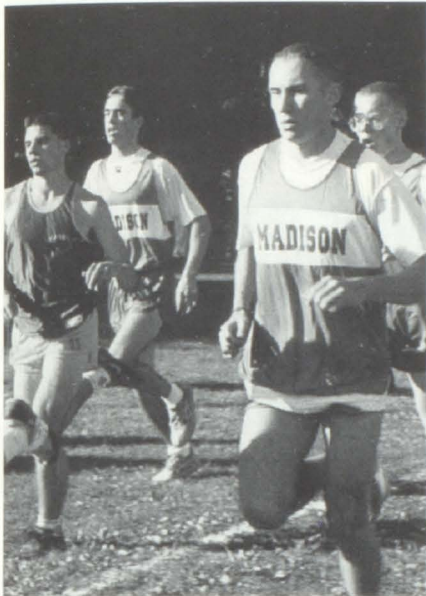

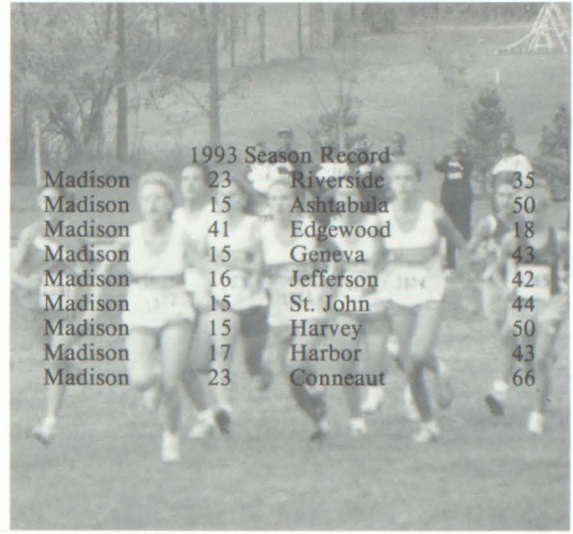

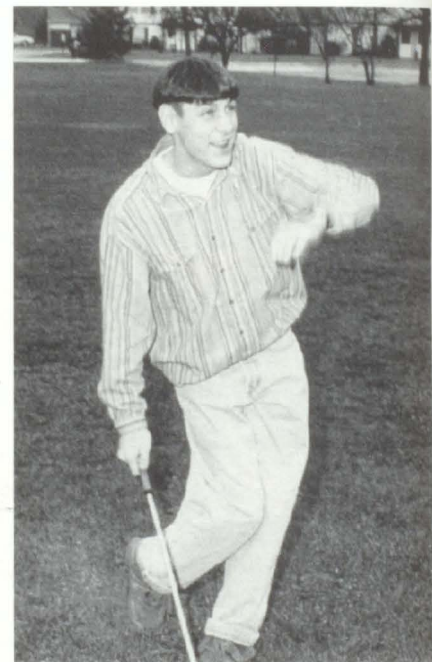
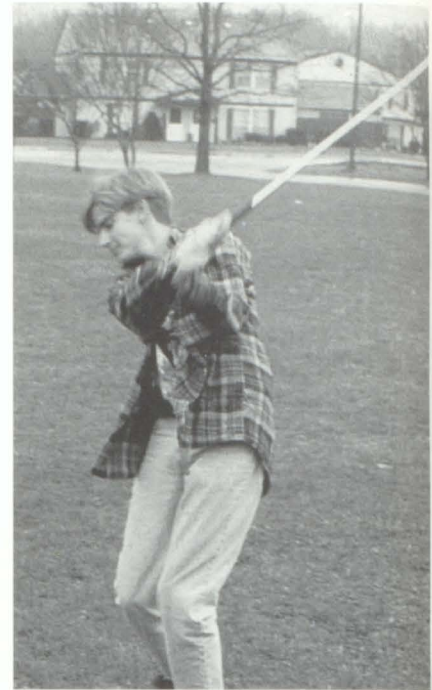
Give it Your Best Shot!

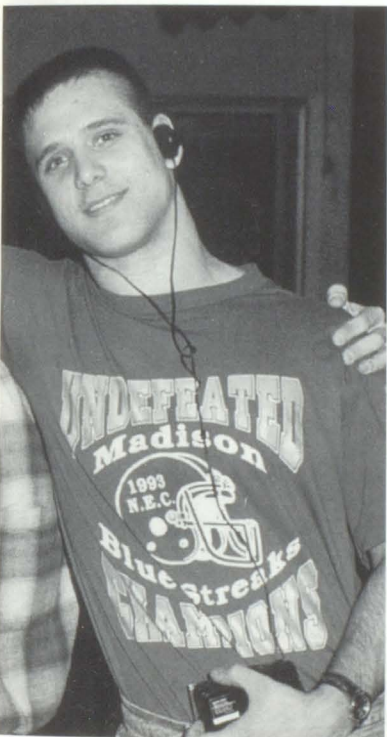
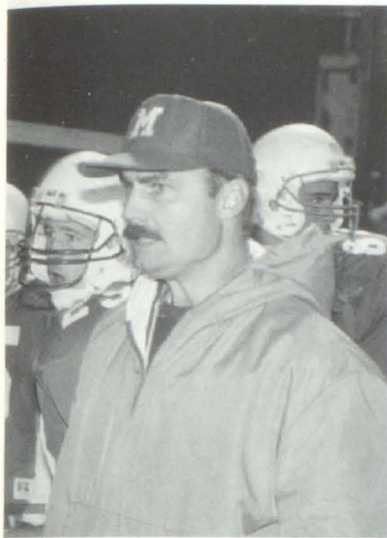

Coach and Player of the Year



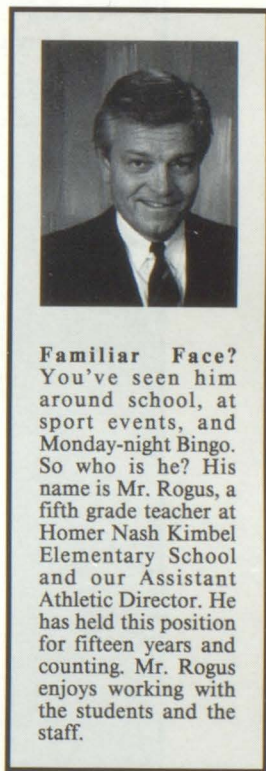

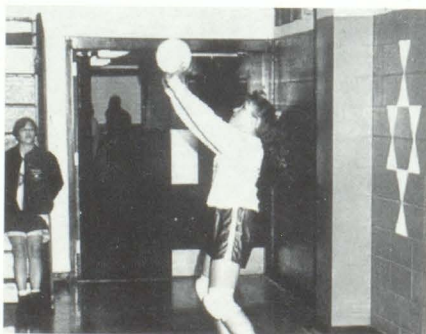

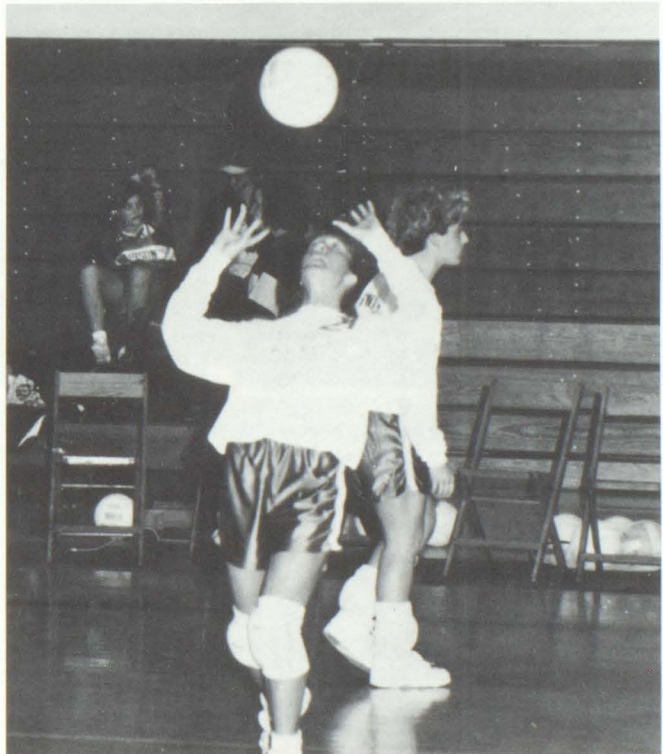

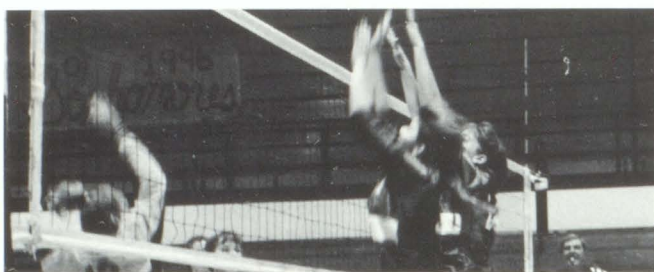

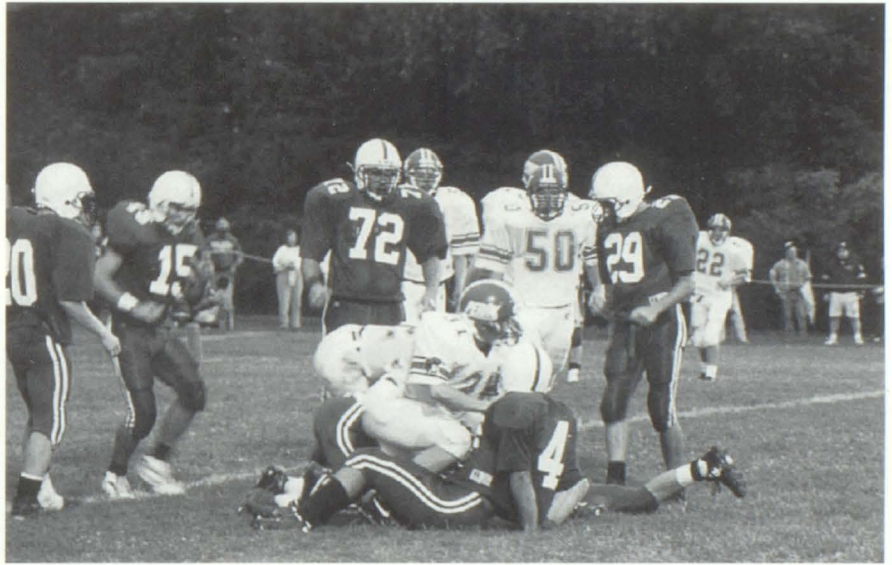

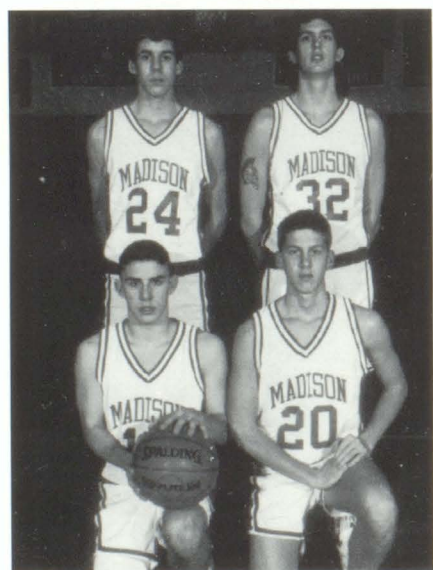
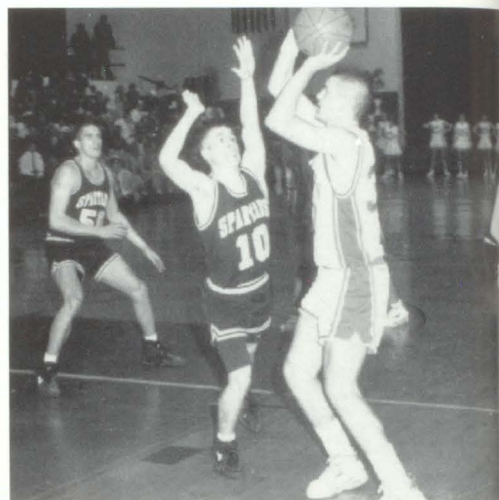
Another Hard Fought Season Enters the Records

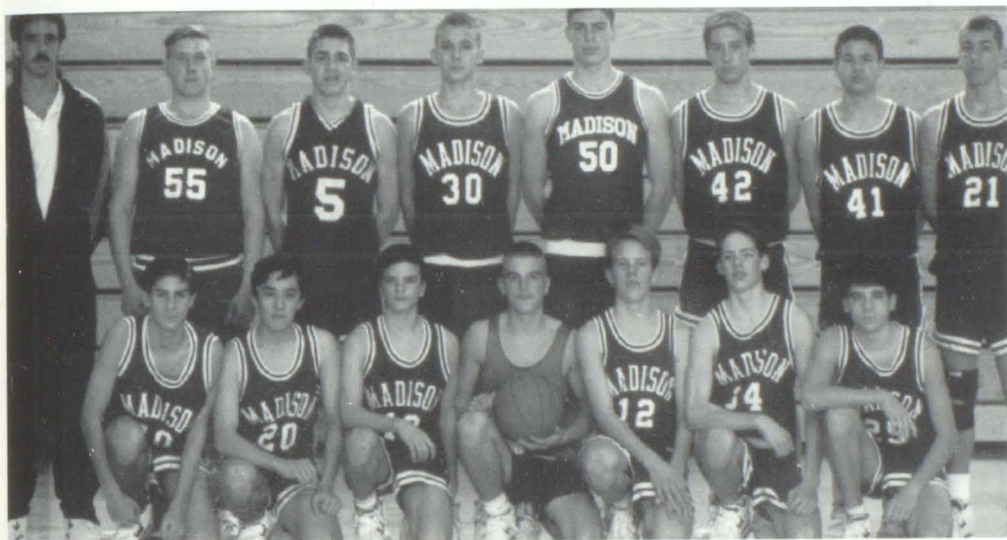

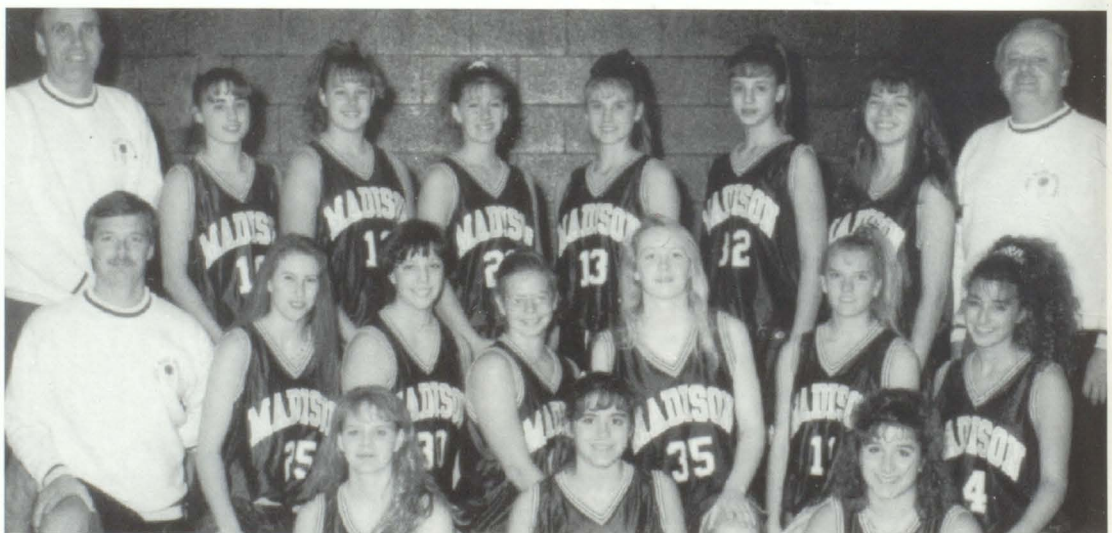

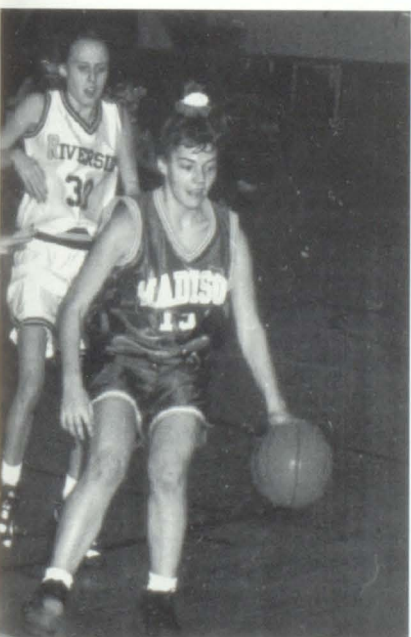

Swim Team Makes Waves

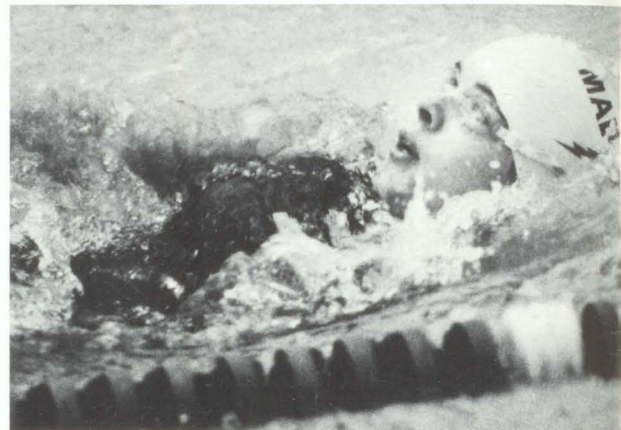
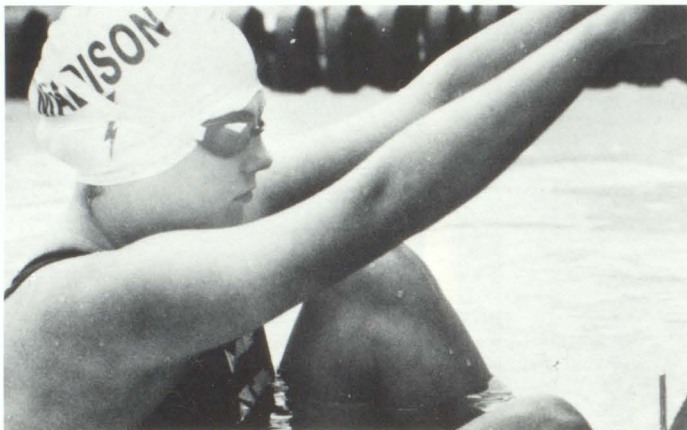

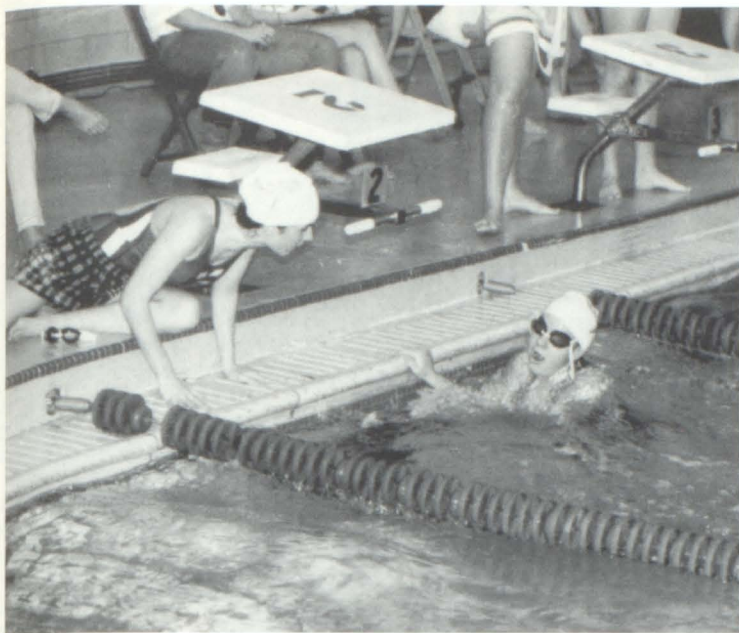

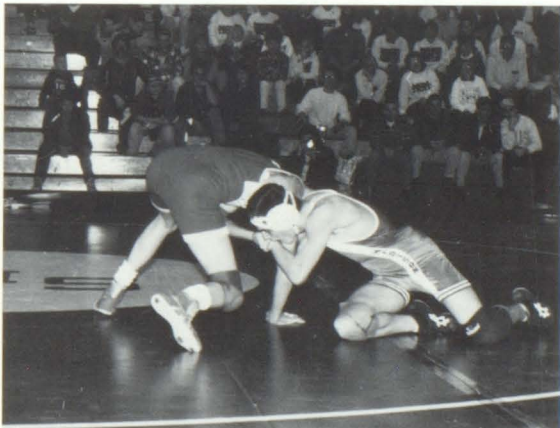

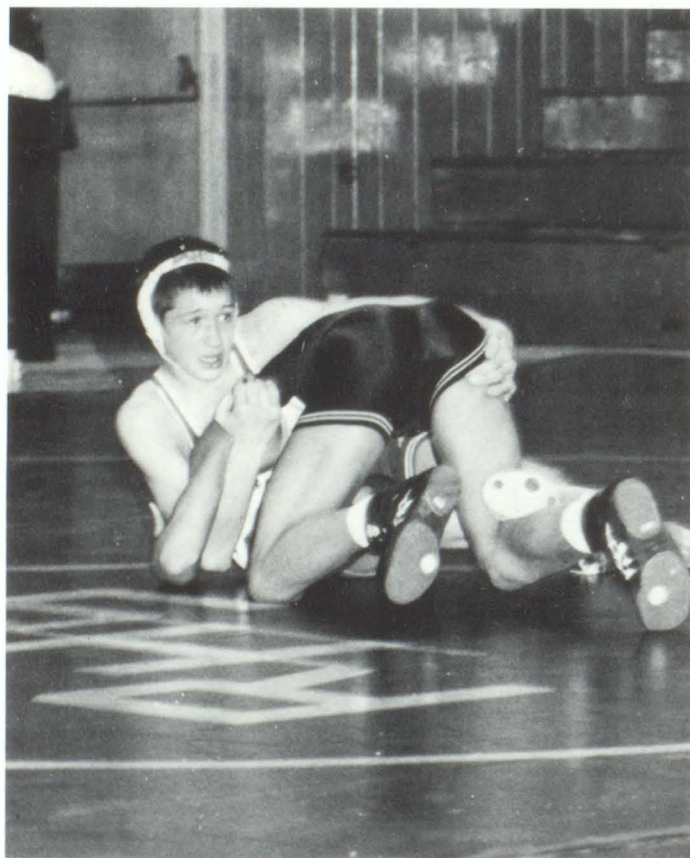
The J.V. team was coached by Mr. Tim Willis, who commented, "Although we didn't get as many matches as we wanted, the group has a great future." Mr. Becka said,

"We had nineteen wrestlers, a good number of freshmen, so next year should be good."

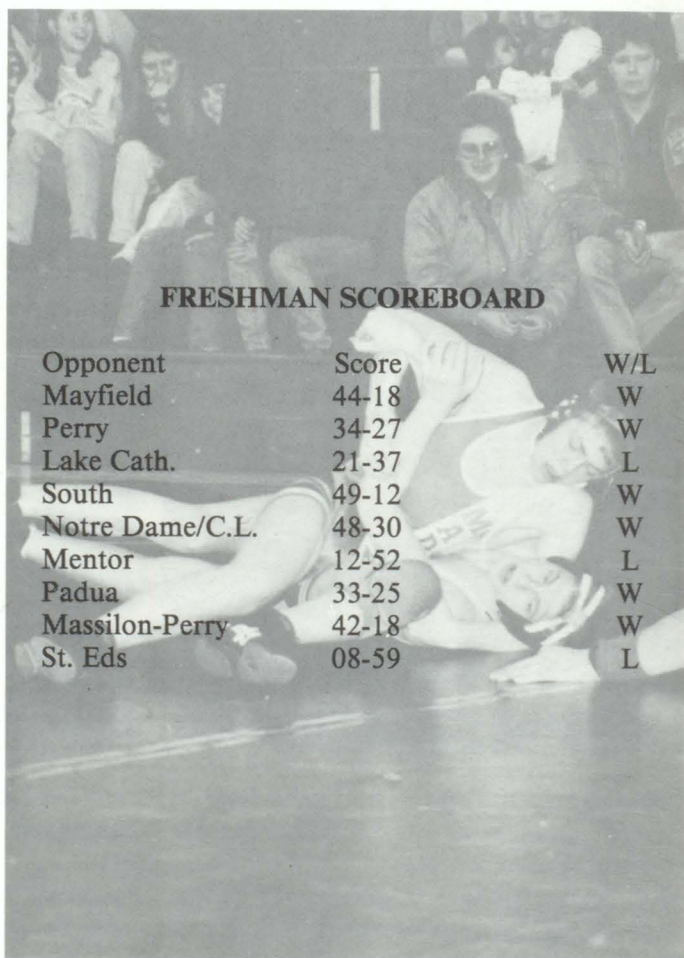
Both teams also took somewhat of a vacation along with the varsity during winter break.

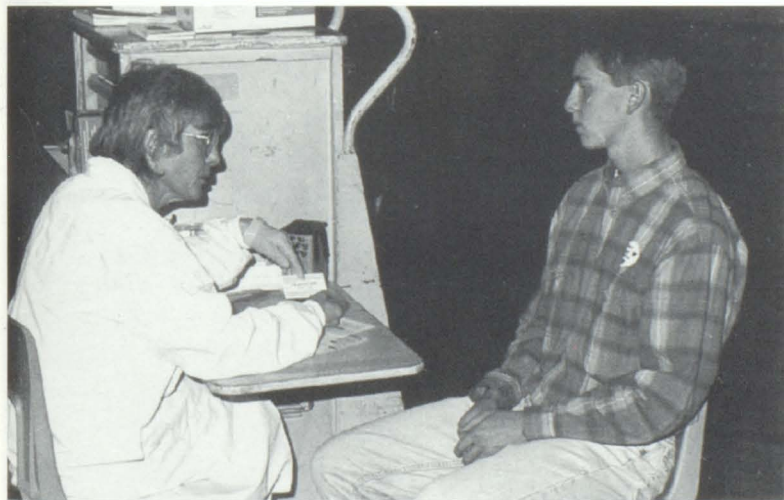

cart are really a great convenience!"

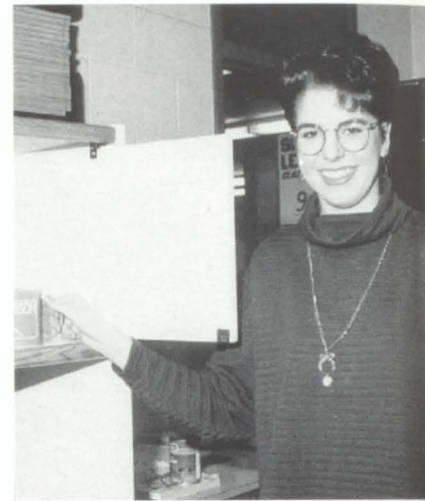
The book store also serves as the drop off station for Key Club hours and is conveniently located by the Key Club bulletin board.

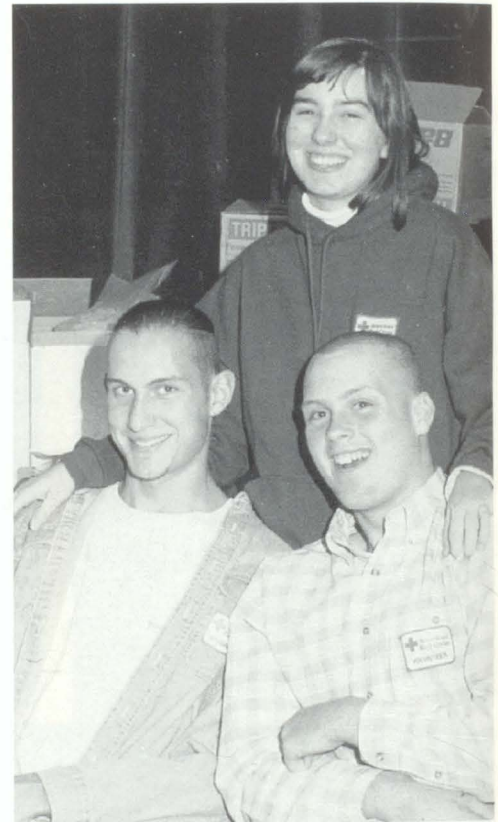
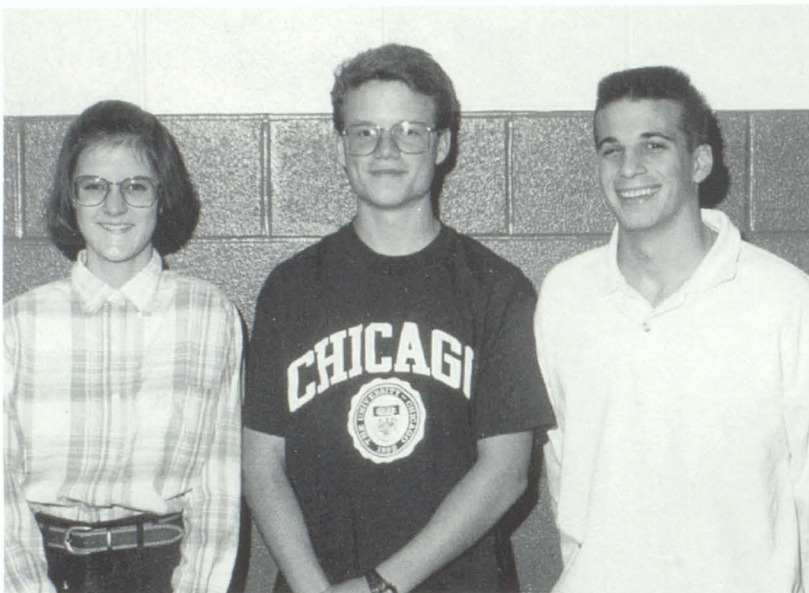

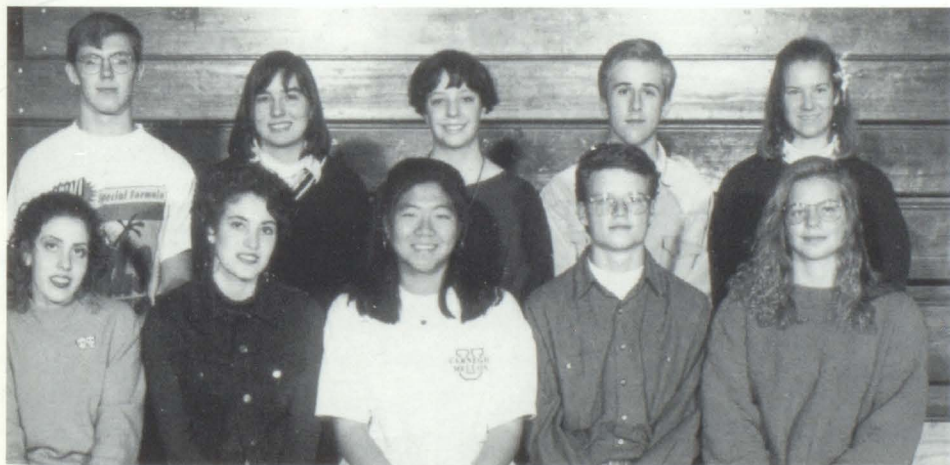
habitats. Their last goal was to publicize their efforts and views to government representatives, both local to worldwide.

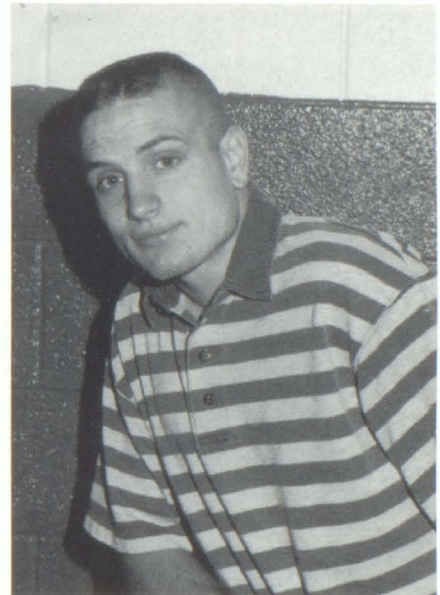

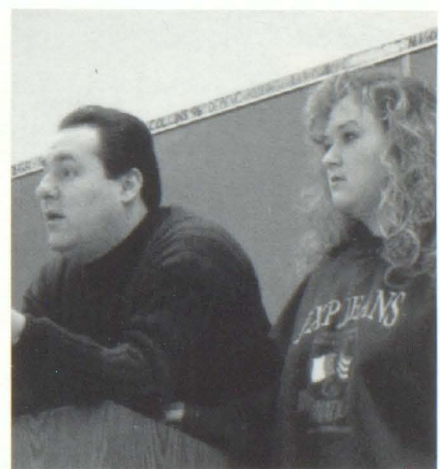

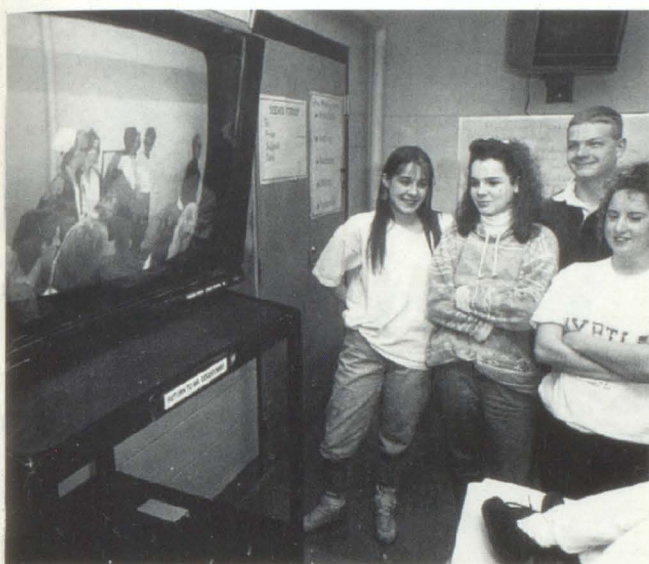

Tennis Team Makes History

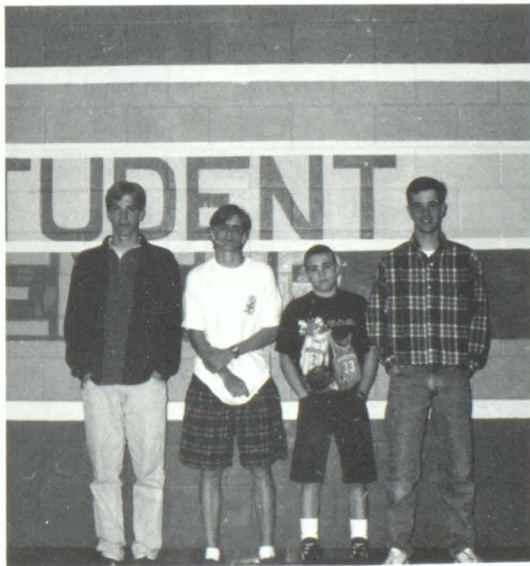

Softball Team Has a Hopeful Future

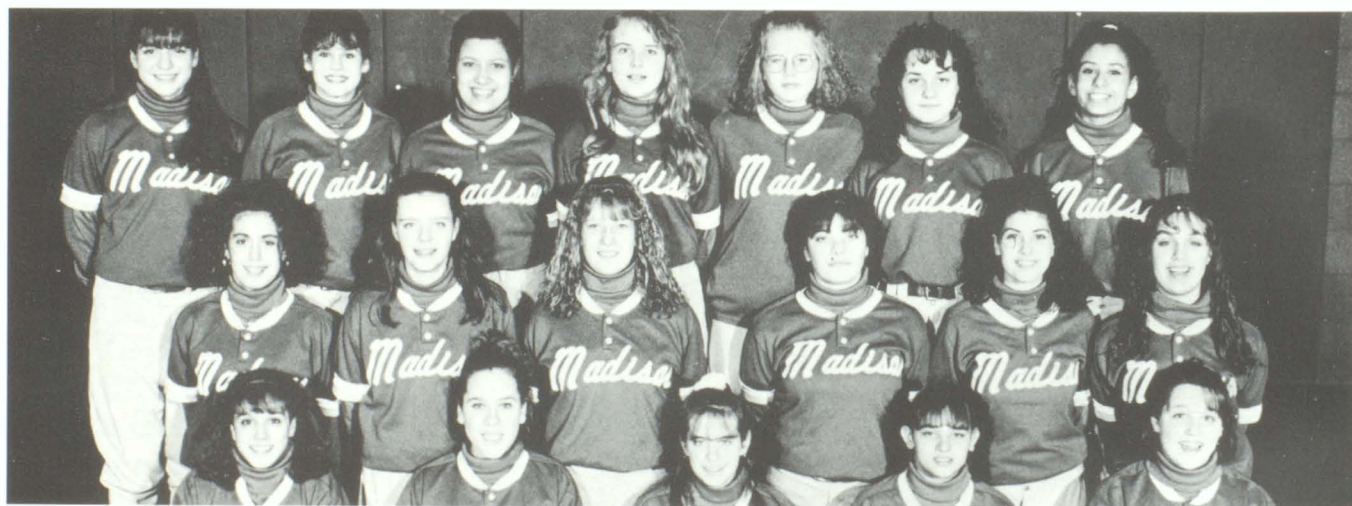

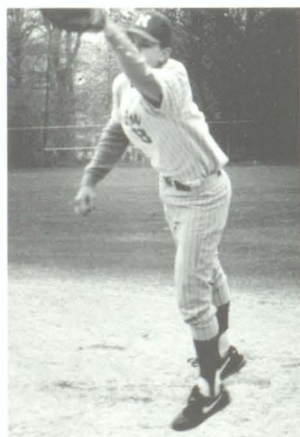

Both of the track teams have much to be proud of, such as their outstanding personal records and successful achievements! Great job track teams!

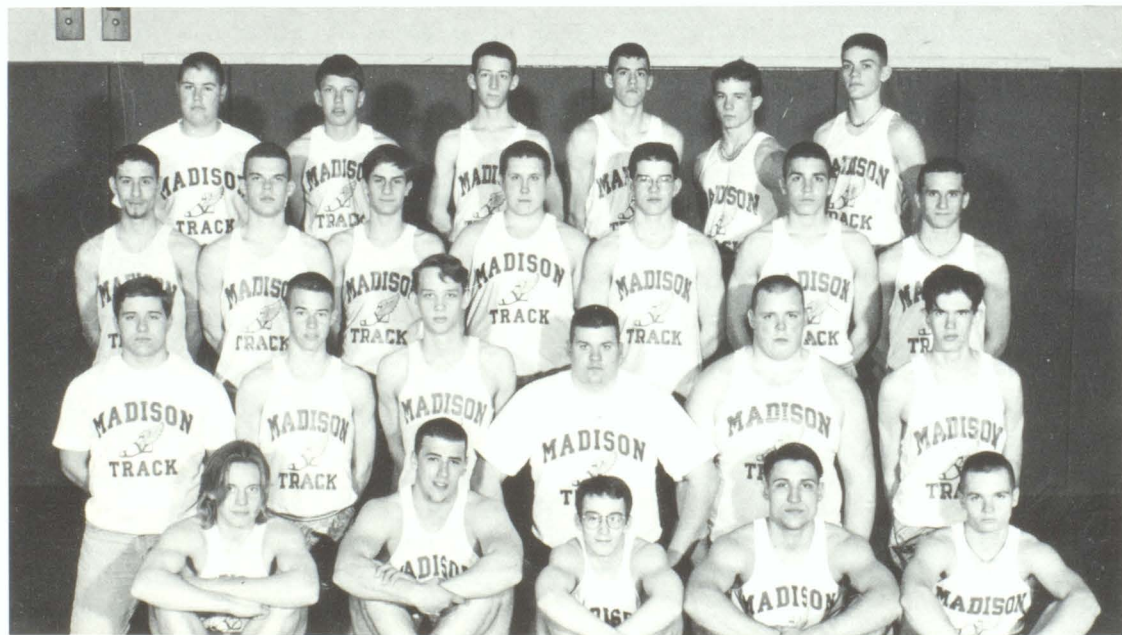

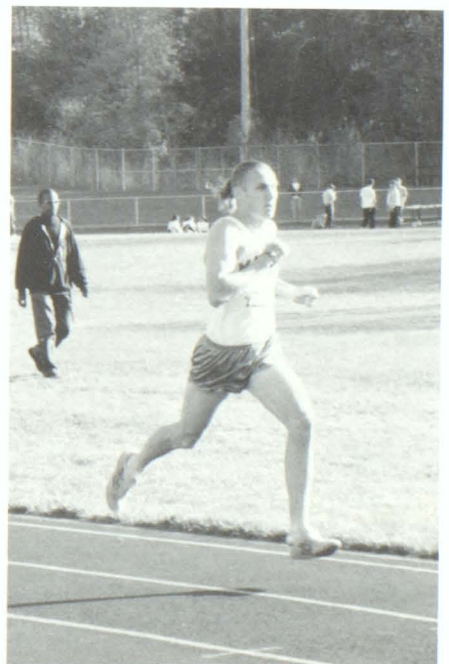
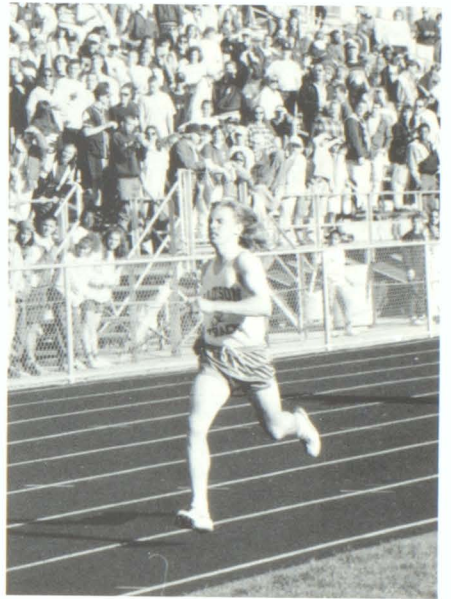

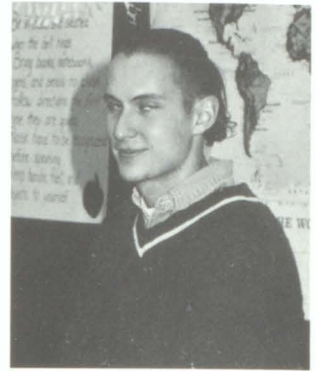

National Honor Society Keeps Tradition

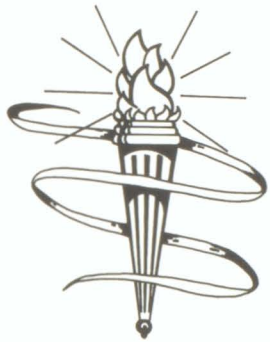

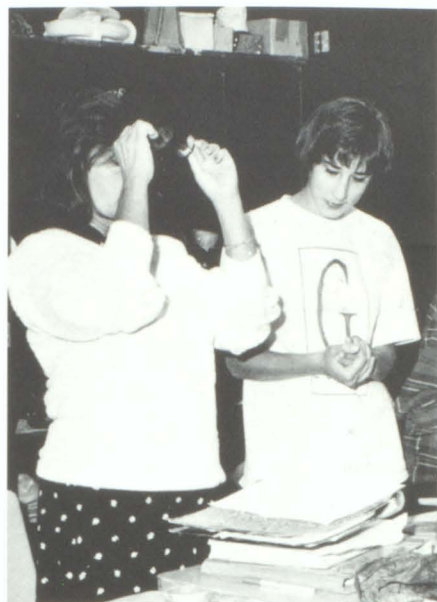

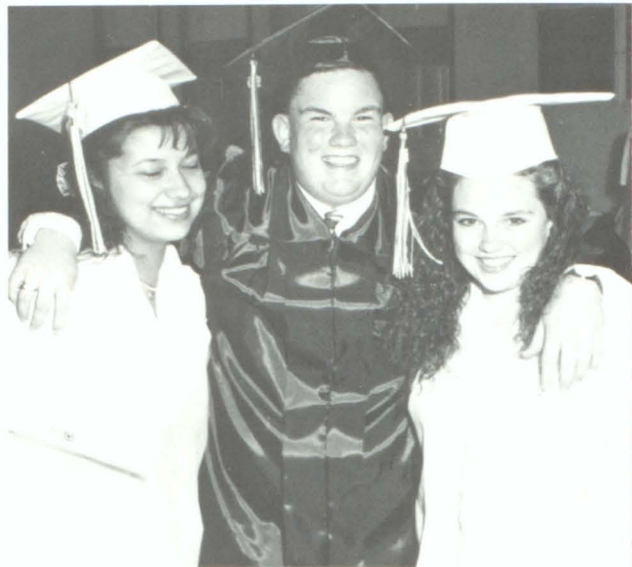

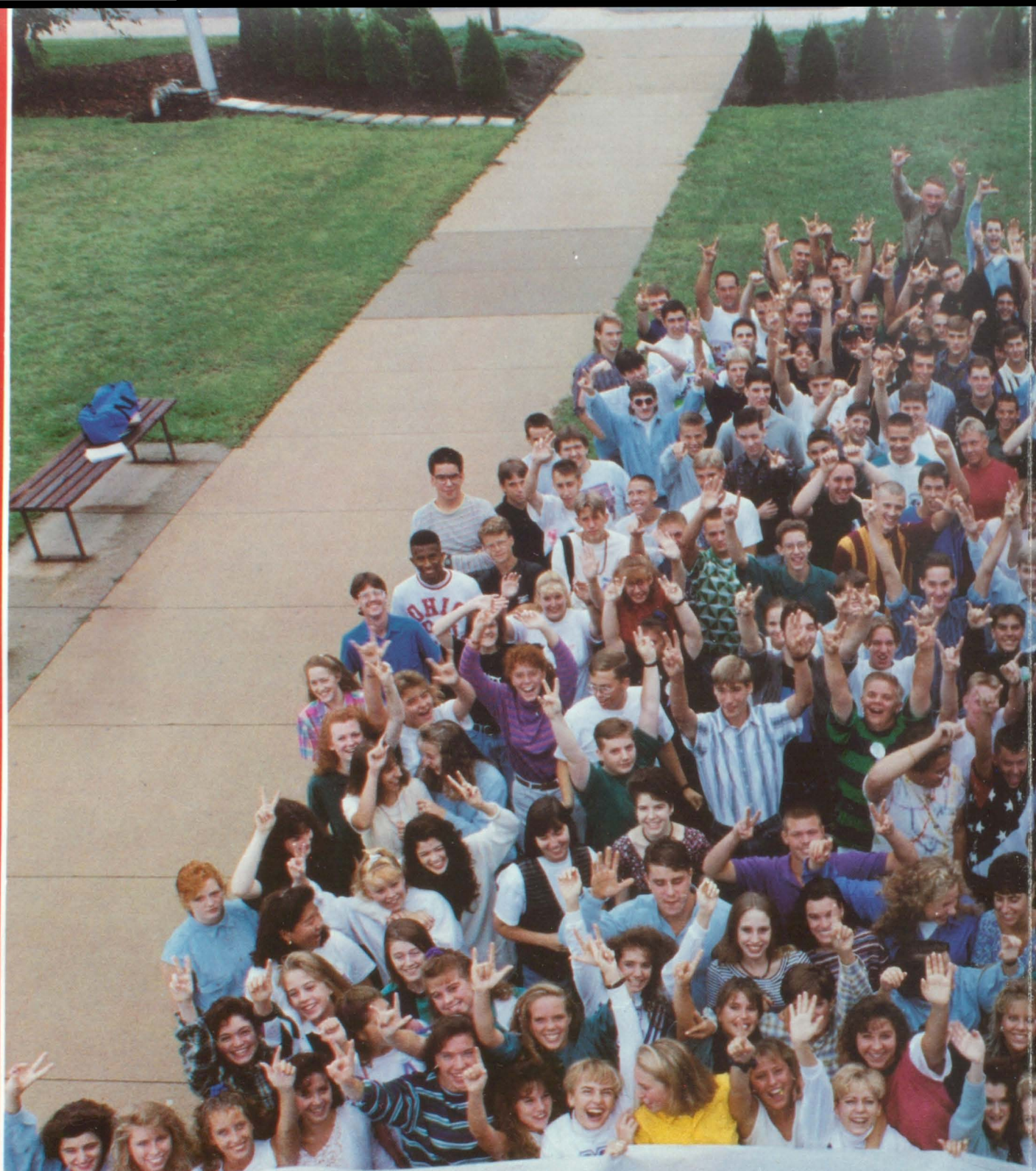
