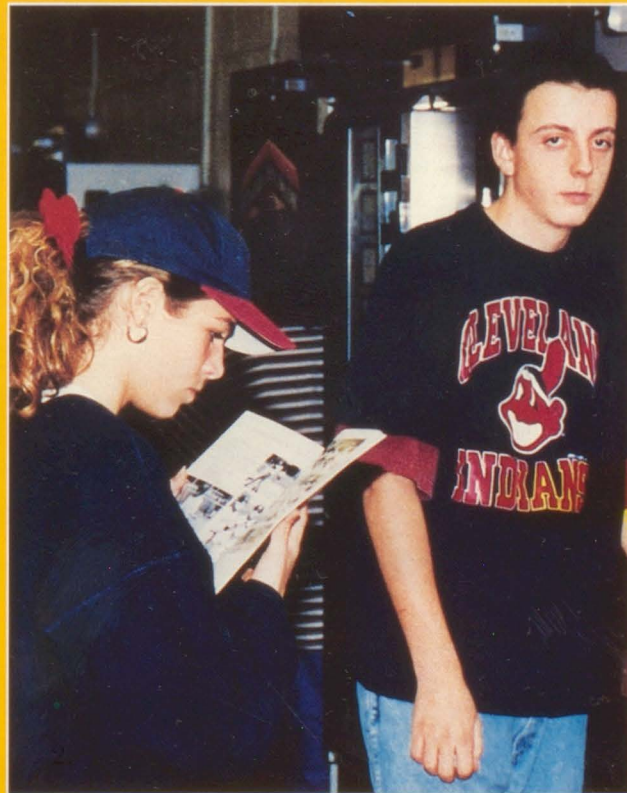
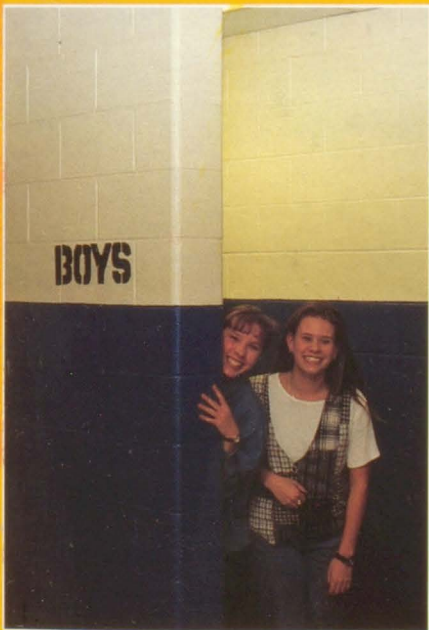
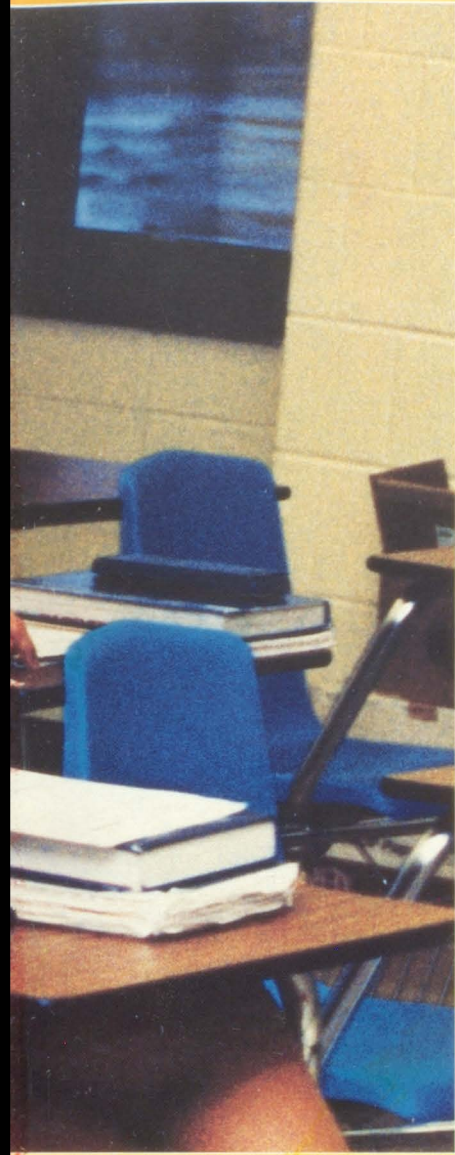
A Class That's Going Places

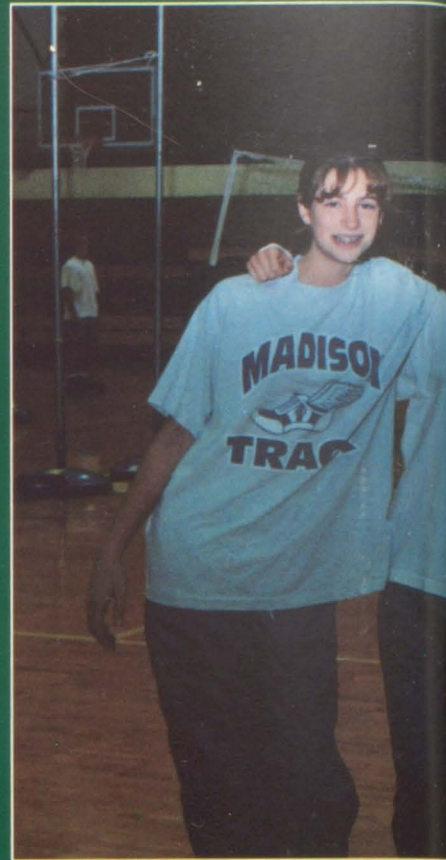
It's About Time

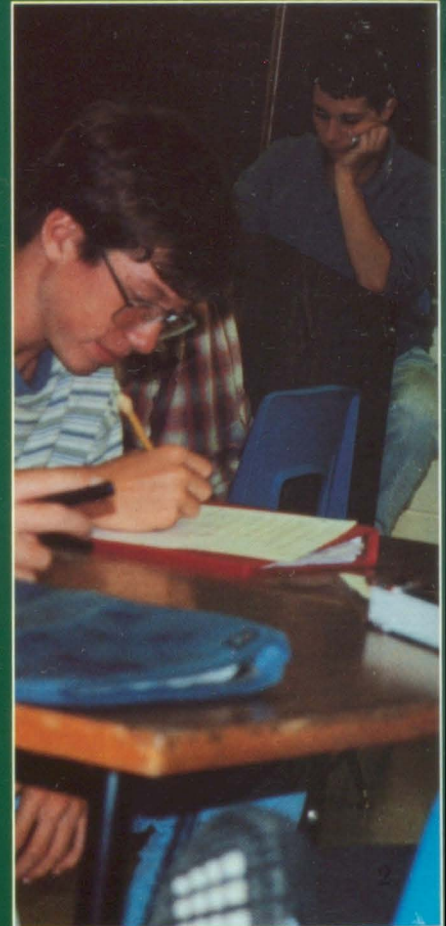
involved and get acquainted with other people besides classmates.

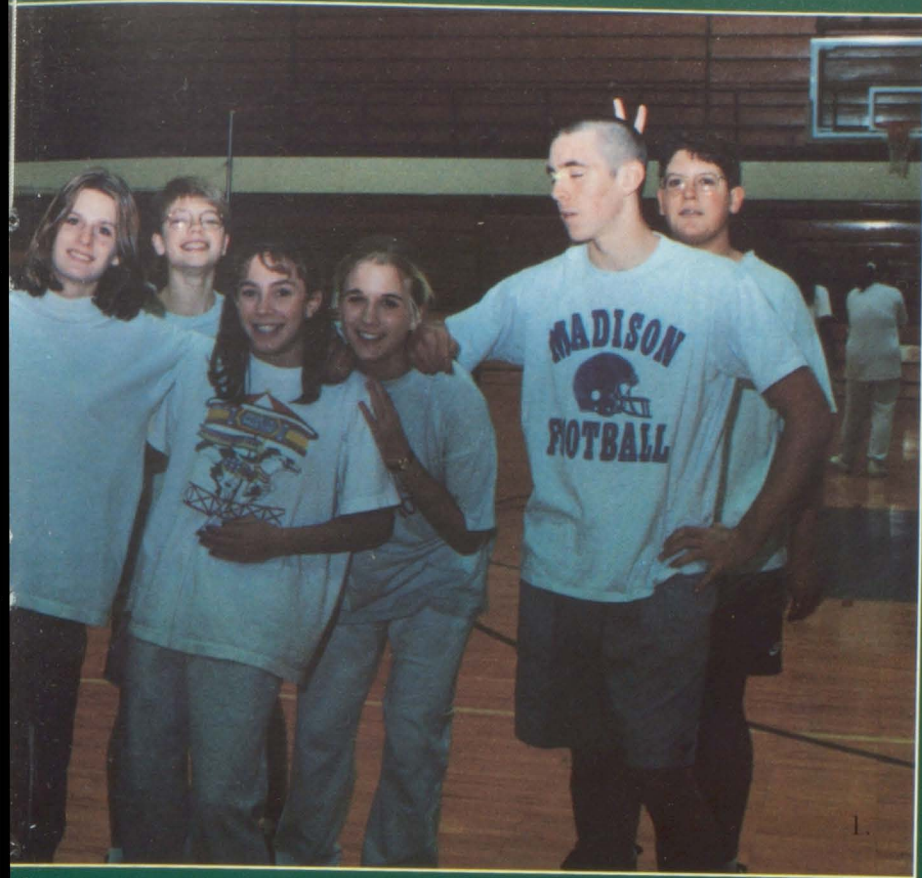

Times Change for Athletes Players Set Traditions in Winning

"Our athletic programs have been very successful over the last five years. We have been to the state playoffs in football, regional competition in girls' cross country, and have won league championships in football, girls' cross country, boys' soccer, and girls' basketball. Our athletic programs are programs which other teams are trying to duplicate," stated Athletic Director Mr. Jim Pinelli when asked about the successes the varsity sports teams have experienced over the last few years. The sports programs consisted of ten boys' and seven girls' teams. The squads accomplished many things in the classroom as well as on the field or court. To participate in athletics, students were required to maintain a 1.50 grade point average. For most players, this requirement was not a problem since ninety percent of the athletes carried a 2.00 and above grade point average and had

a higher graduation rate. When asked to comment on Madison's ability to compete with the best teams in the North Eastern Conference, Mr. Pinelli said, "Our level of competition is always increasing. We try to increase our competition level by bringing in major independents. Each coach gears his program for state level competition, not just for the N.E.C. or other leagues we're in." The class of 1996 led this year's sports teams to numerous victories in every sport and several championship titles, as well as provided leadership to the underclassmen by setting examples in dedication and devotion. To cap off their season, many players accomplished their goal of being on their leagues' all-conference teams. Whatever their preference in sports, this year's players set traditions for the generations to follow.

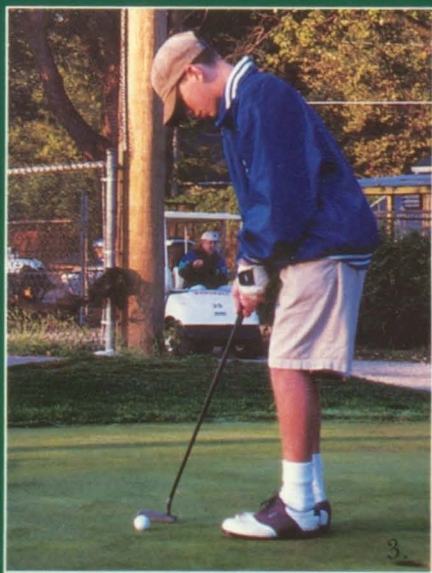

edge and experience in their desired professions.

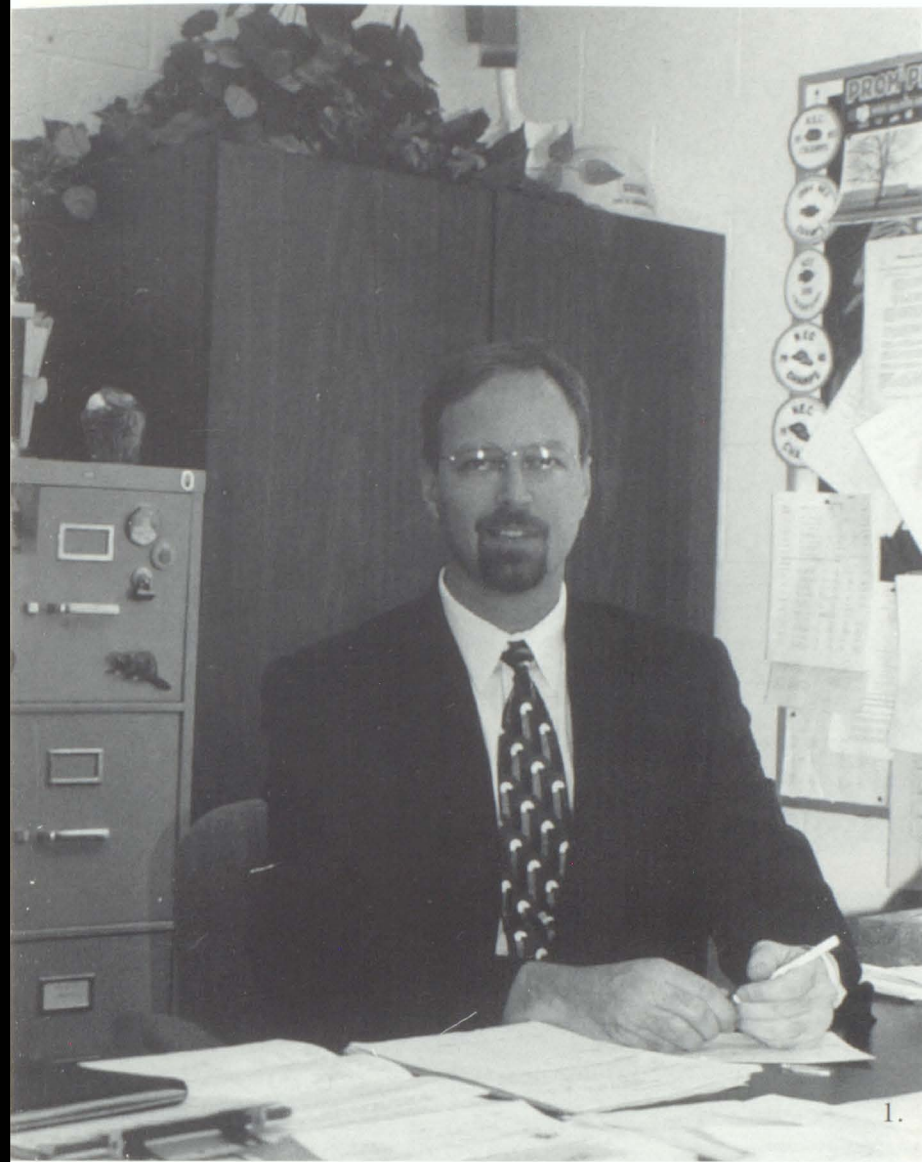

Students Keep up with Times

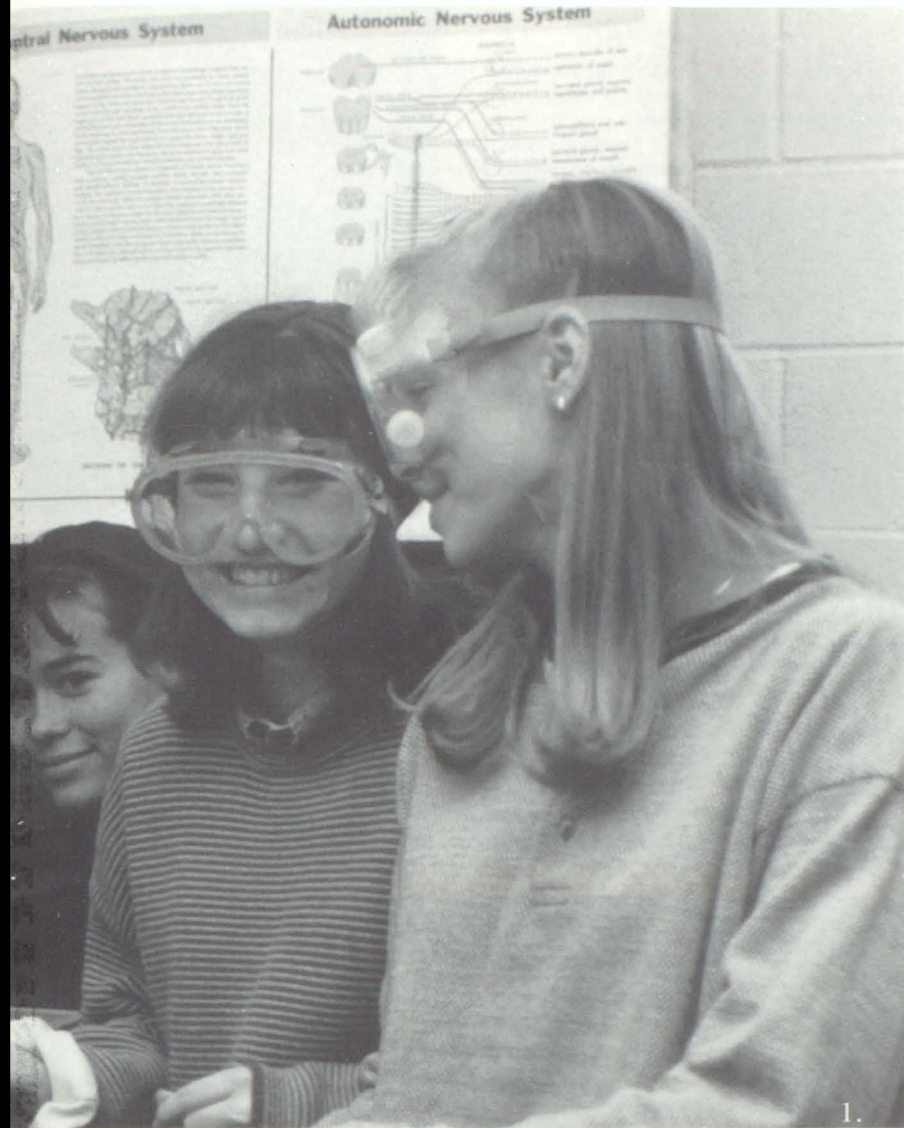

Hopefully, though, you've also found that the math department had a lot more to offer than just stress. Each level of math is made to suit individual students' needs. Math Intervention, a class recently added to help students pass proficiency tests, has been very successful. For students who excel or have a strong interest in math, Pre-Calculus is offered. 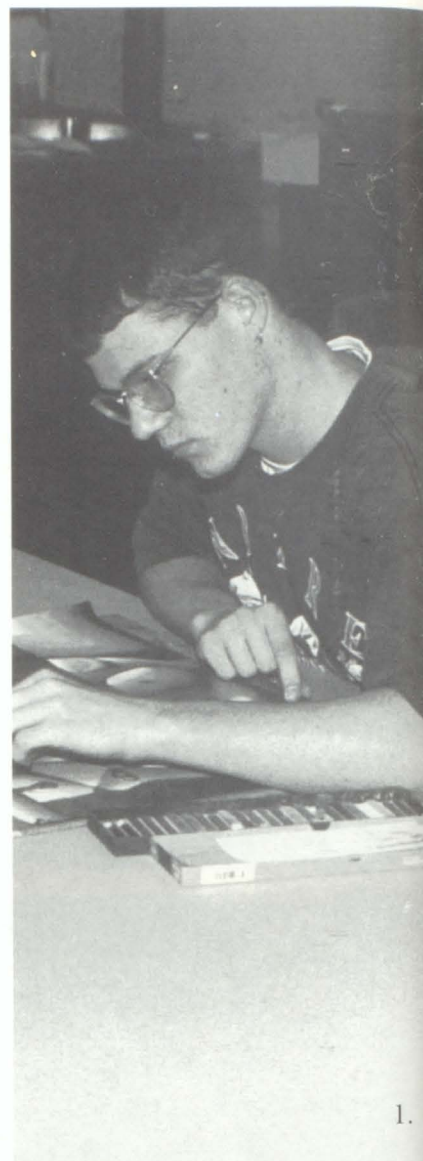
Making Time

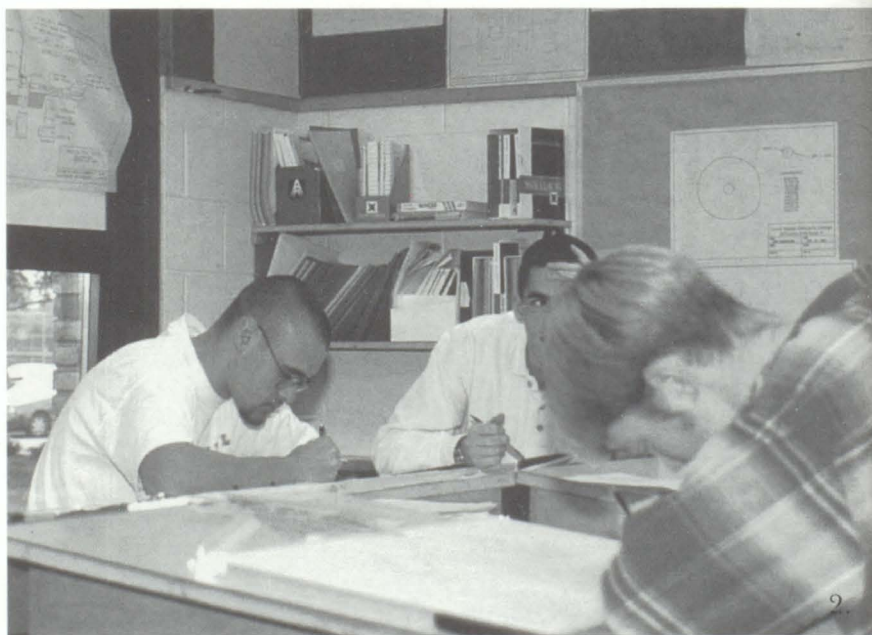
the other side of the wall, photography, beginning drawing, ceramics, sculpture, and jewelry were taught by Mr. Ashton.

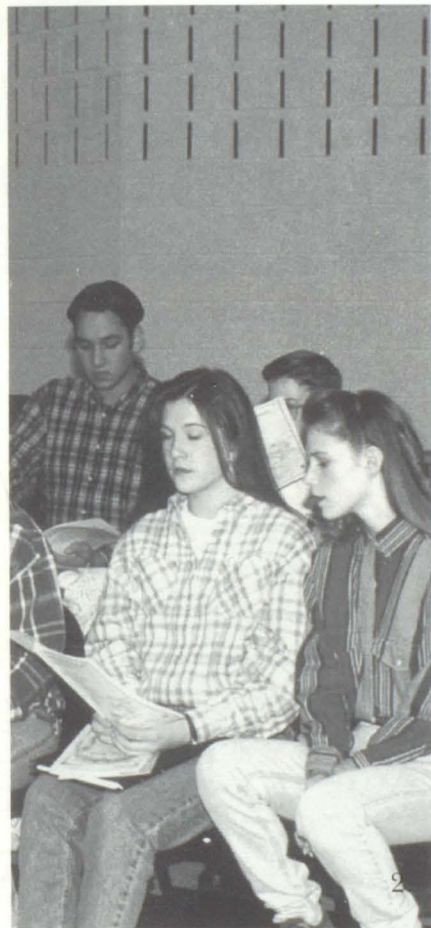


Time After Time Students Keep Singing

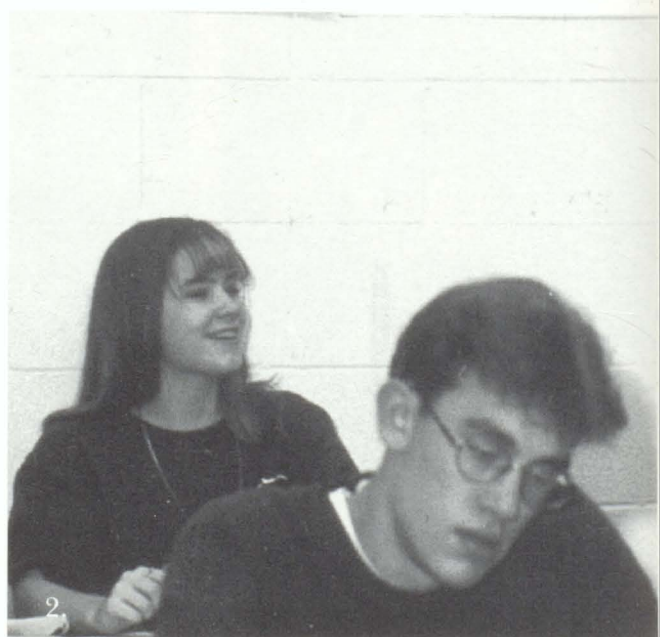

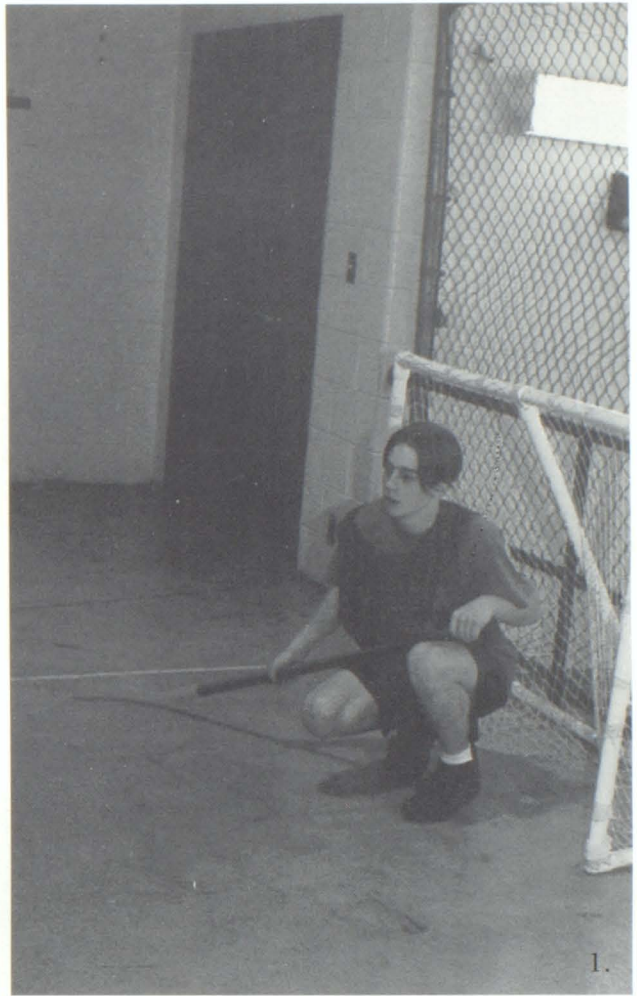

A.V. and Home Ec. Prepare Students for Real Life

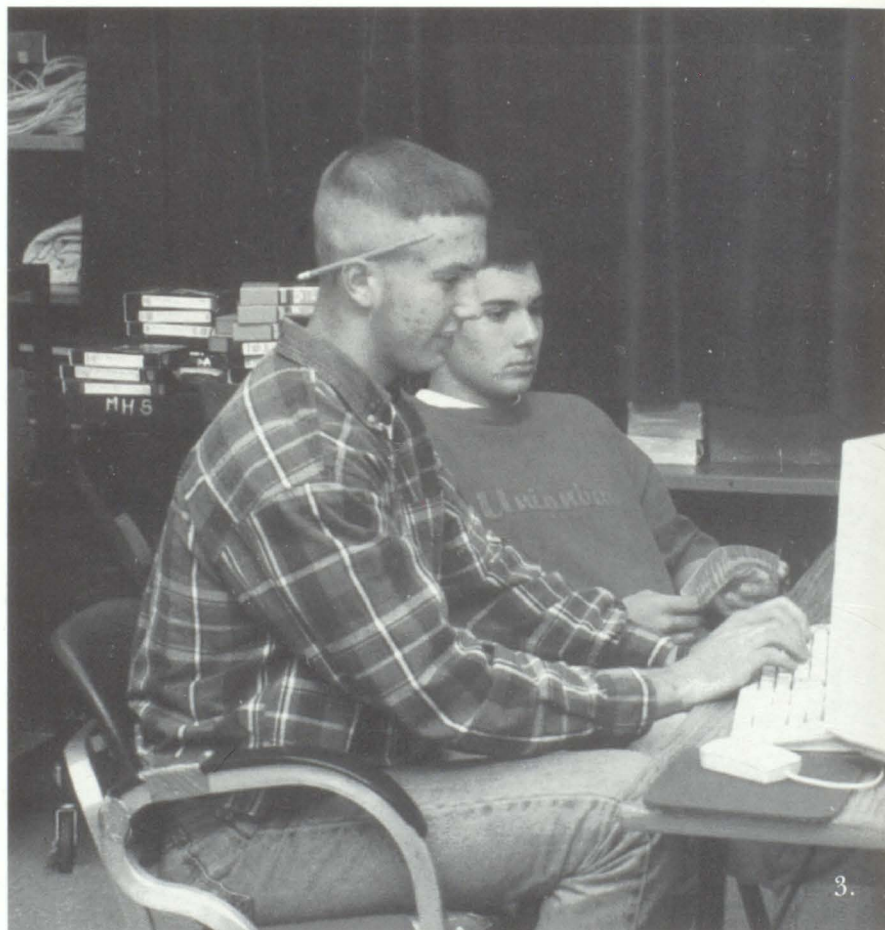

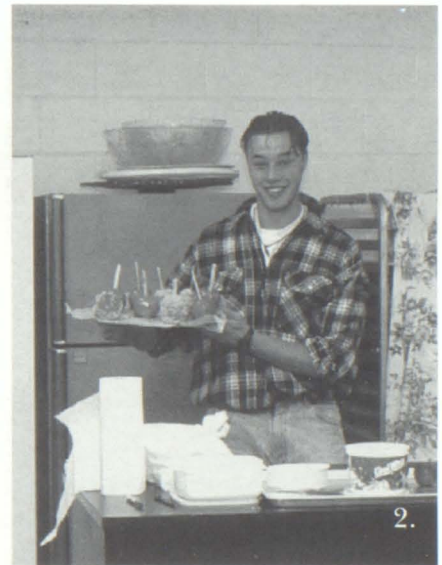
important to people who are interested in communications."

Auburn Teaches Vocational Skills

Auburn Career Center allowed students to earn high school credit while learning a valuable job or trade. Throughout the sophomore year, information about classes offered at Auburn was made readily available to the students. Good grades and a good attendance record were just two of the requirements needed to fill the shoes of a typical Auburn student.

Students had the option of attending Auburn for either a whole day or a half day, taking classes with others from across Lake County. Instructors there provided training

Classes Prepare Students for Time in the Real World

English and math were not the only classes needed to prepare students for the real world. The OWA program and business-related classes were offered at MHS to help students get ready for the future. The business department consisted of such classes as business law, accounting, personal typing, and Typing I. These classes, taught by Mr. John Miller and Mrs. Suzanne Grist, helped students learn necessary skills needed to run businesses, balance budgets, and type business letters. Another class that helped students learn skills was the Occupational Work Adjustment program (OWA), run by Mr. Dave

Sears. This voluntary program was designed for students with disciplinary problems or those unmotivated to do school work. OWA showed them the importance of work — in and out of school — and gave students the confidence to accomplish more. Kandy Rounsaville, an OWA student, said of this program: "It changed my life. It gave me direction and a reason to try and to do well." Jessica McClarren added that with OWA, "I realized what I did wrong last year and learned to make it right." All of these classes helped students prepare for their time after graduation.



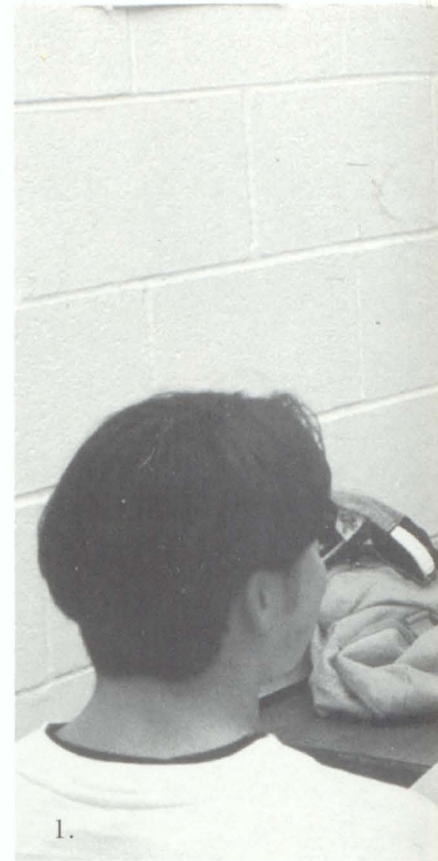

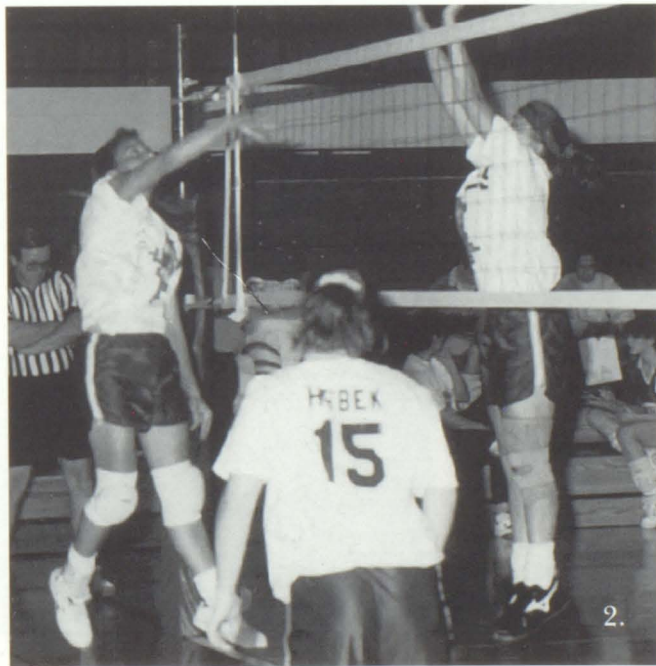
The Streaks' experience, coupled with intense pre-season workouts, helped them meet their expectations early in the season as they raced out to a 6 - 3 record.

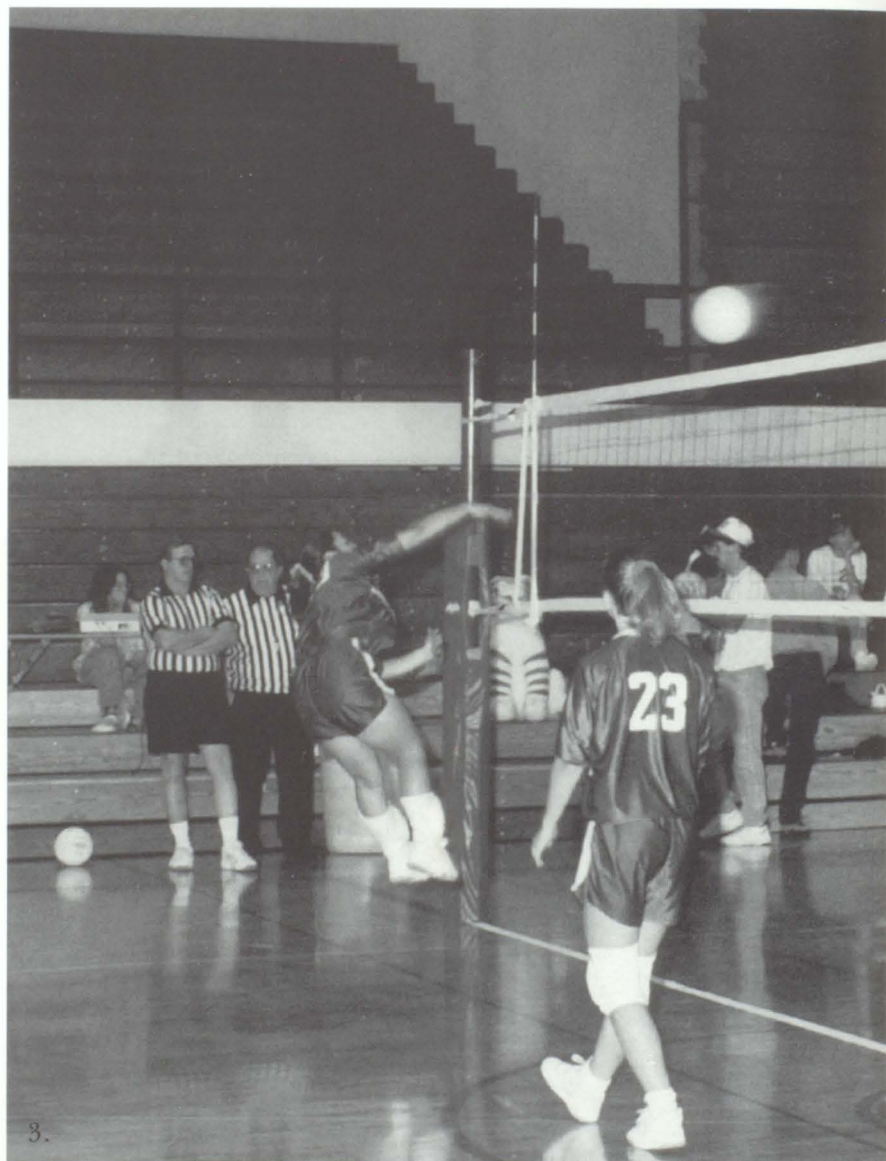


Making Time Out On the Court

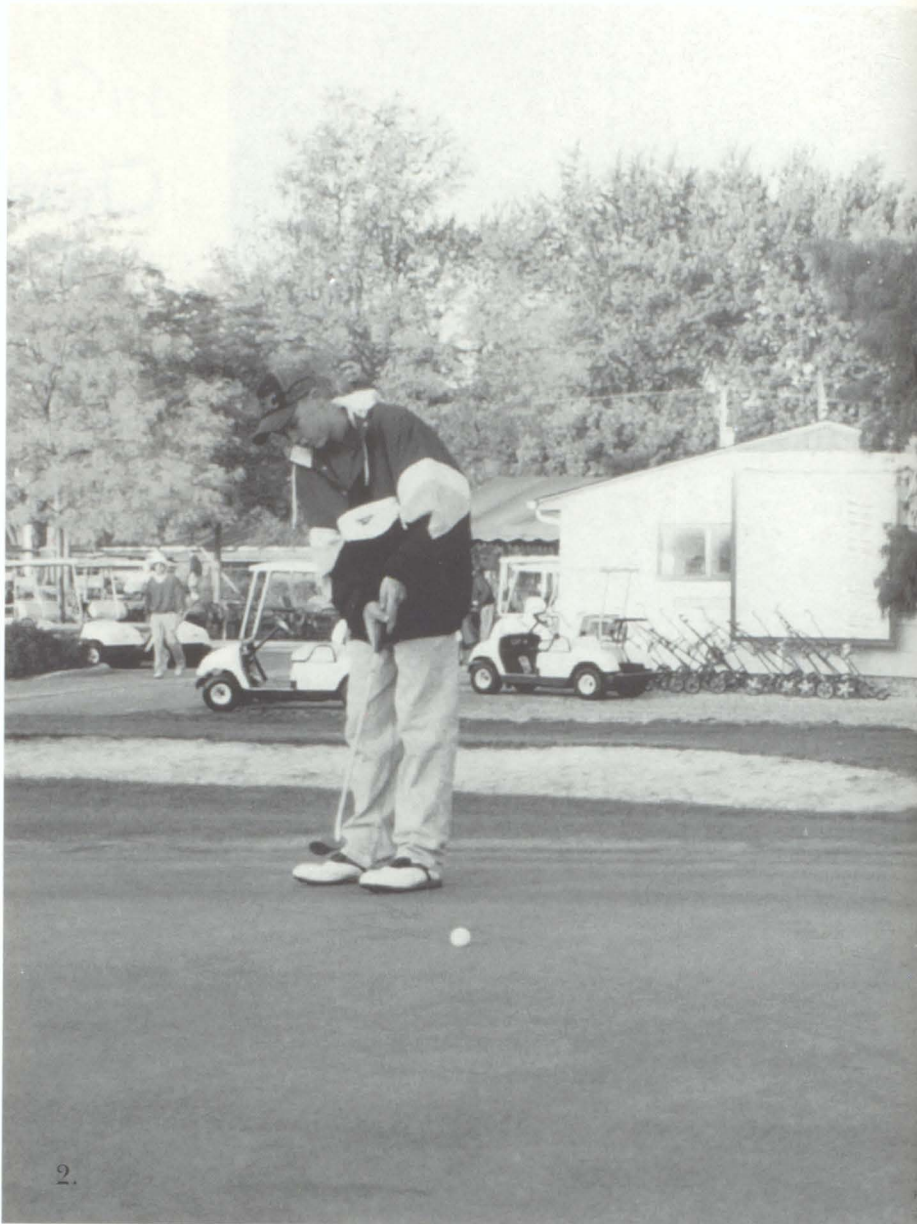

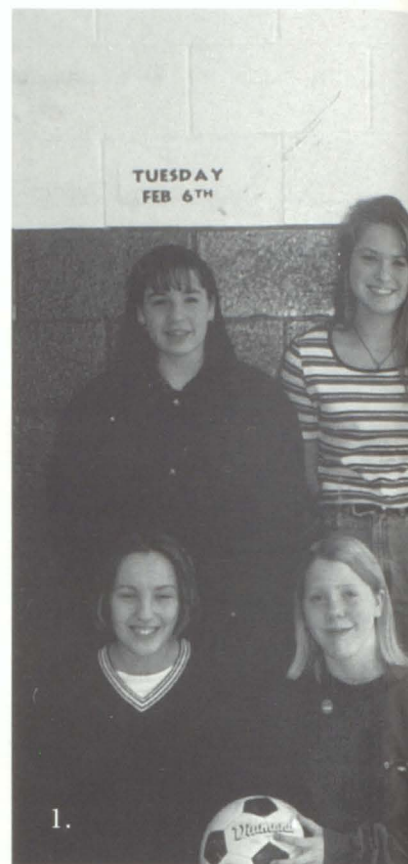
JV Soccer Teams Light Up Field

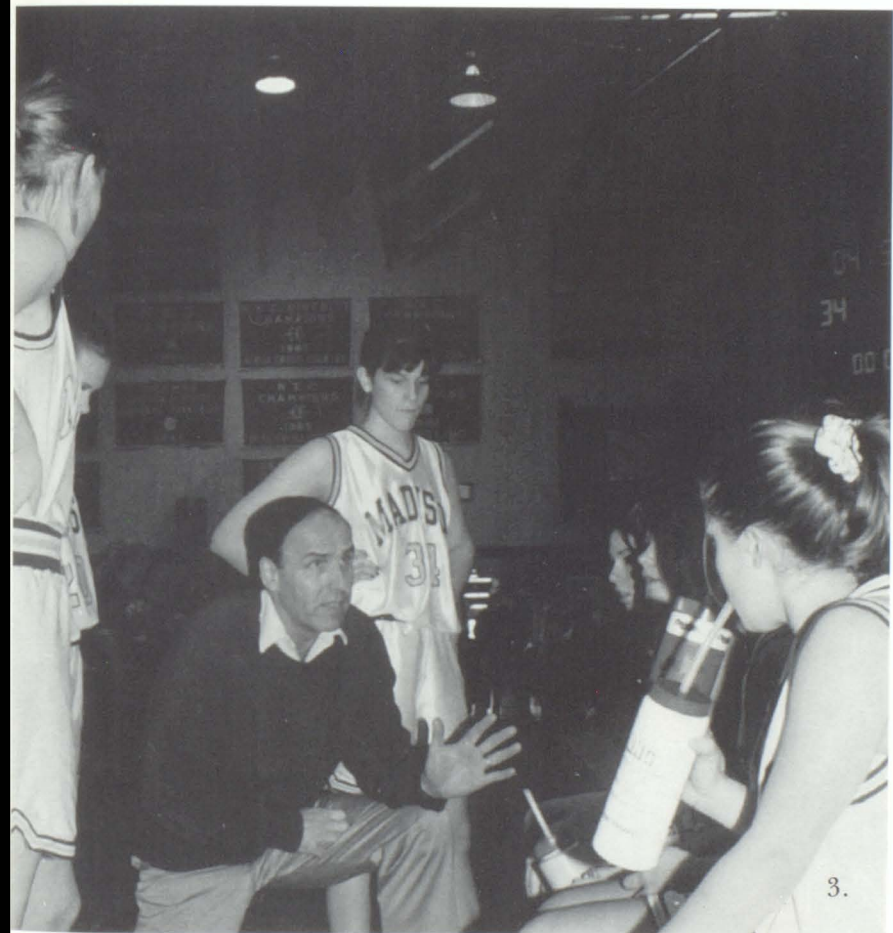

JV/Frosh Show Dedication Hard Work, Intensity Pay Off

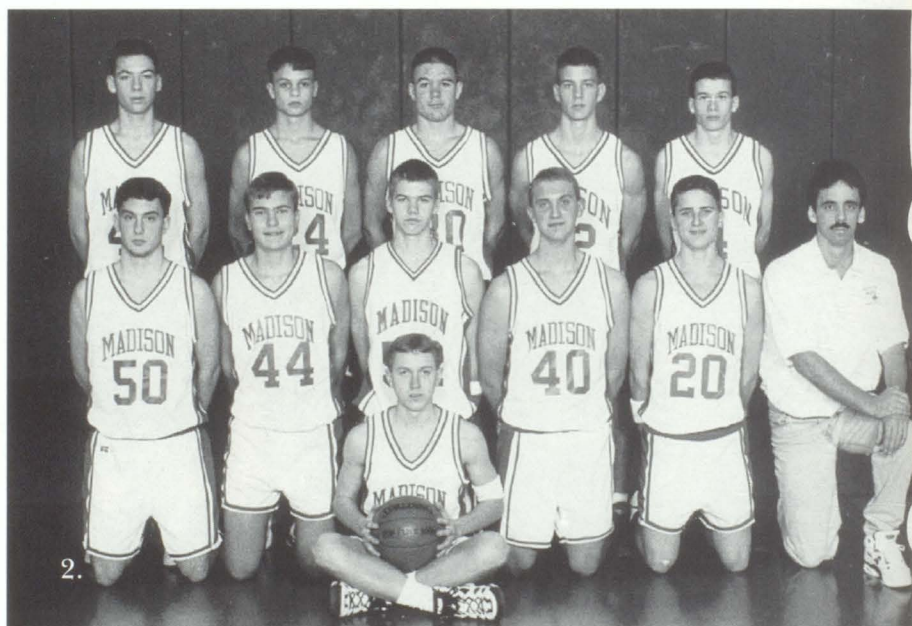

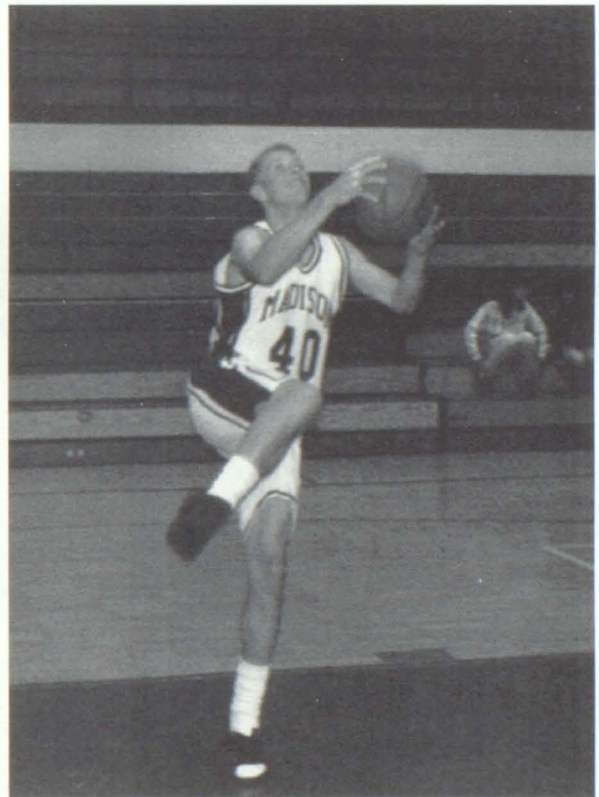

had a free day the day after a really difficult practice.

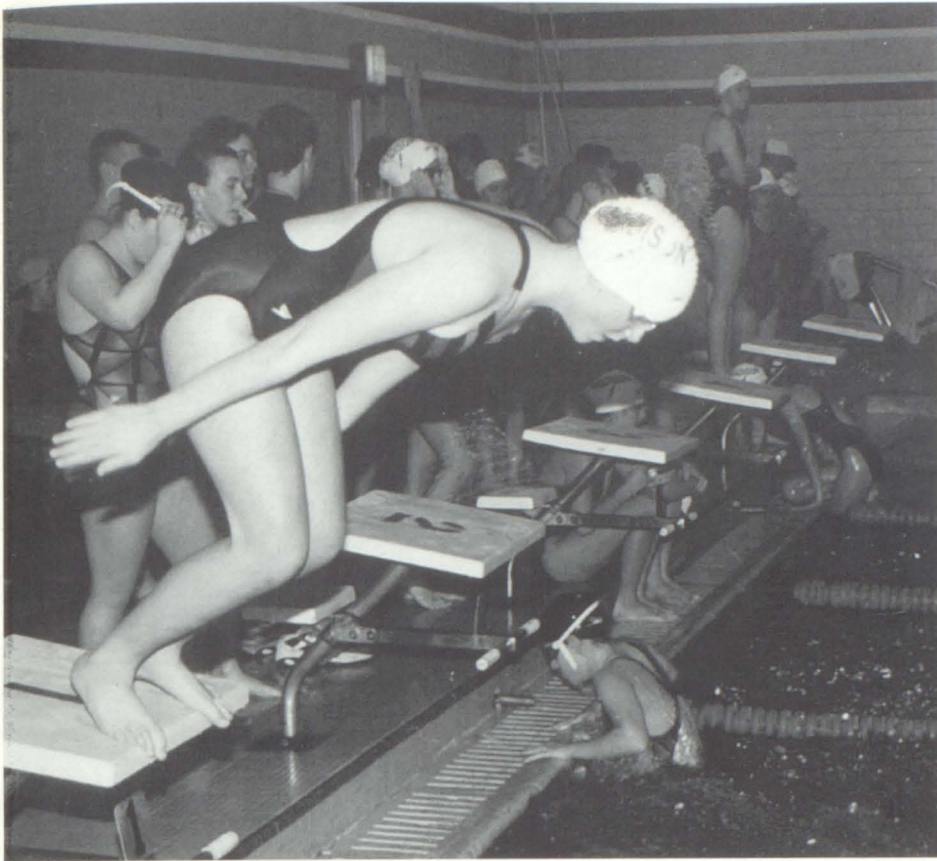

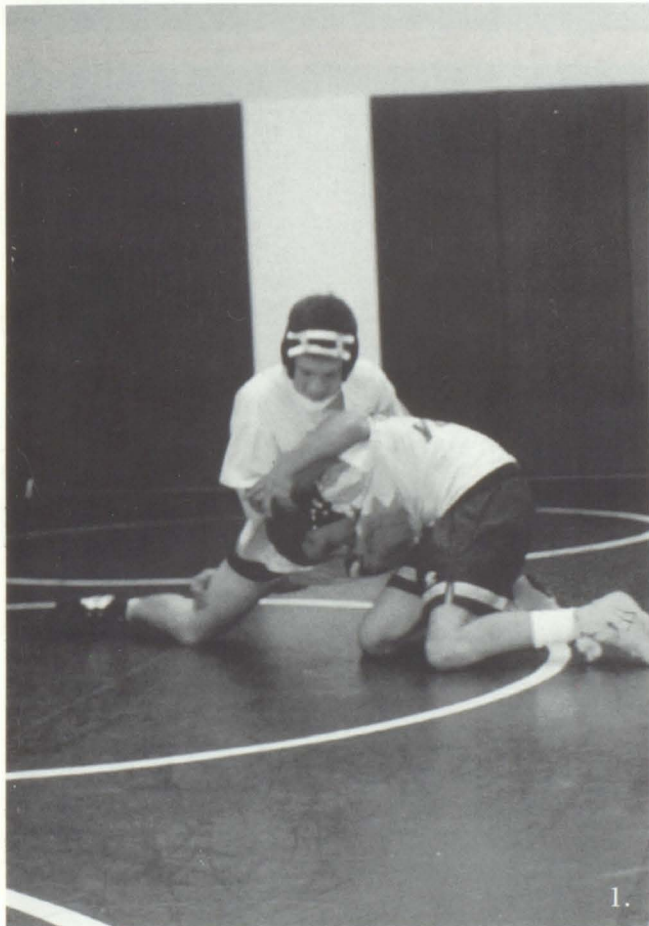
Wrestlers Can't Be Beat Another NEC Title for 1996

the addition. The construction for the lounge is set to begin during the summer.

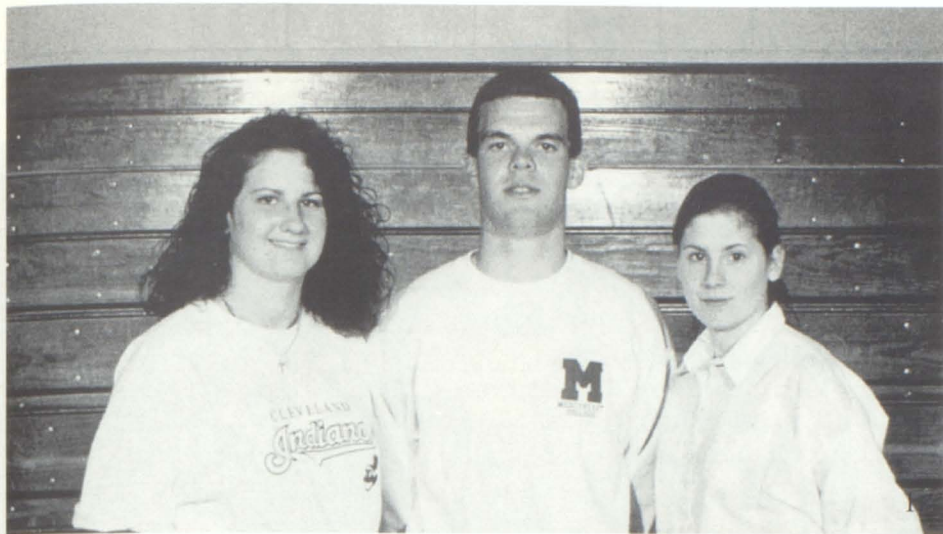

provided students with the opportunity to have fun while servicing their community."

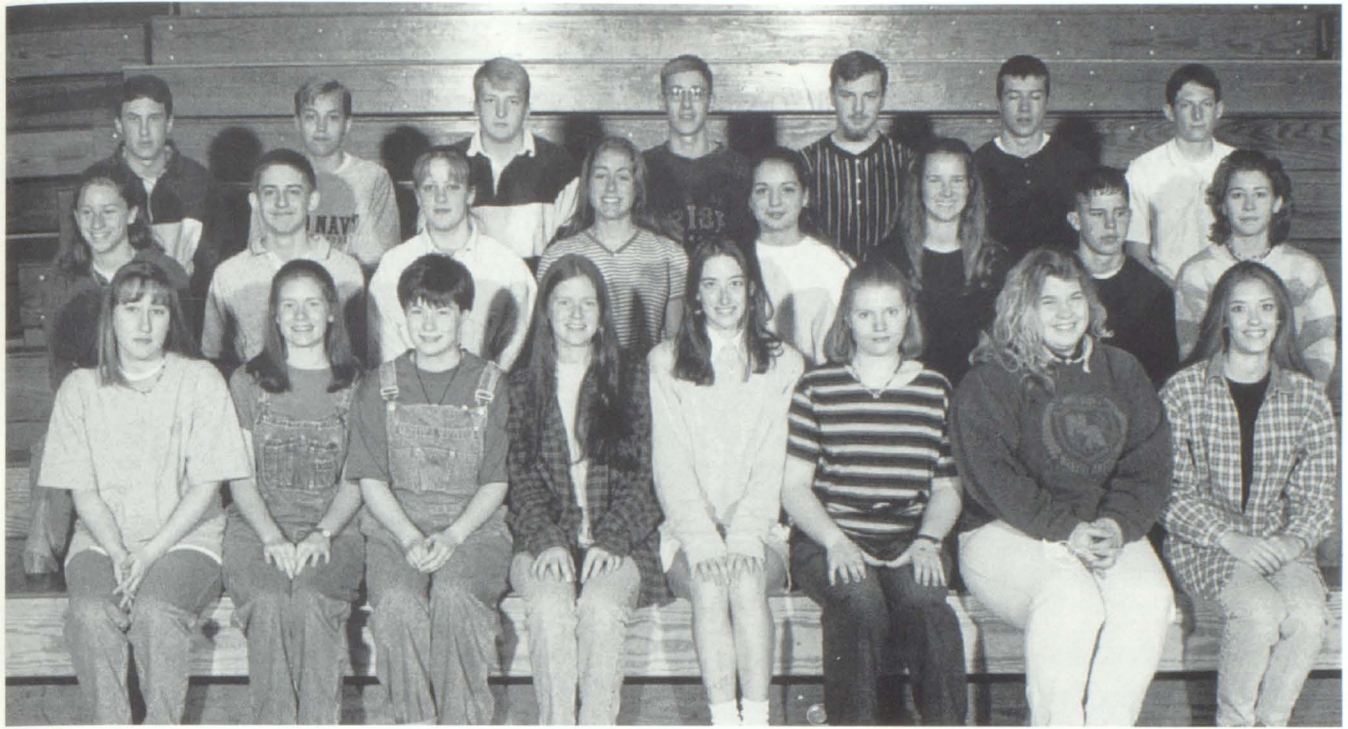

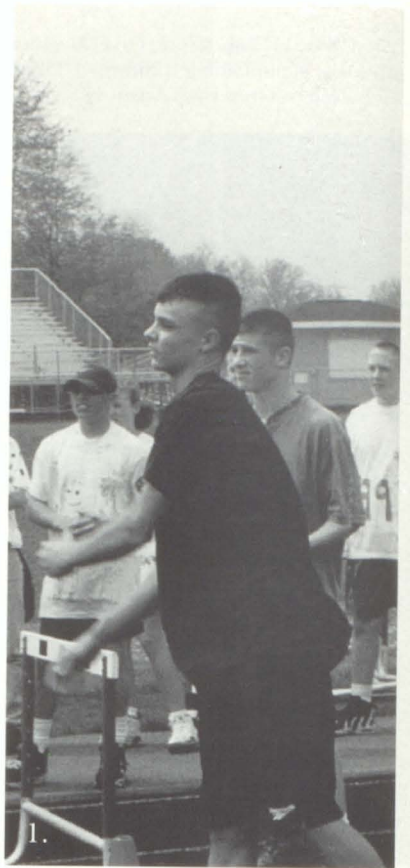

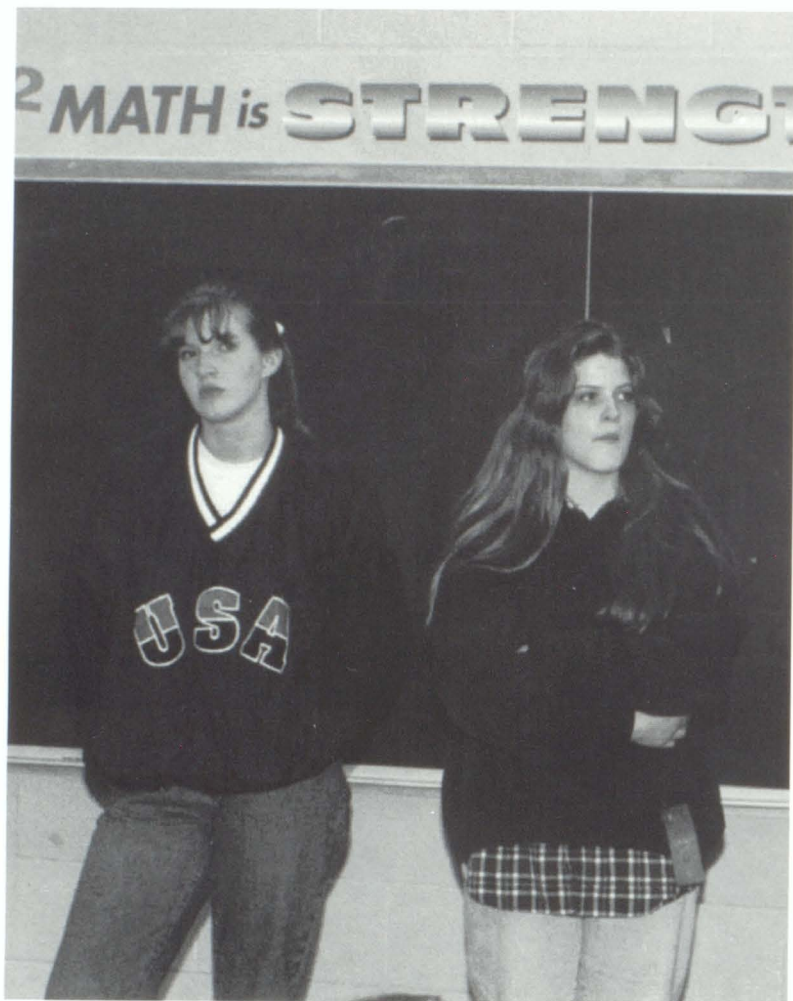

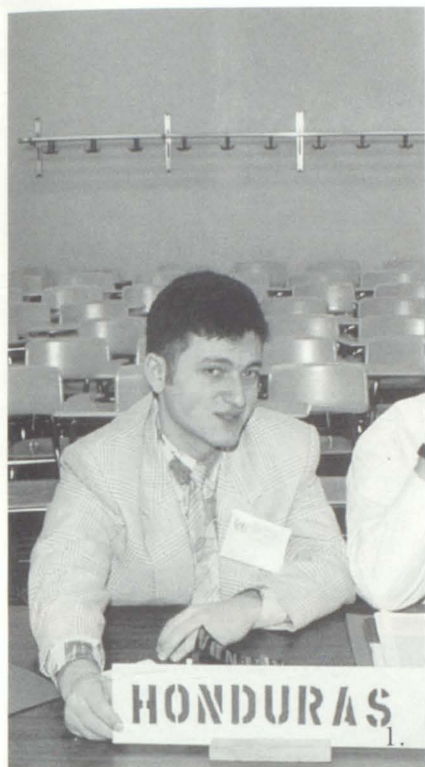

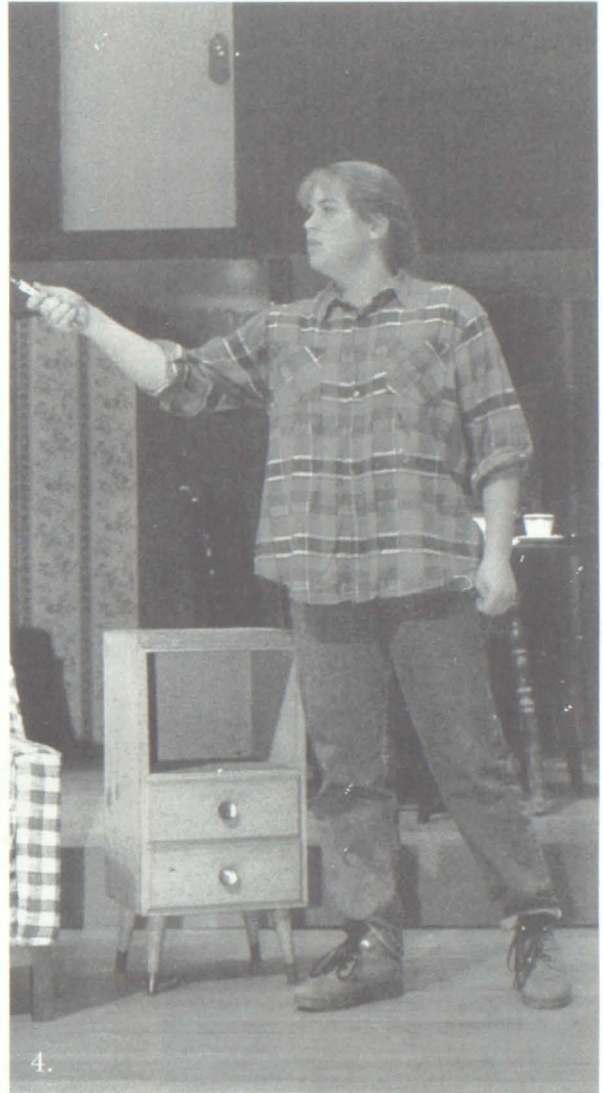

Boys and Girls State Create a Page in History



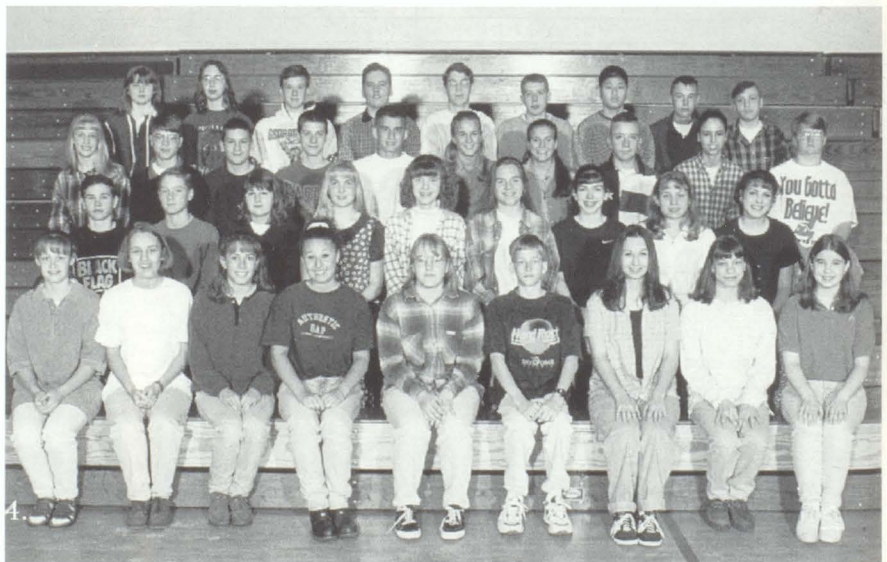
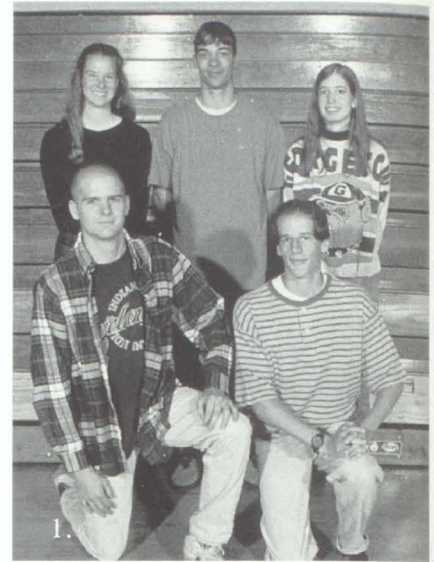

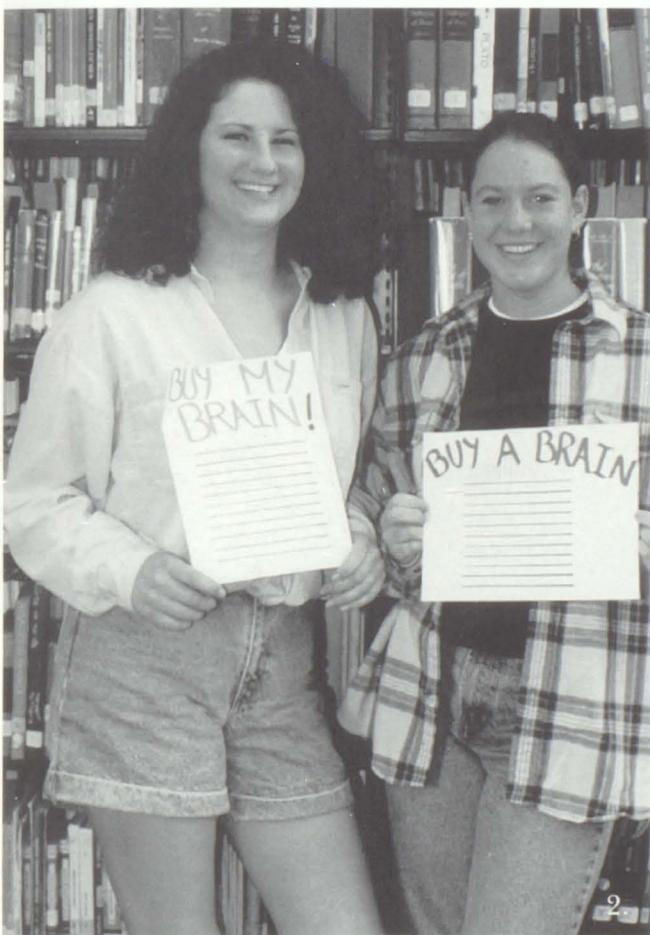

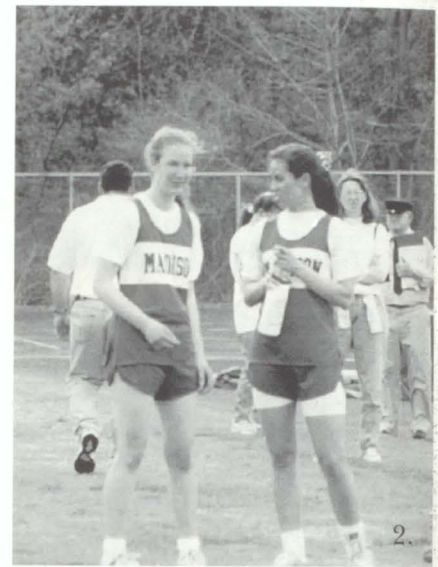


A Championship Season

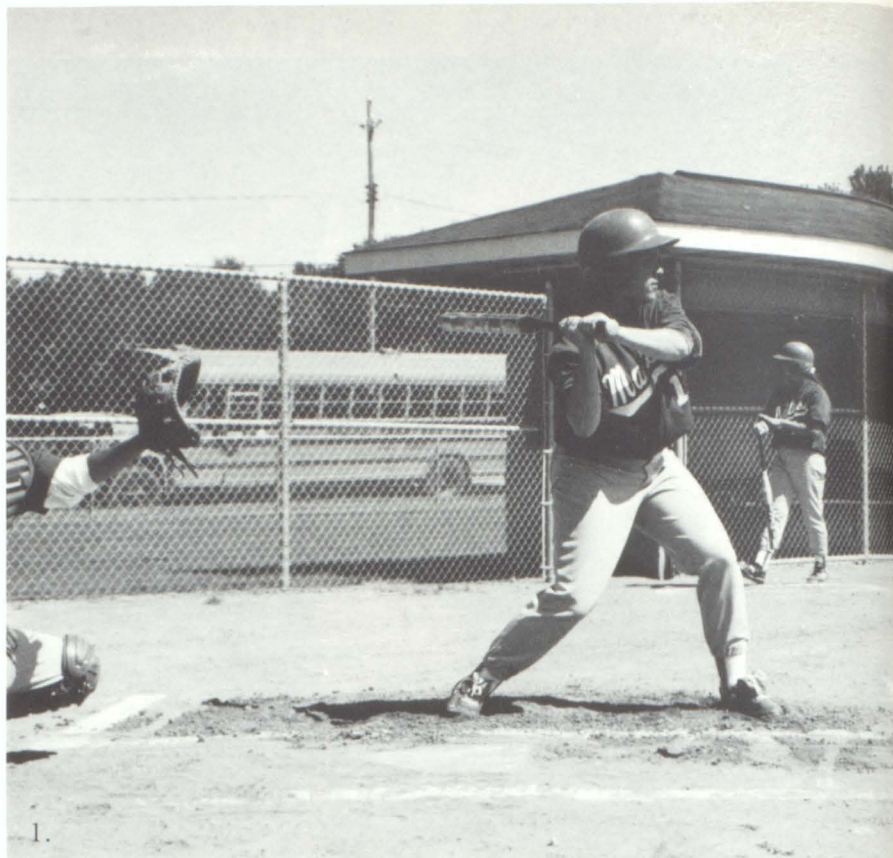

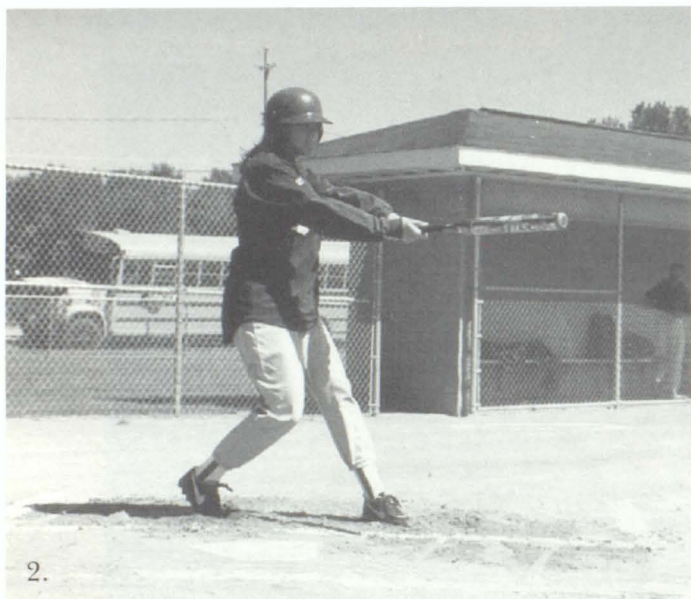

Softball Endures Close Games

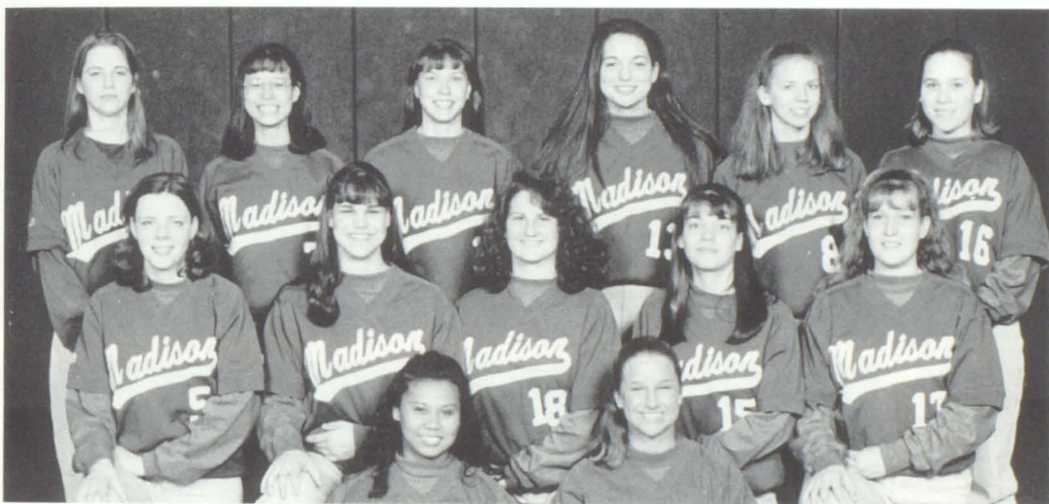

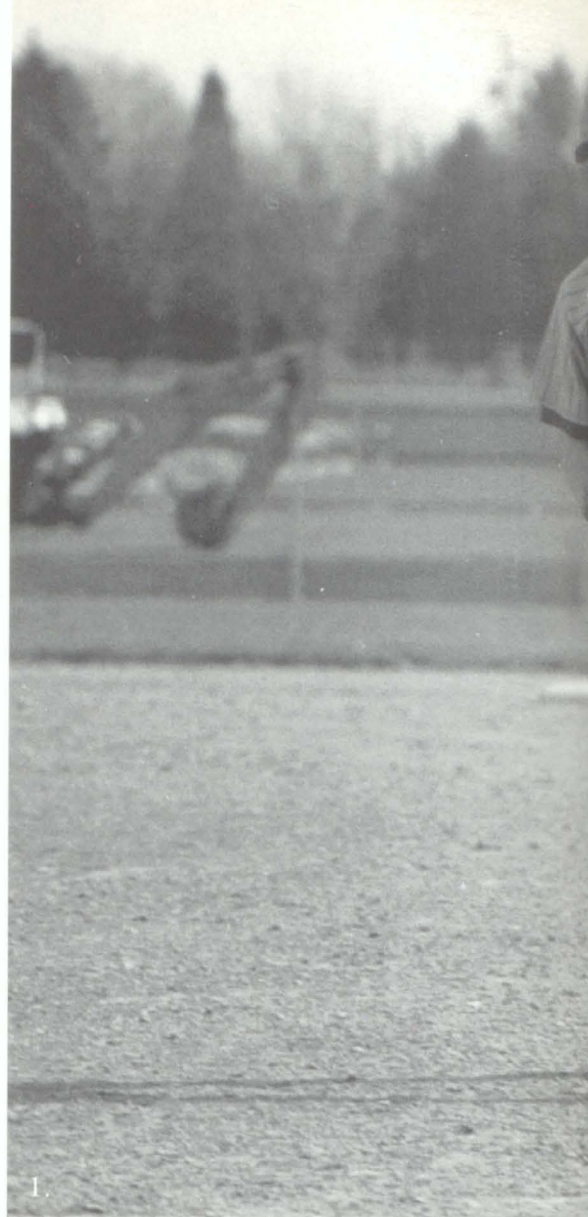

Teamwork Equals Wins for Boys

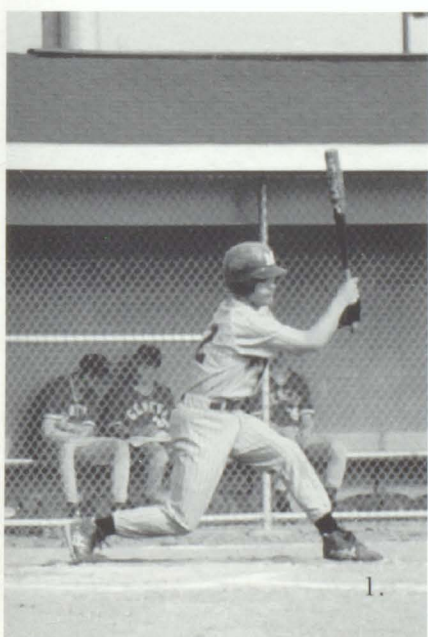
Reaching their goal of being as good—or better—than last year, the varsity baseball team of '96 looked good in the run for the championship.

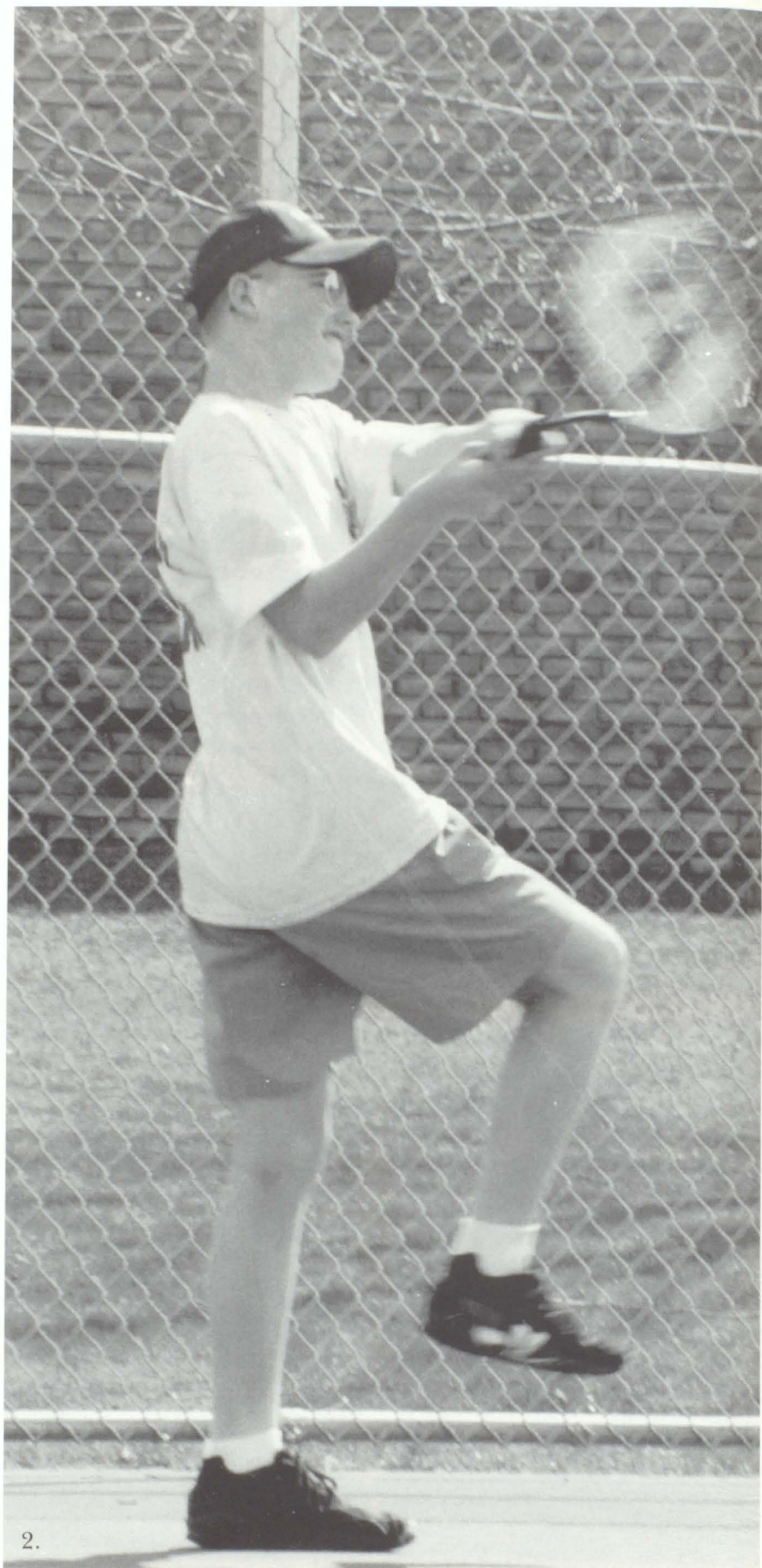

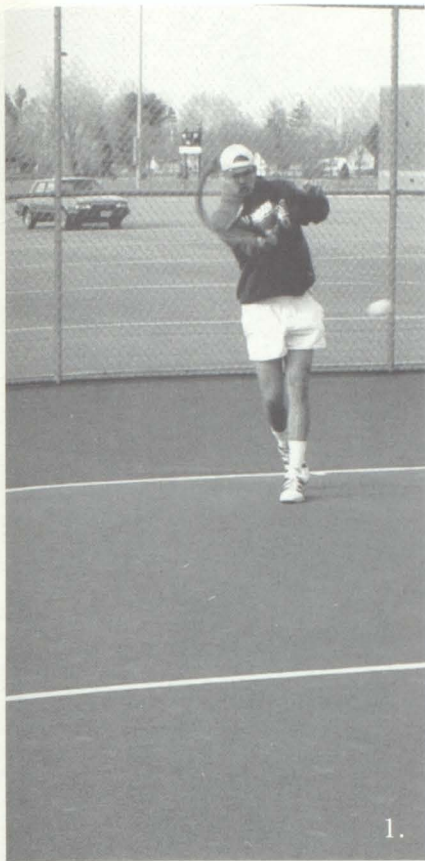

Tennis Serves Up a Surprise



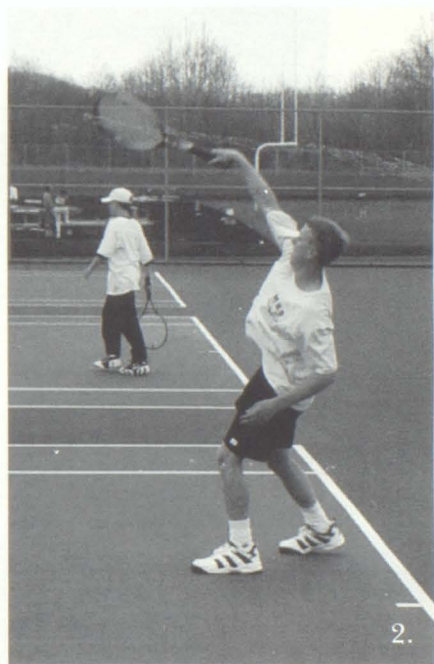

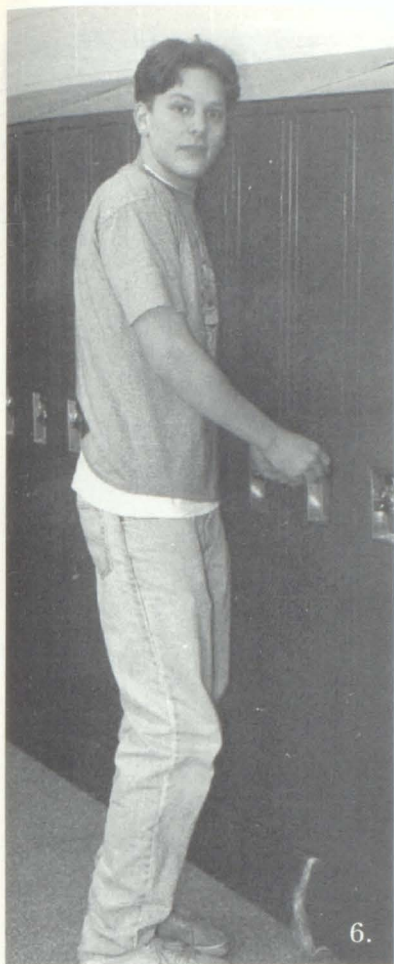


1. Scha-wing! Junior Matt Jameson returns a serve.
