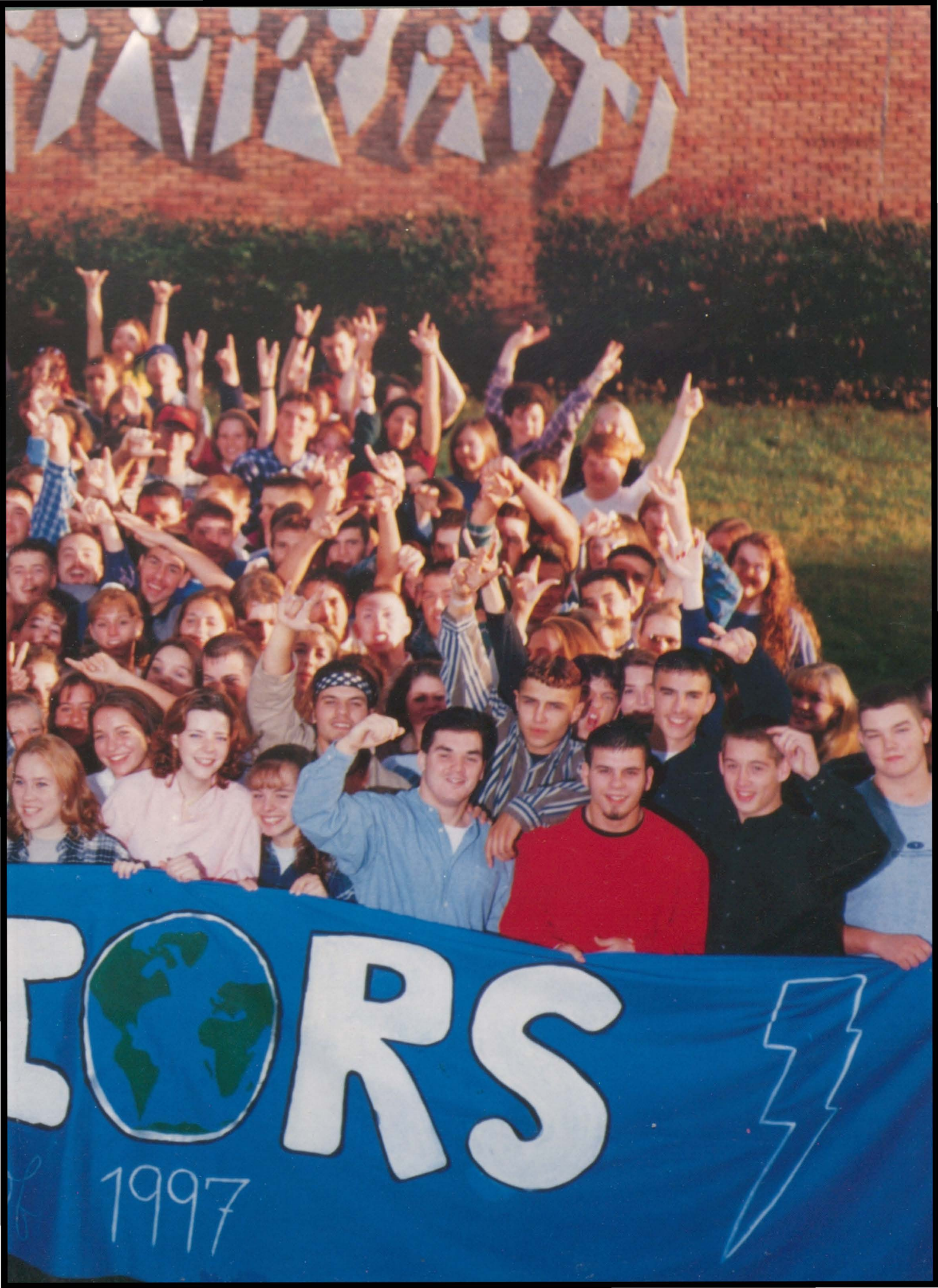

Seniors Step Up and Out



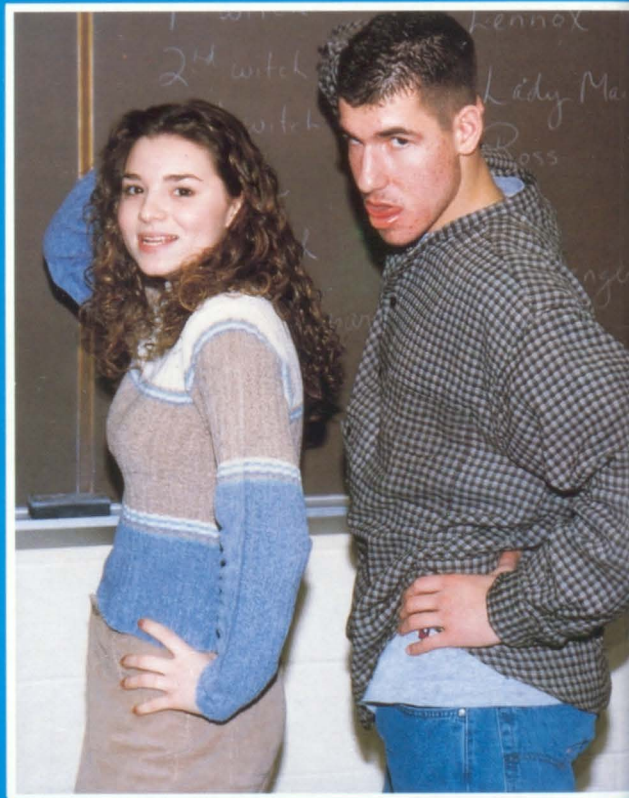

sponsor the Junior/Senior Prom. They sold candy and held other fund-raisers to help fund their annual end-of-the-year class trip. The

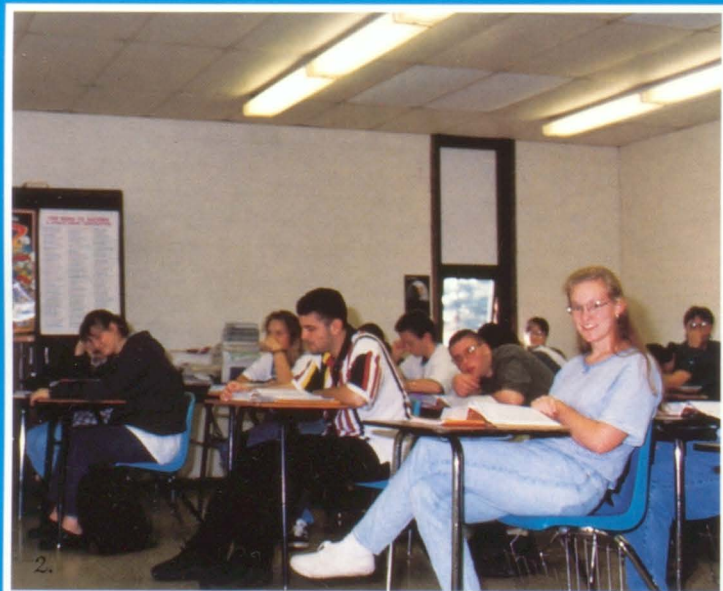

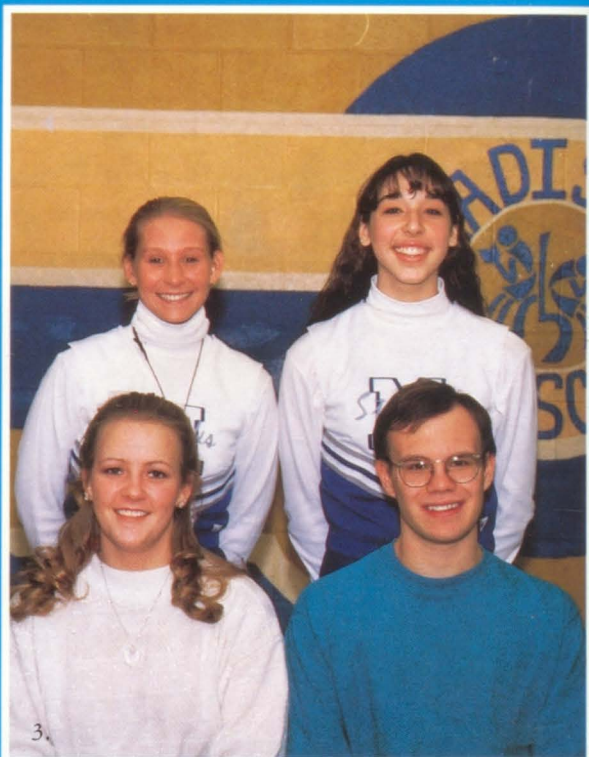
but, for the most part, they are respectful," Ms. Jackson commented on the Class of '98.

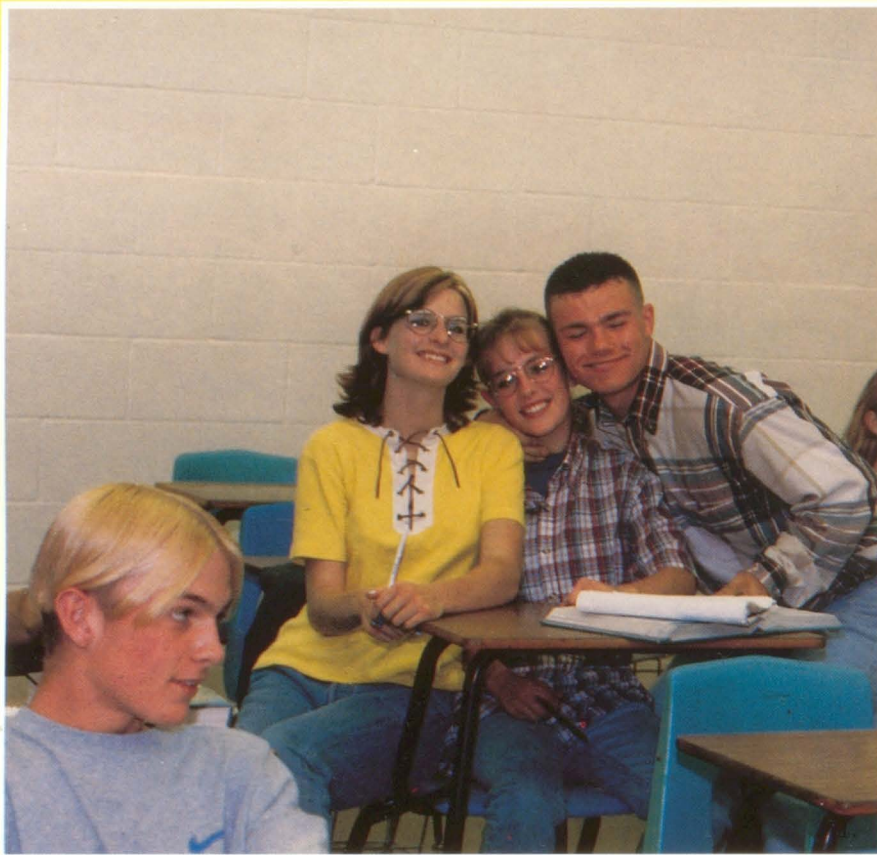
Sophomores Settle into the World

chose as their favorite teachers Mr. Hance and Mr. Loeffel, who praised his class by saying, "This is a very pleasant and personal group of students to work with."

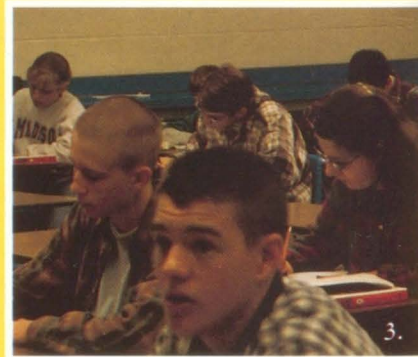
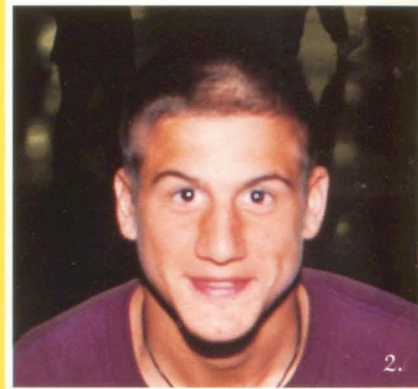

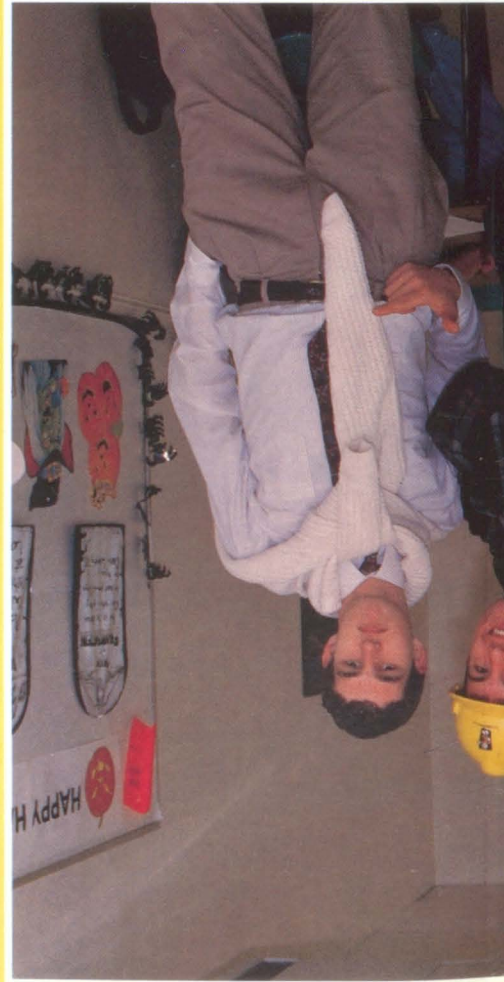

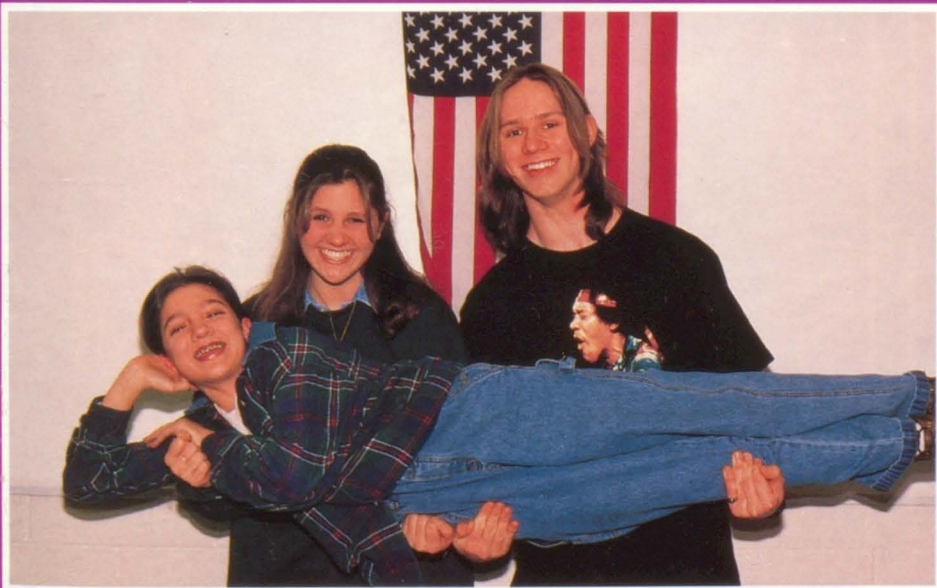

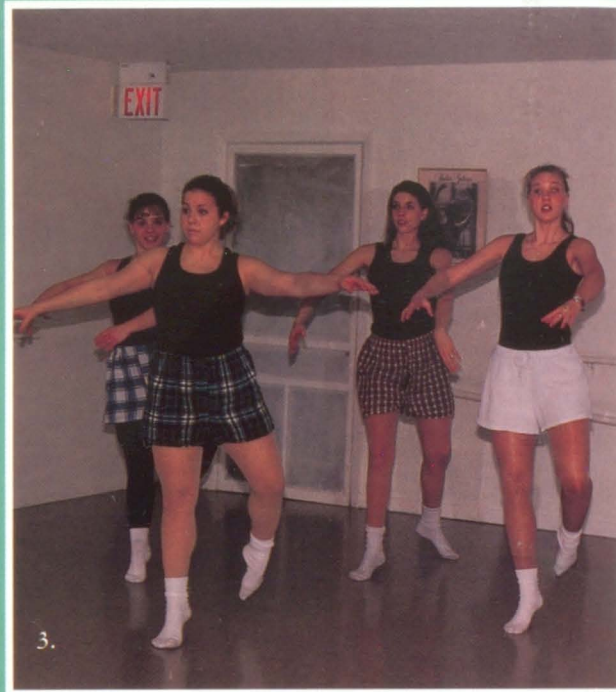

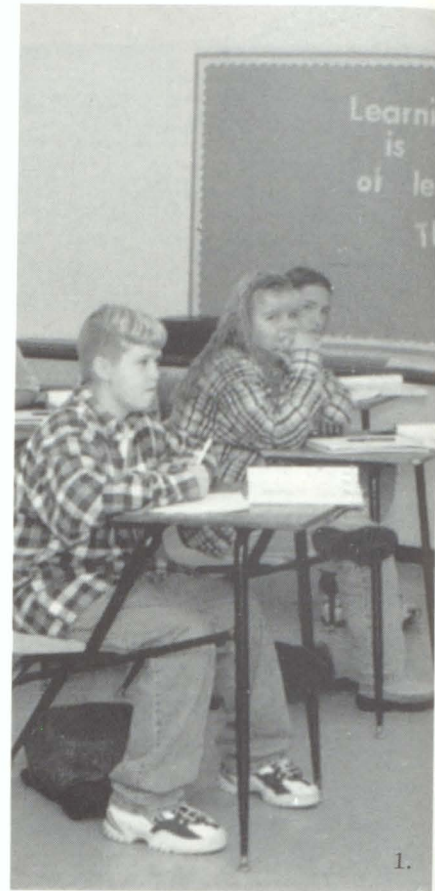
Math and Science Explore New Frontiers

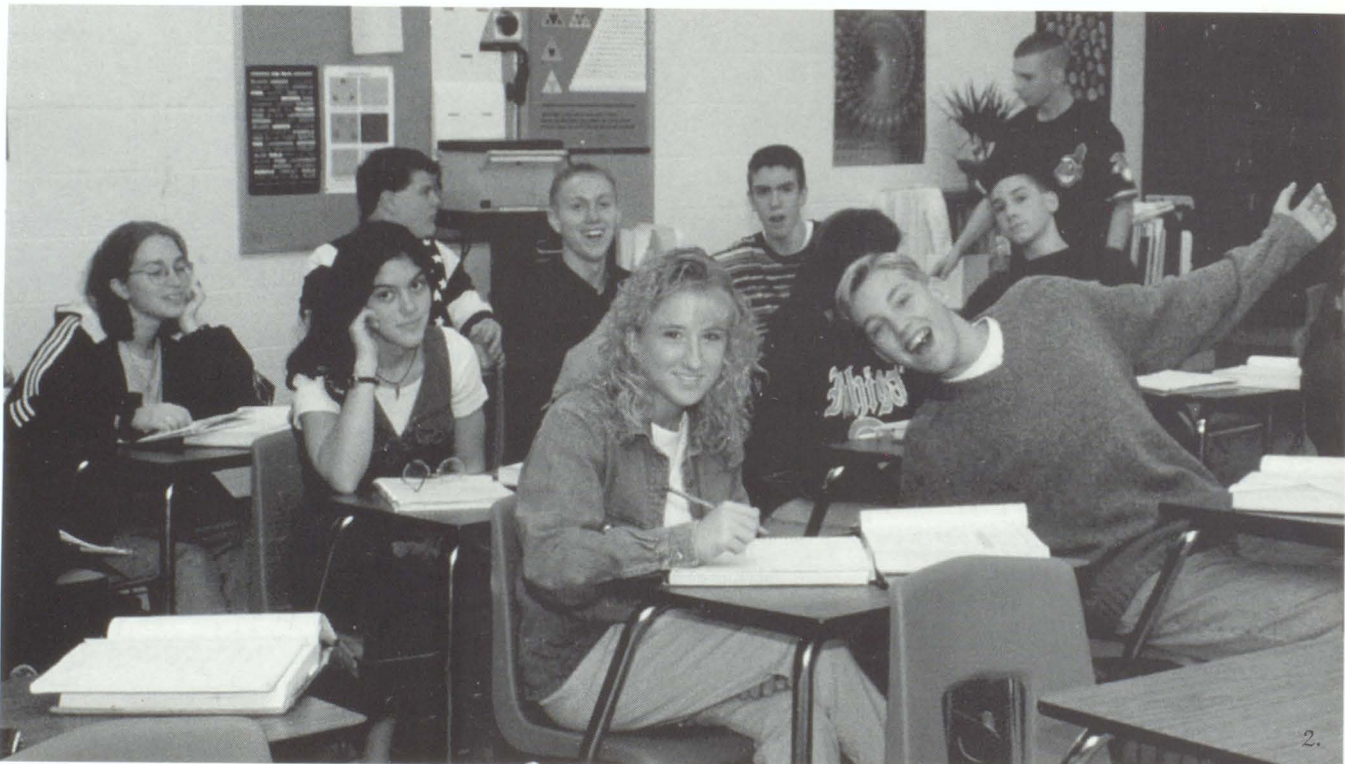

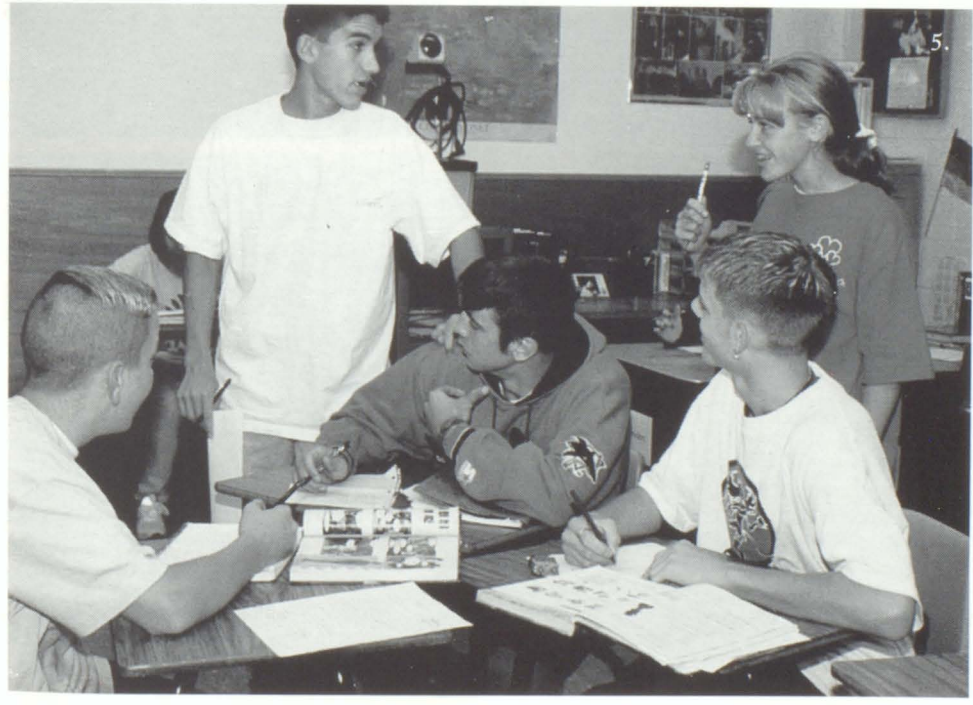
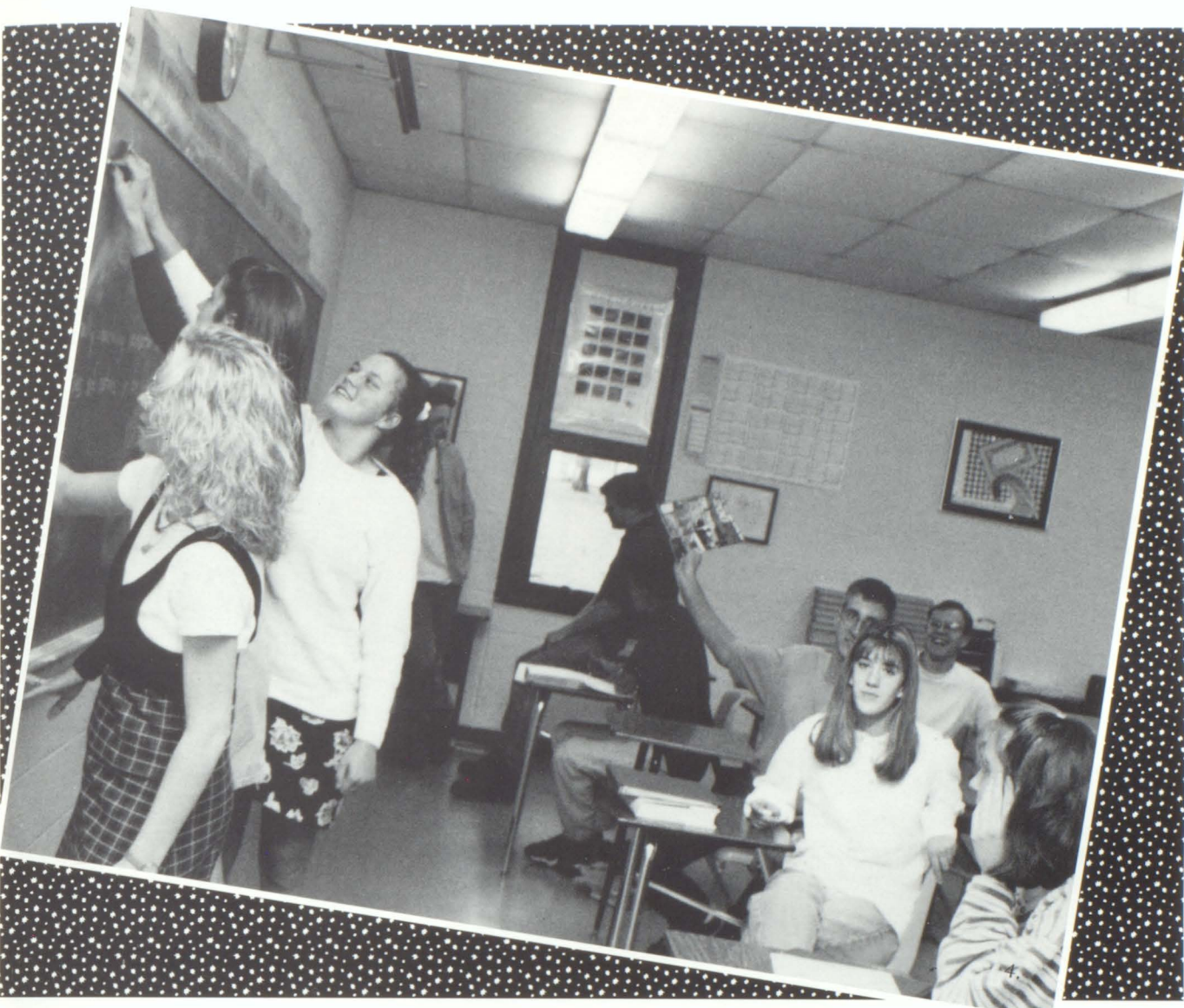
Madison Students Become Multi-lingual

Madison's foreign language department offers three-year programs in French, Spanish, and German. The various teachers — Mrs. Bangerter, French; Mrs. Battes, Spanish; Miss Tenant, Spanish; and Mrs. Dingman, German — used different techniques but all caught the students' attention. 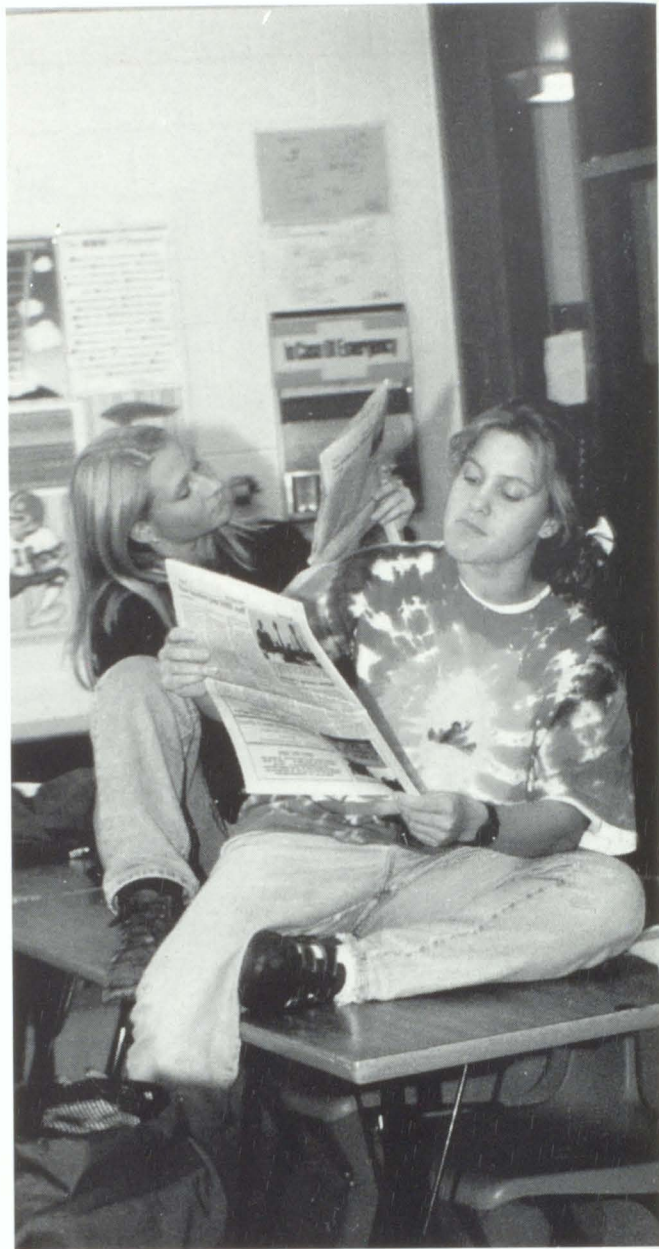

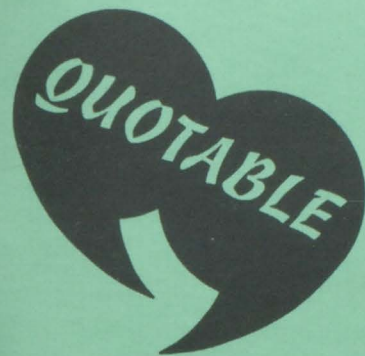

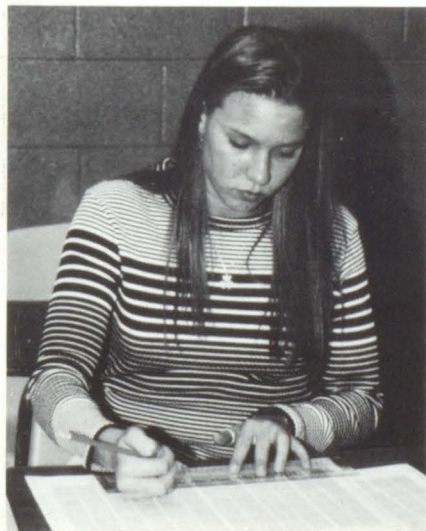
spot color to be placed throughout the yearbook.

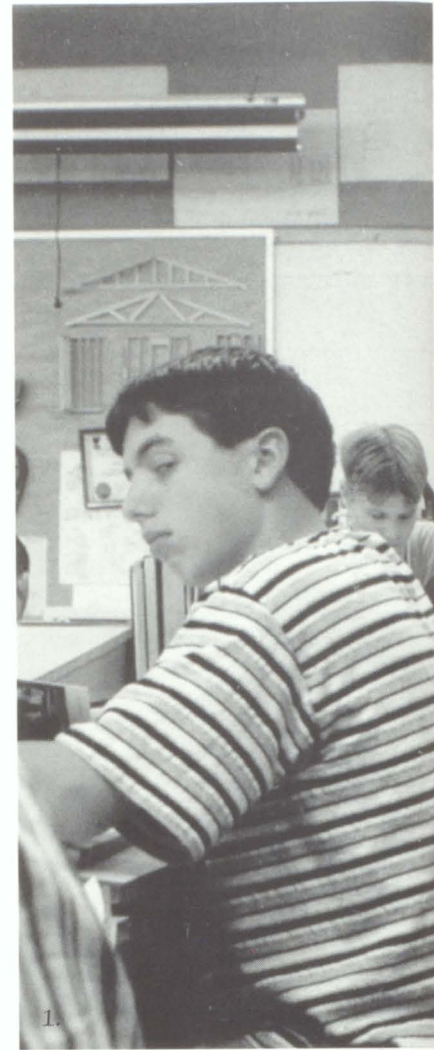

Art and Industrial Art

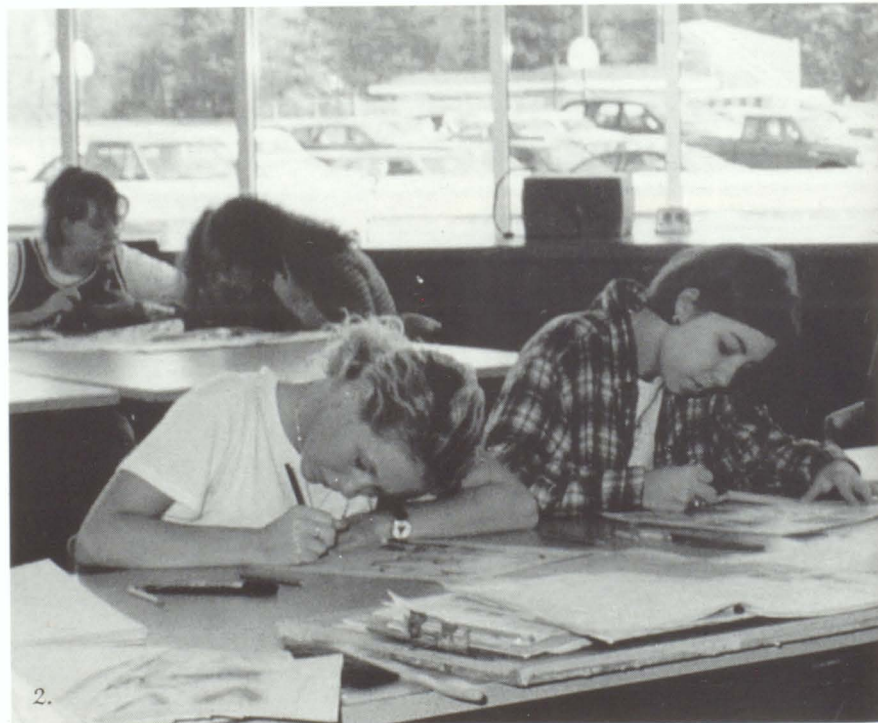

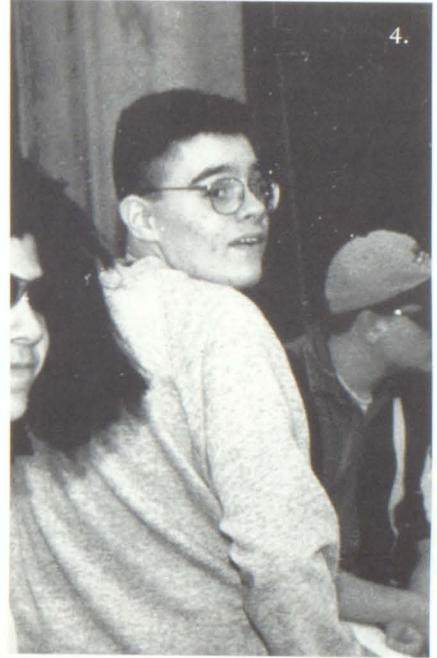

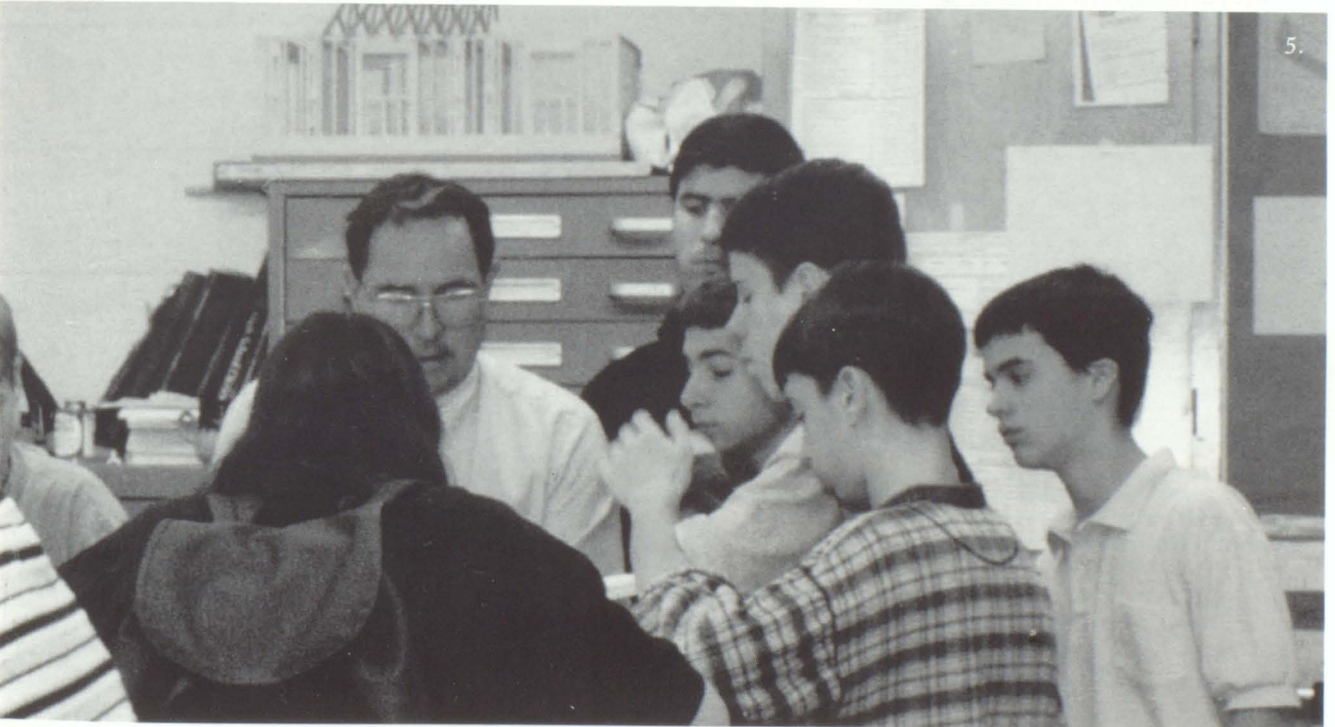

Choir Rocks the World!

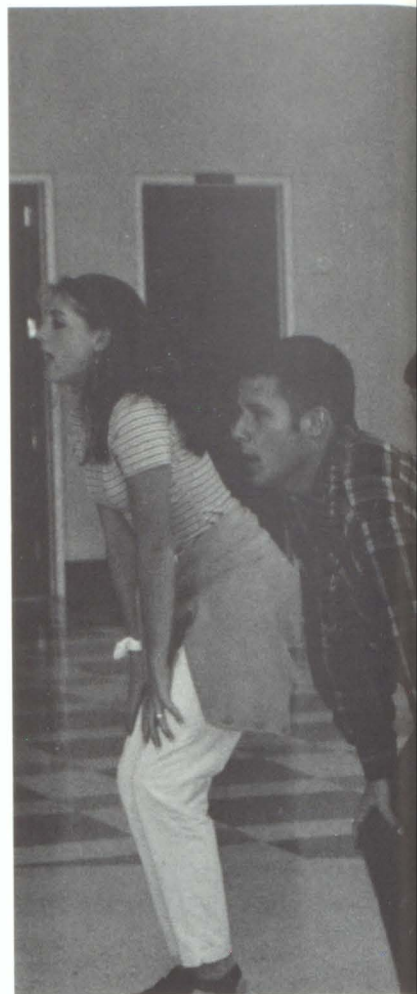

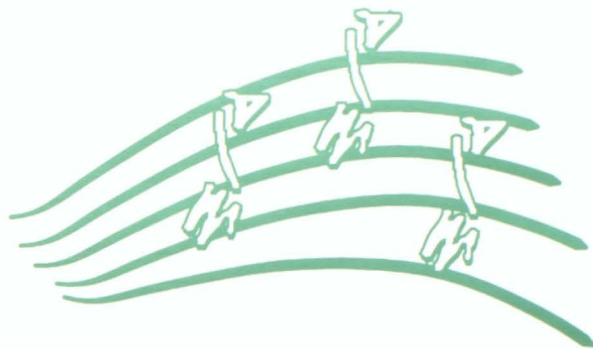
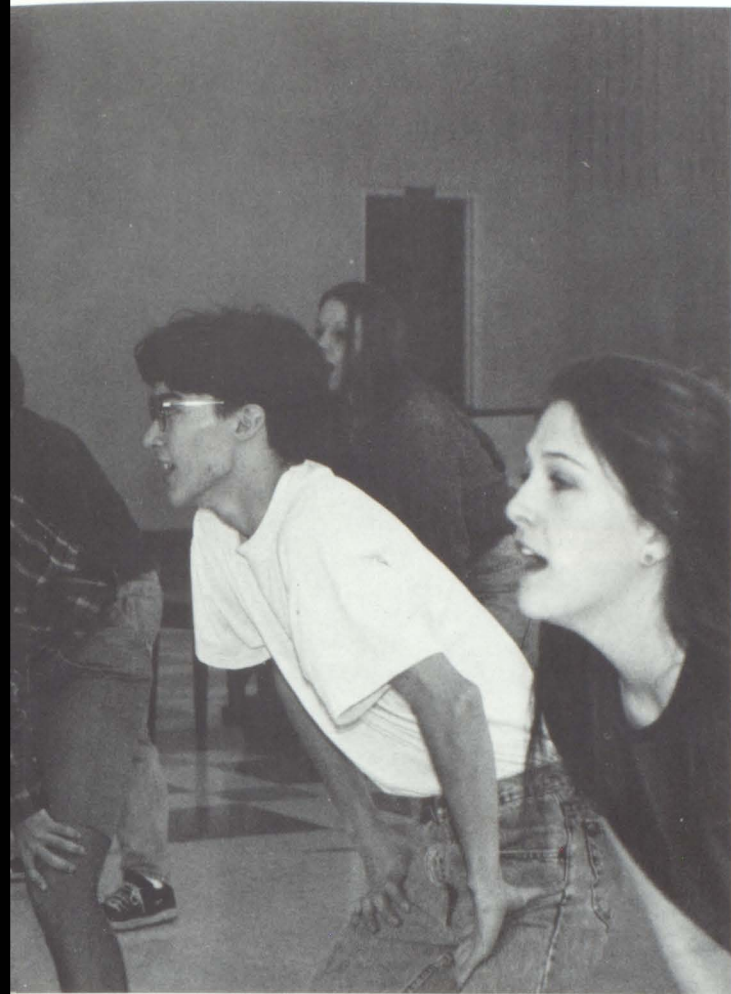

Bands and Majorettes Perform to Please

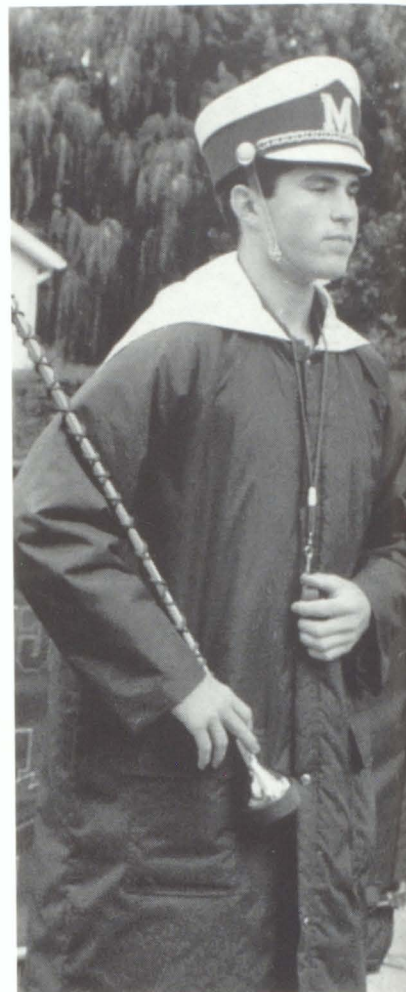

Auburn Career Center Pushes Students in the Right Direction

Auburn Career Center, a vocational school for Madison and other students from Lake County schools, teaches valuable skills that make them employable after graduation. Not just any student can attend A.C.C.! A student must fill out an application and have it approved before attending Auburn. After being accepted, students must also maintain a good attendance record: they can only miss up to nine days per semester. Only juniors and

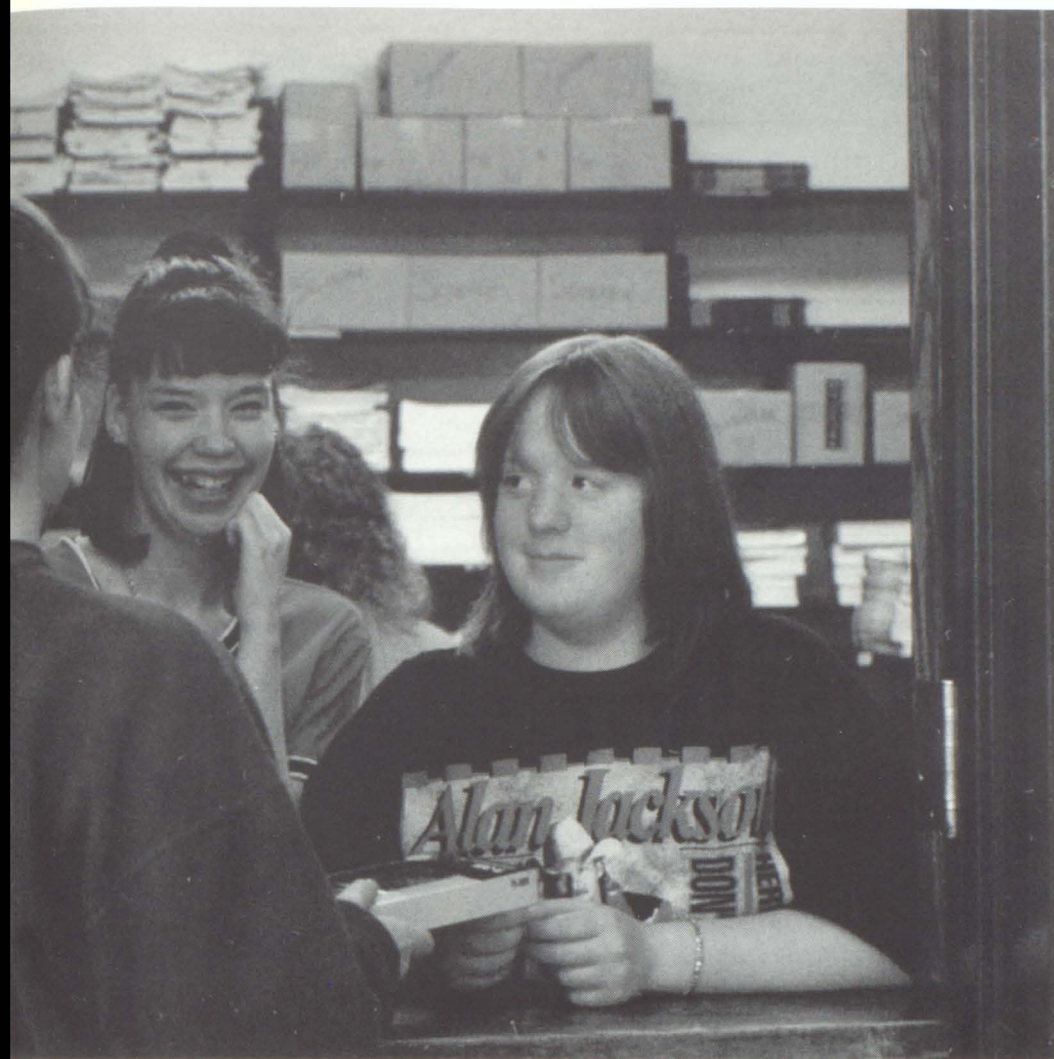

one basis so that they get all the positive encouragement they need in order to behave appropriately. The SBH program is a beneficial addition to Madison High School.



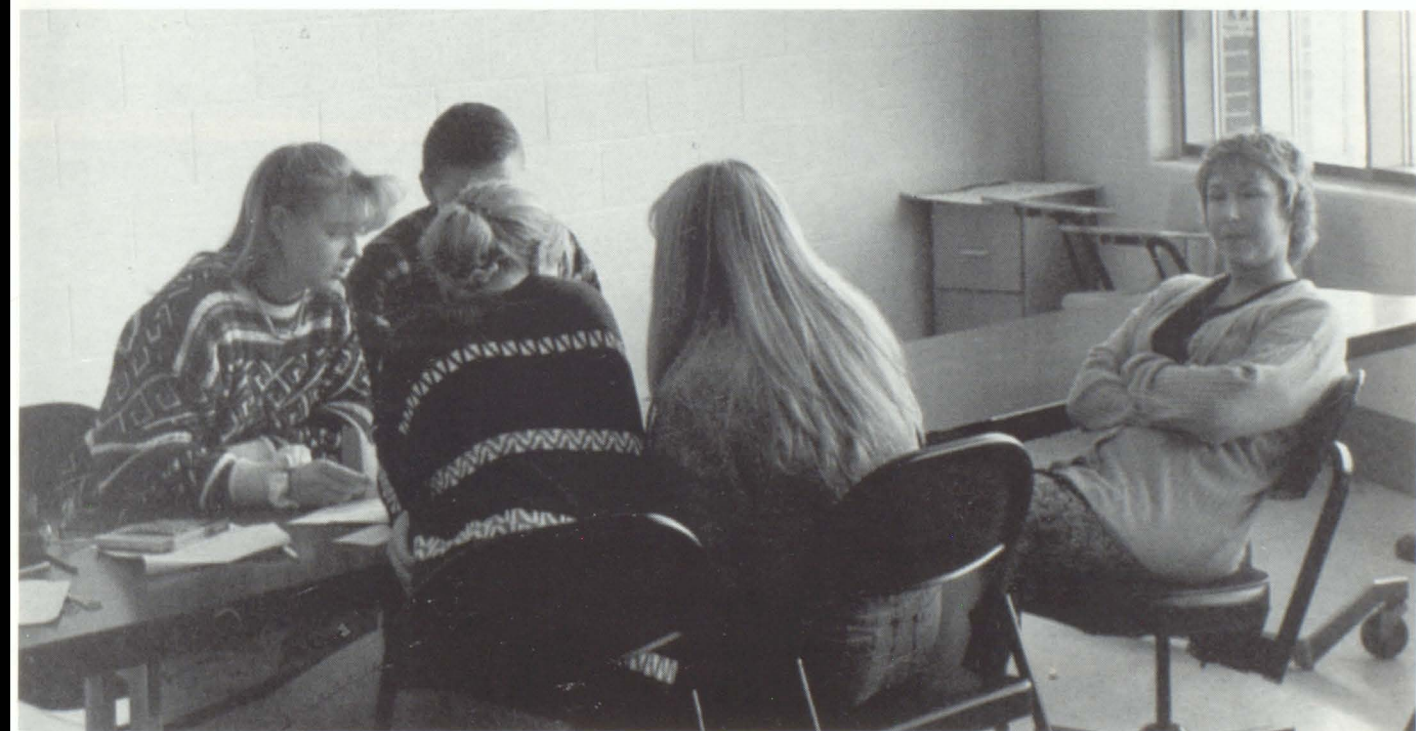

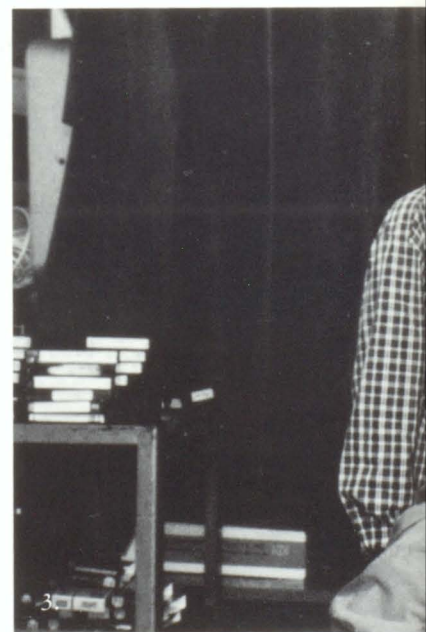

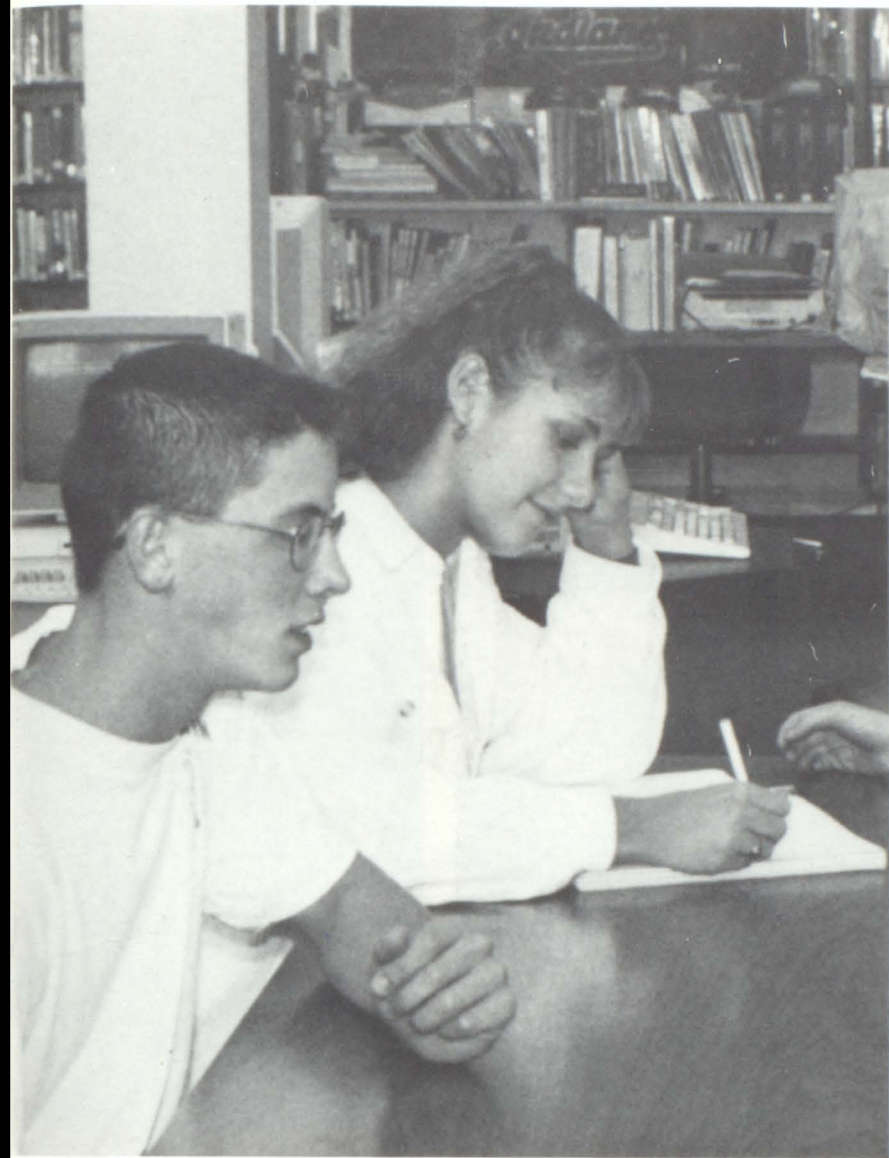
"You can learn a lot in AV if you apply yourself."

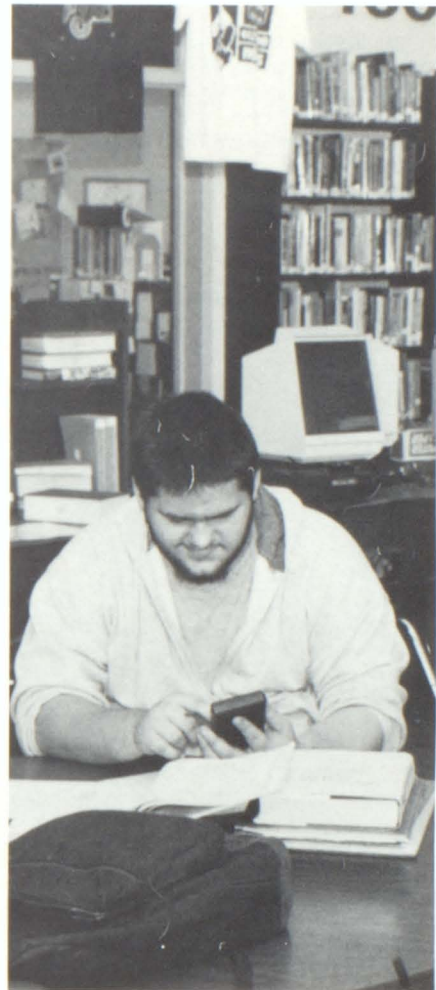

Taking Both NEC & District Titles

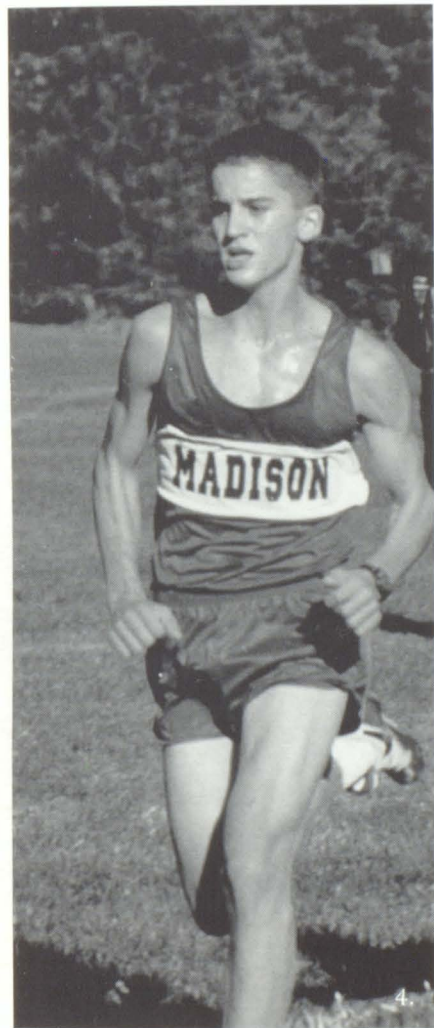

Madison Boys' Varsity Soccer

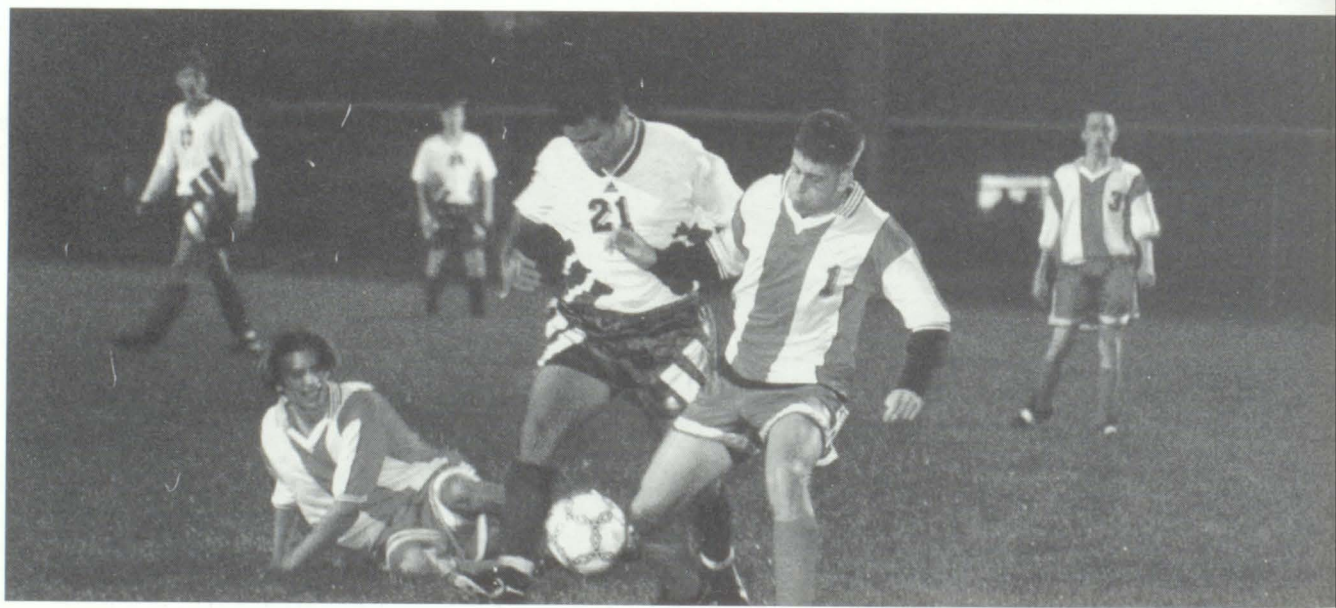

year," commented Stacey Ward. As the seniors depart, the remaining players look forward to next year with high aspirations and goals to achieve.



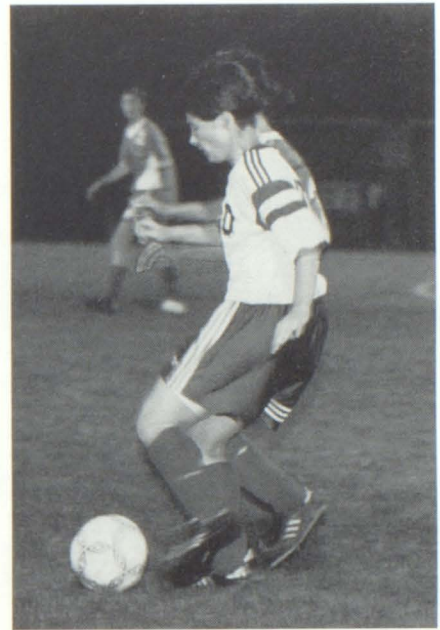

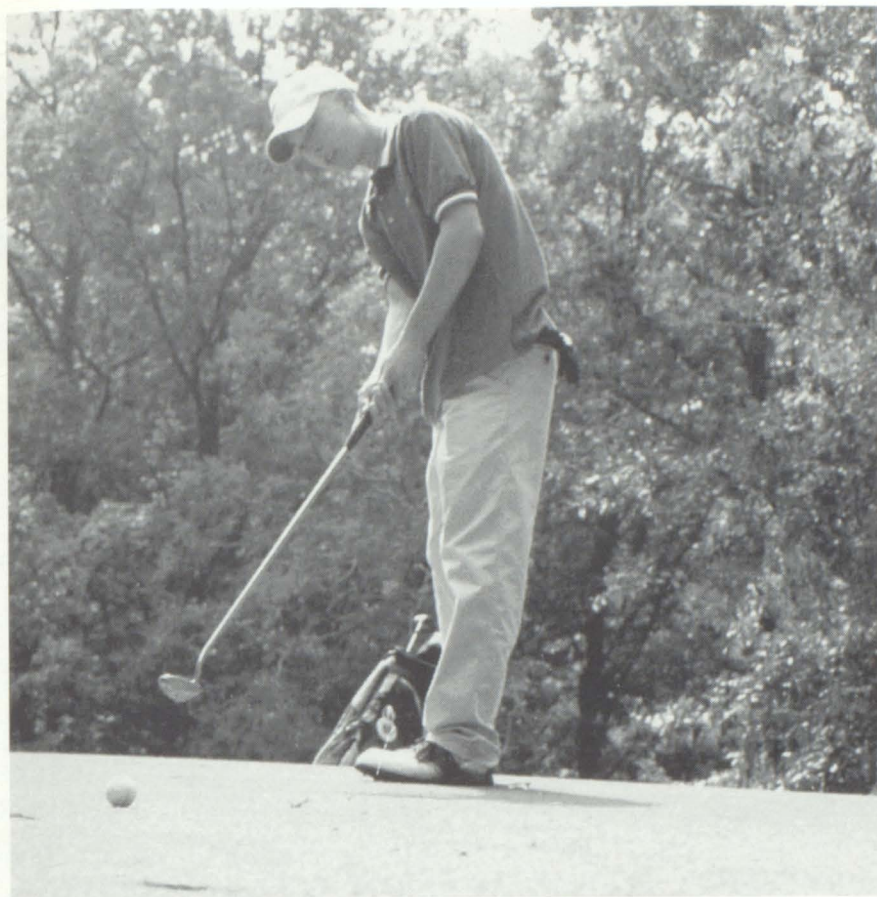

definitely improve and might even win the conference in the future years."

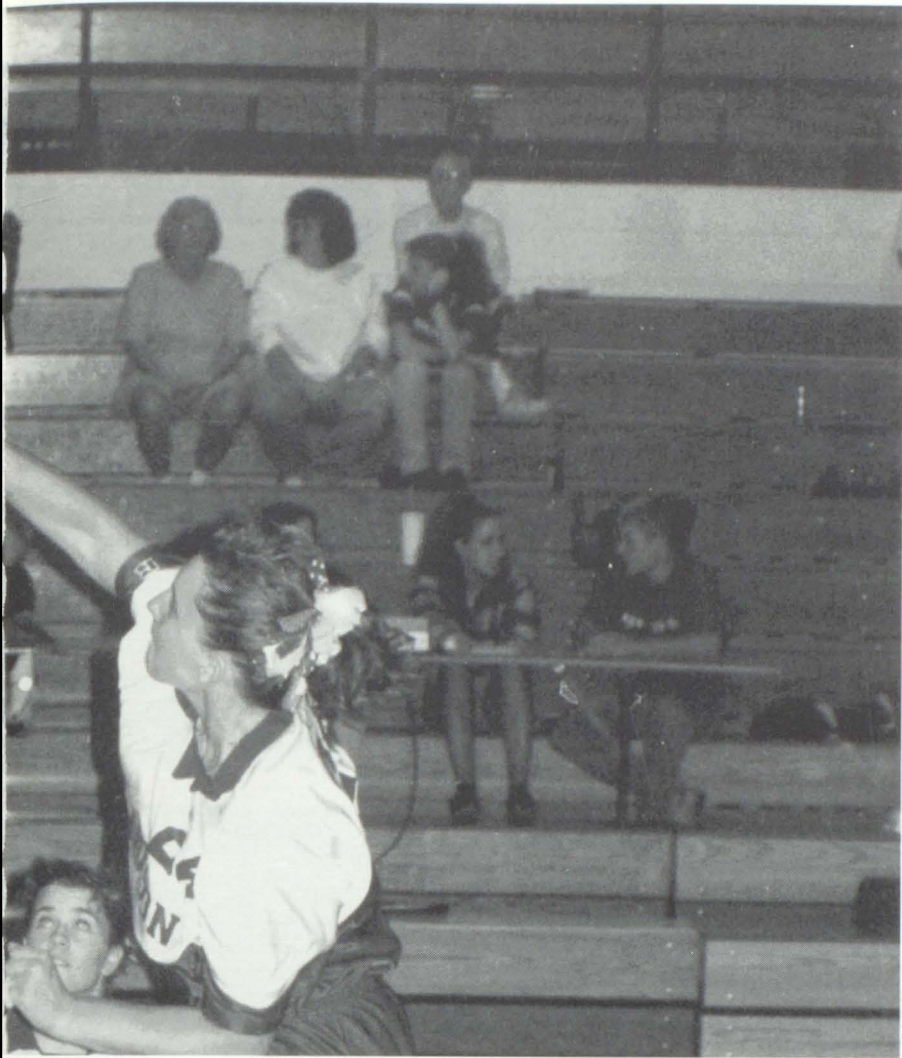

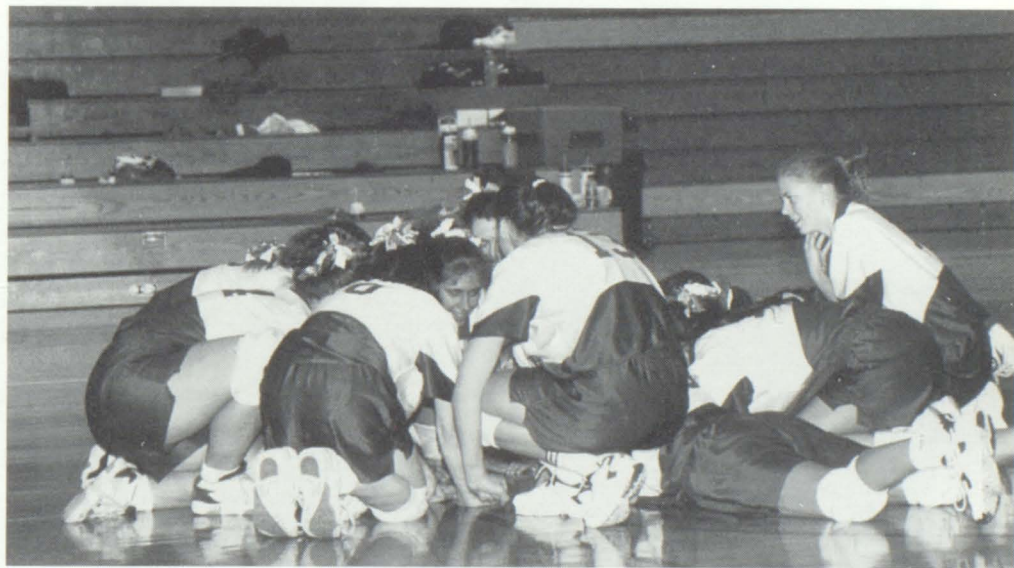

heart and pride."

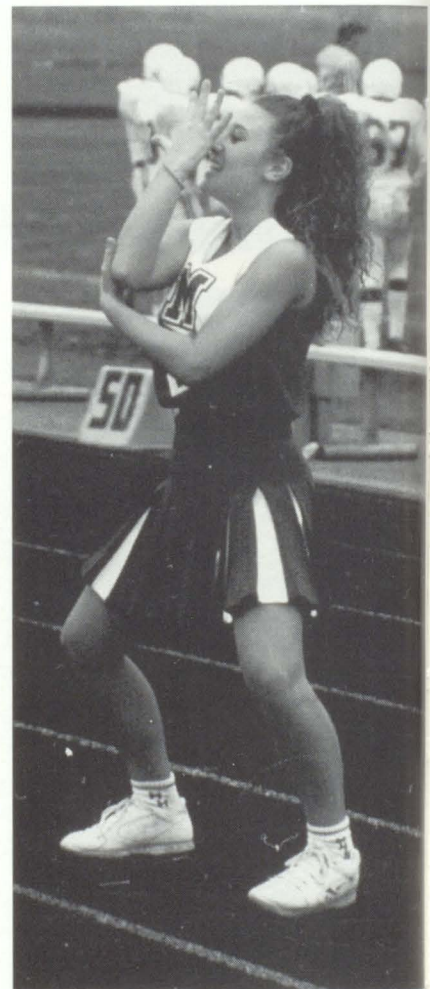

Varsity Football Maintains Winning Tradition

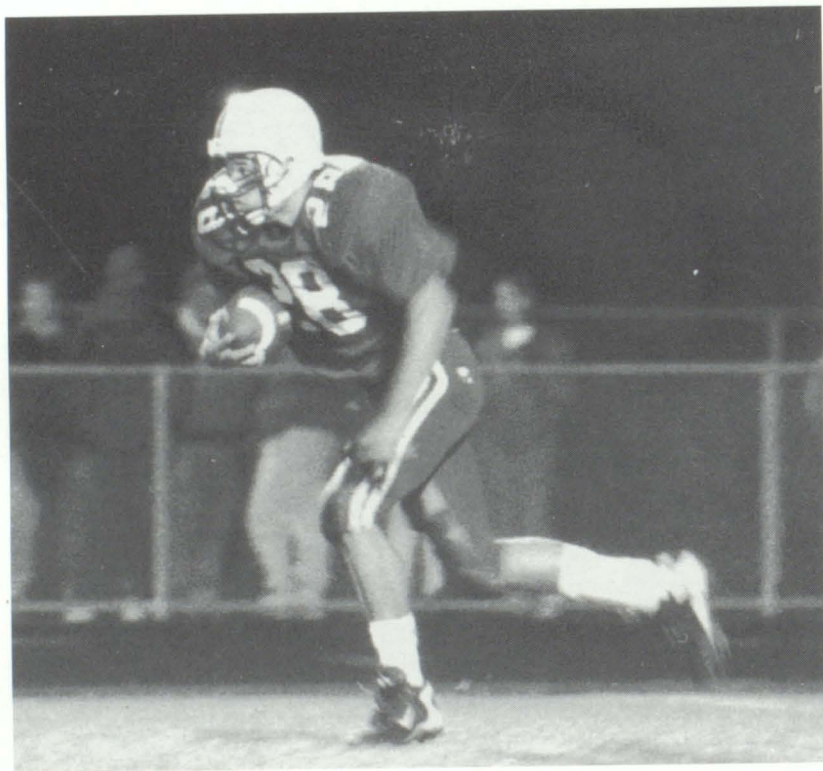

The strong senior line-up included ten starters, seven of whom played both defense and

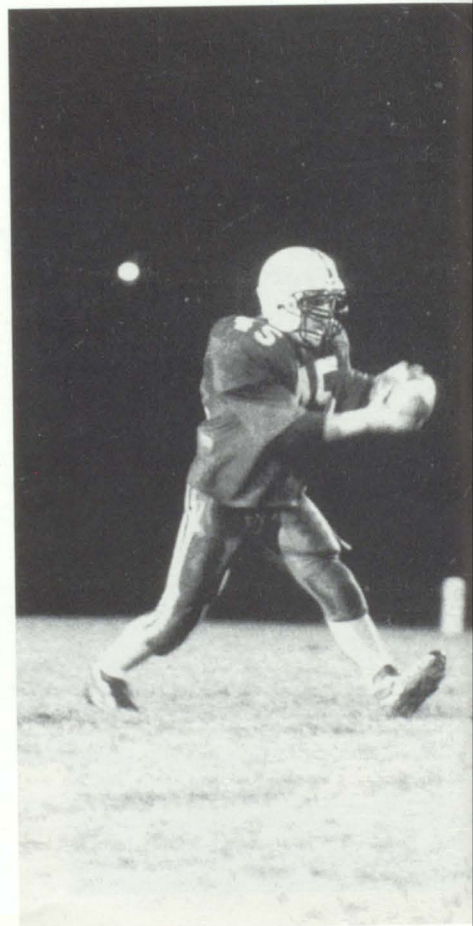
offense. Next year's team will take on the task of rebuilding from the ground up, placing much of the offensive load on the shoulders of a second-year letterman, sophomore Adam

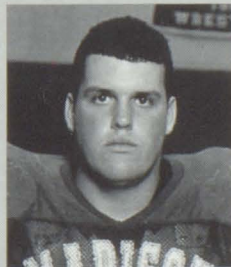

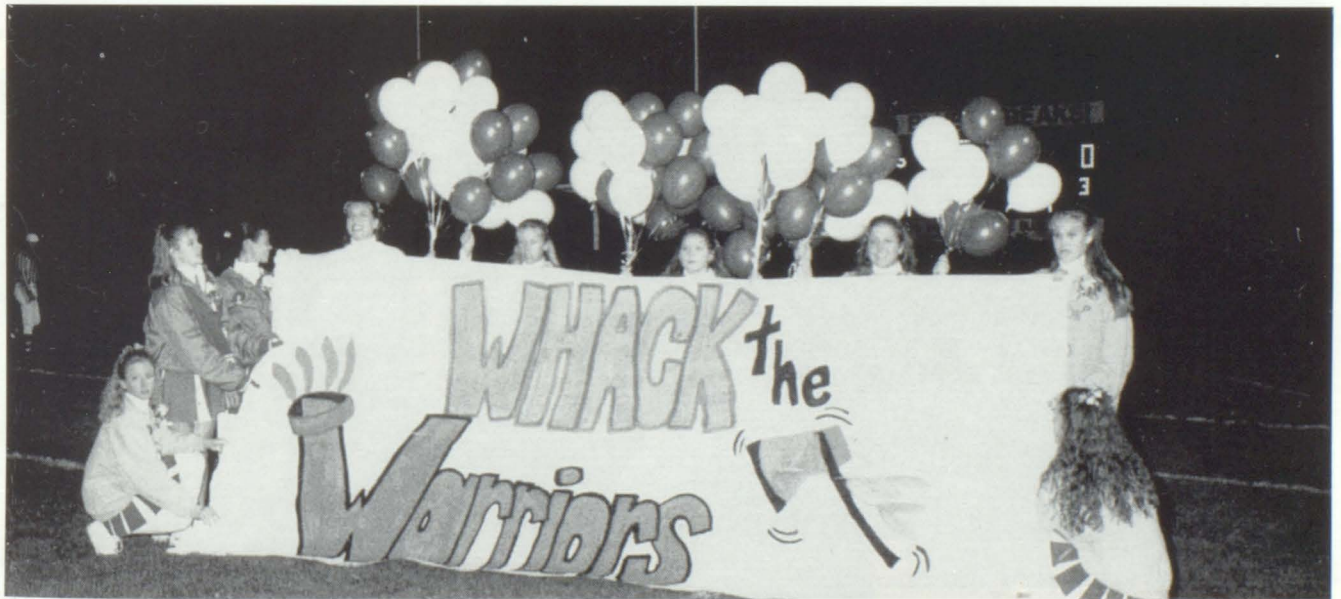

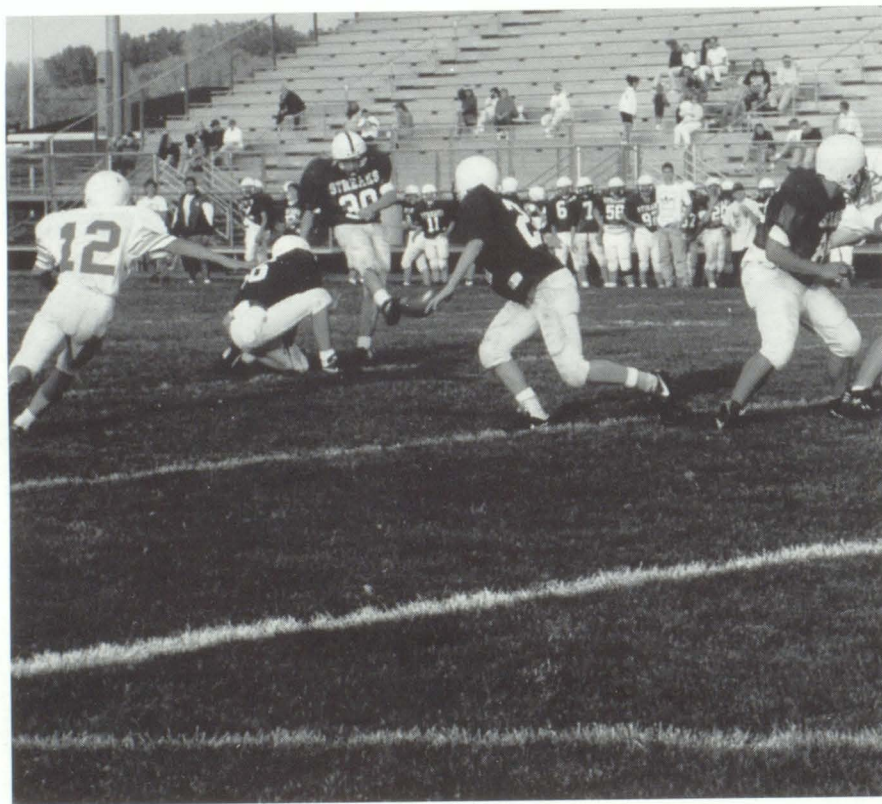

JV and Freshmen Football Make Tracks

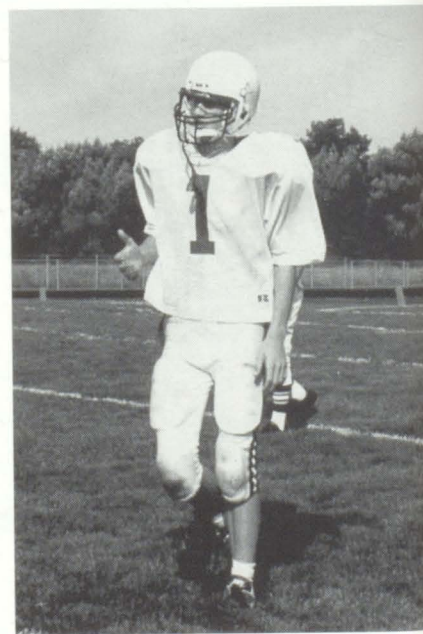

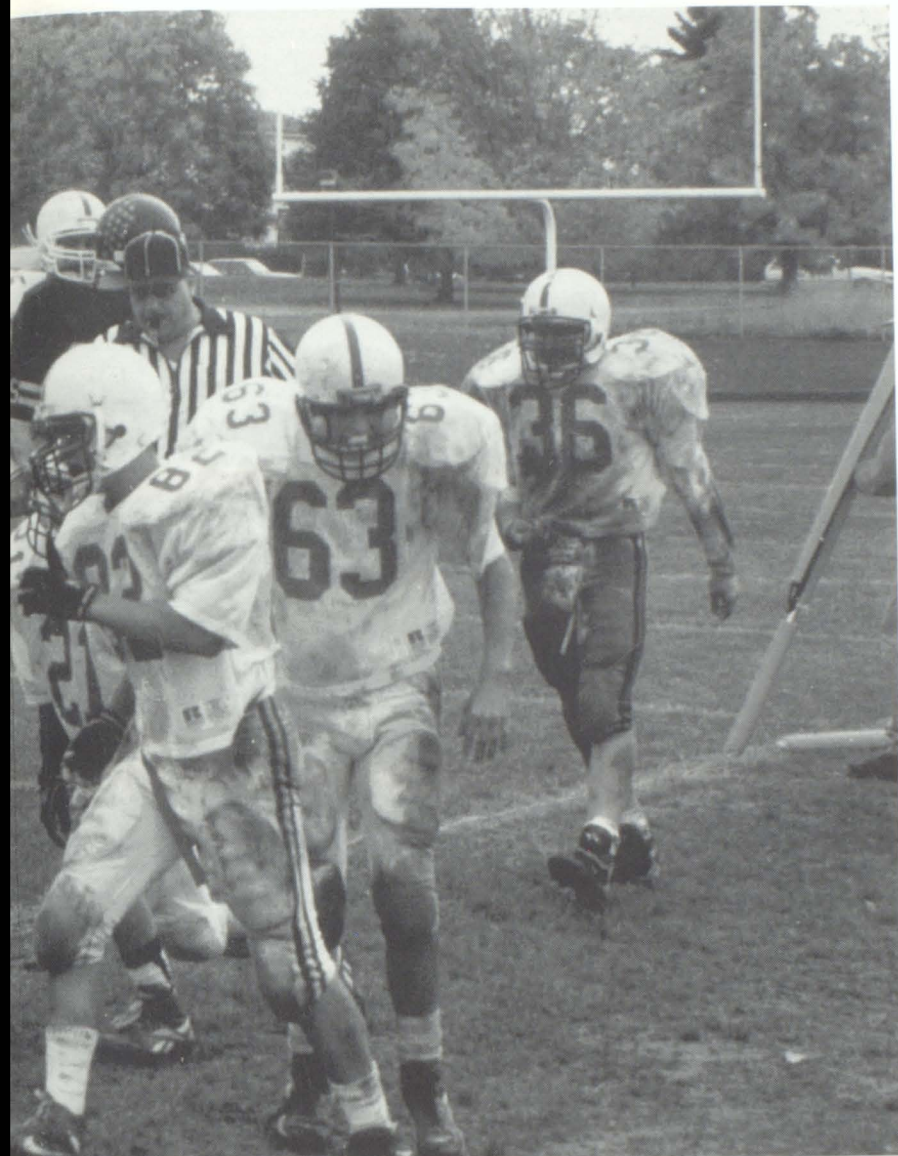

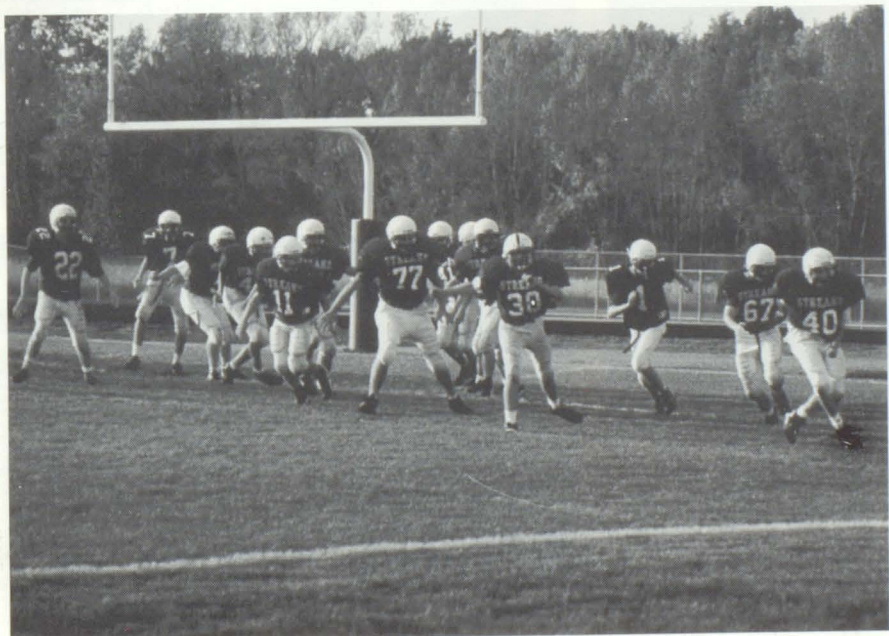

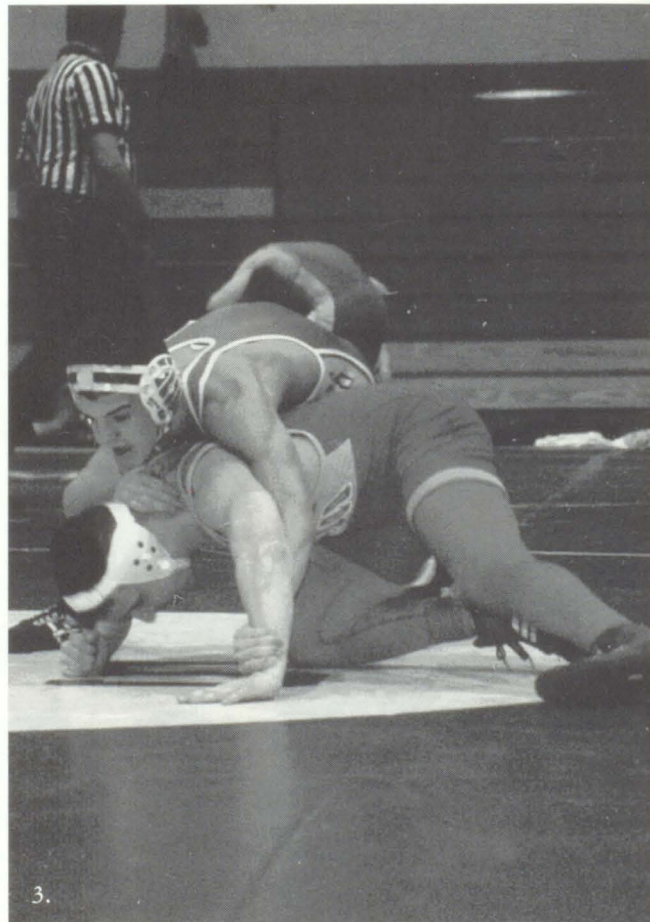
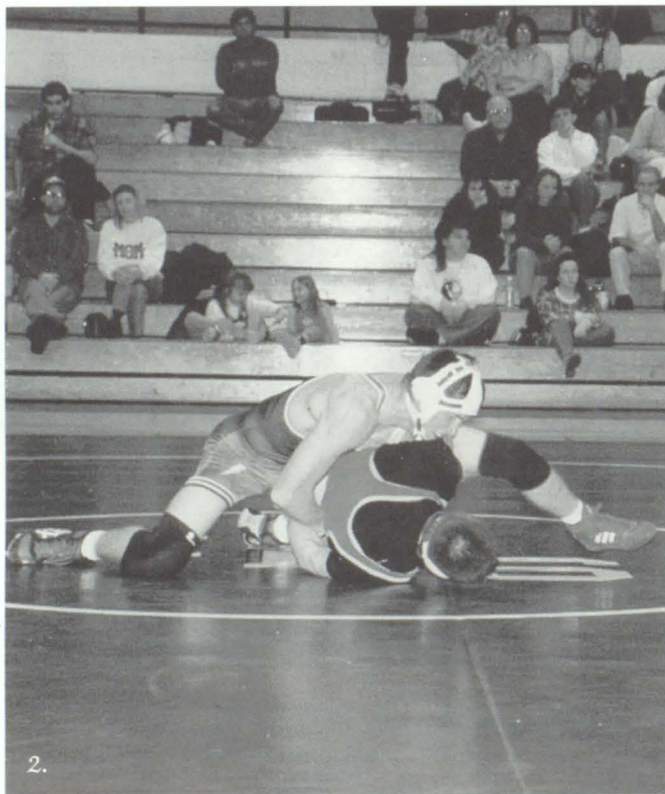
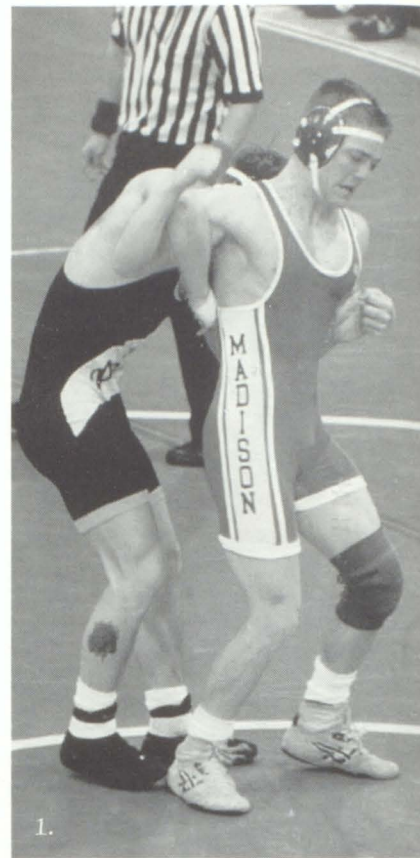
Intensity Leads Wrestlers to Victory

After the N.E.C. win, the team moved on to place first in total points at the Mayfield Sectionals. First place finishes were made by

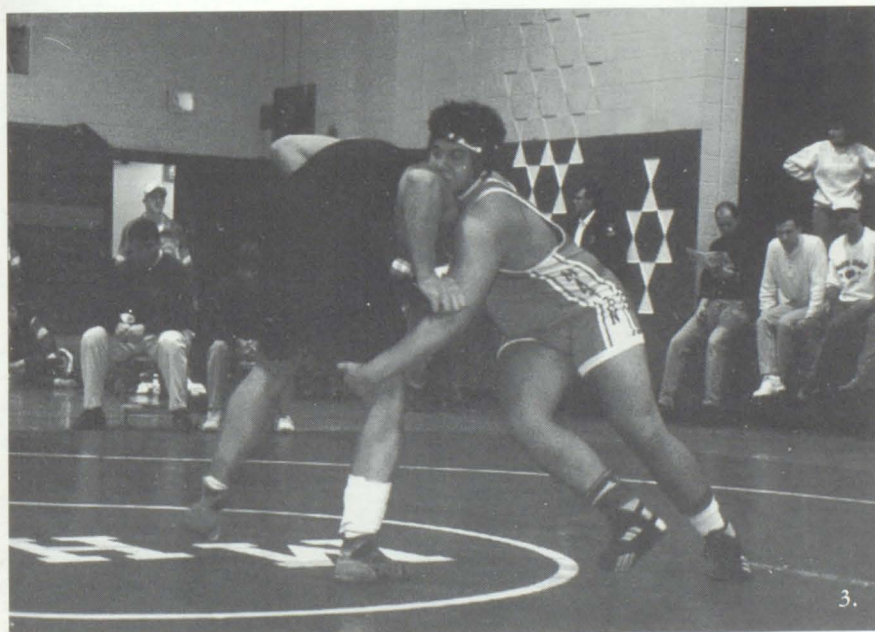
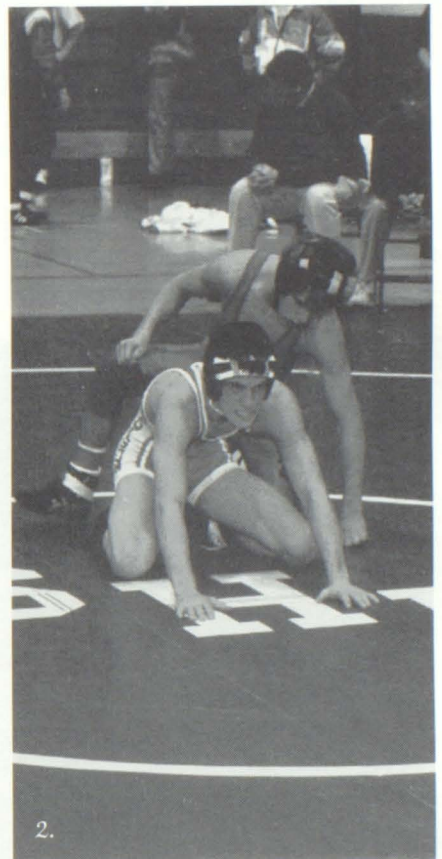
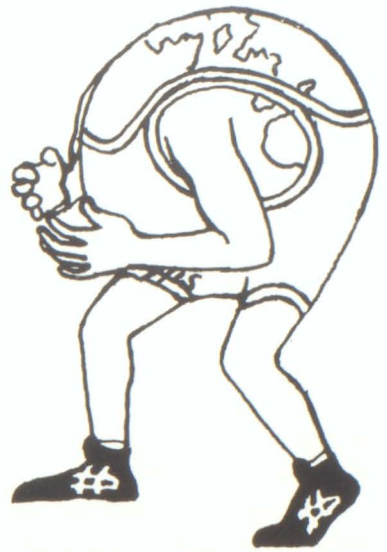
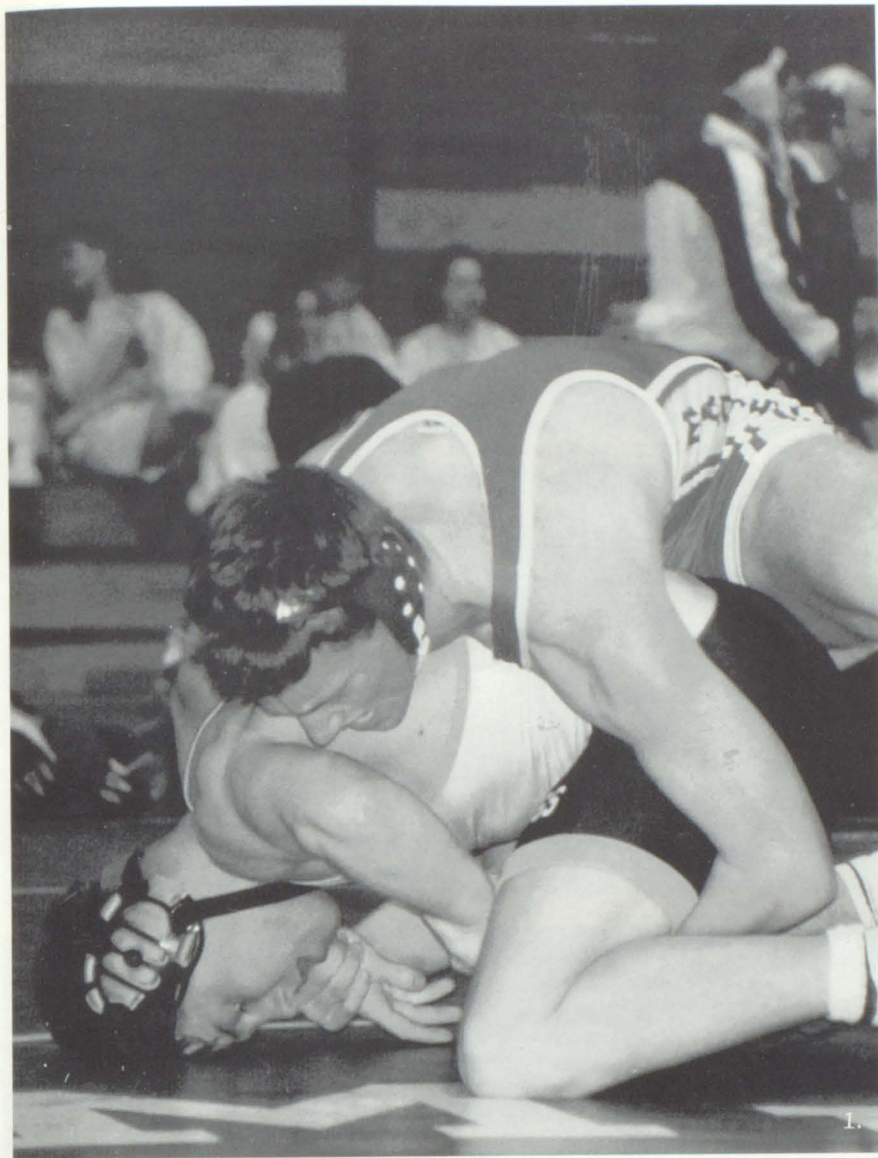

JV and Freshmen Celebrate Great Seasons

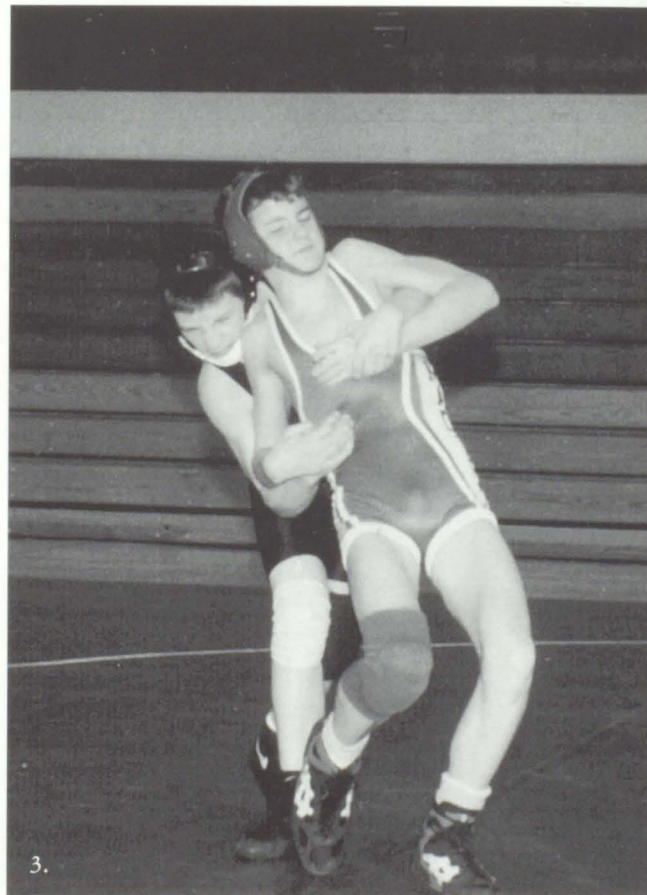
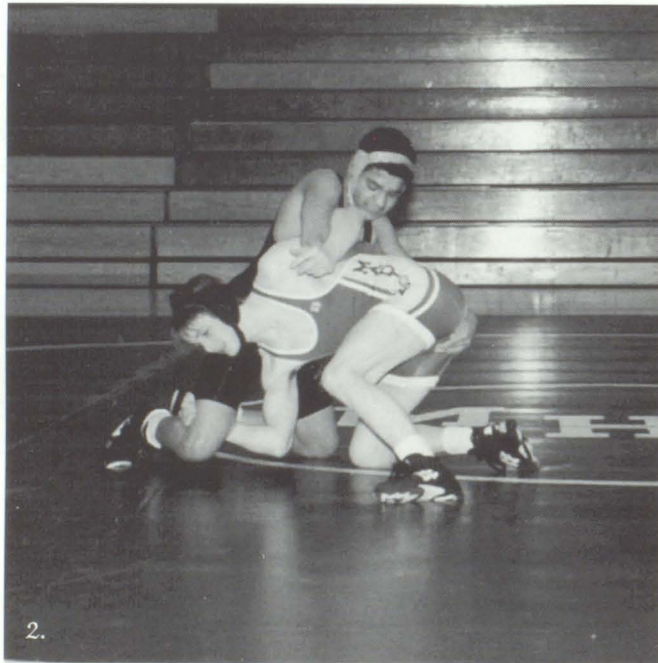

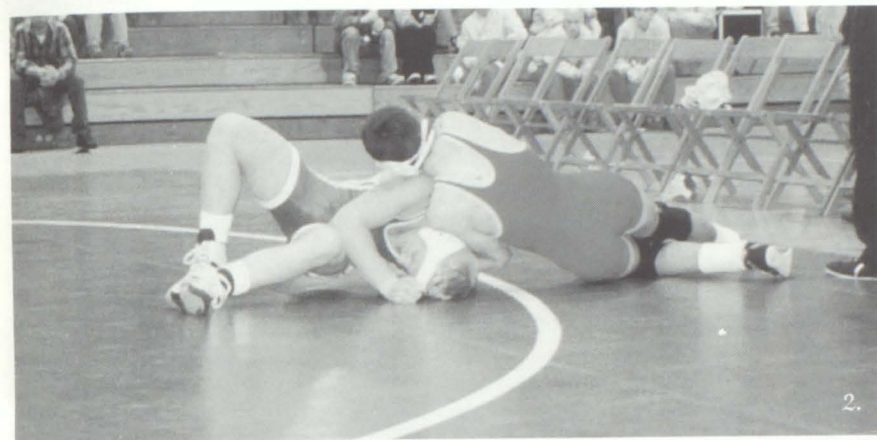

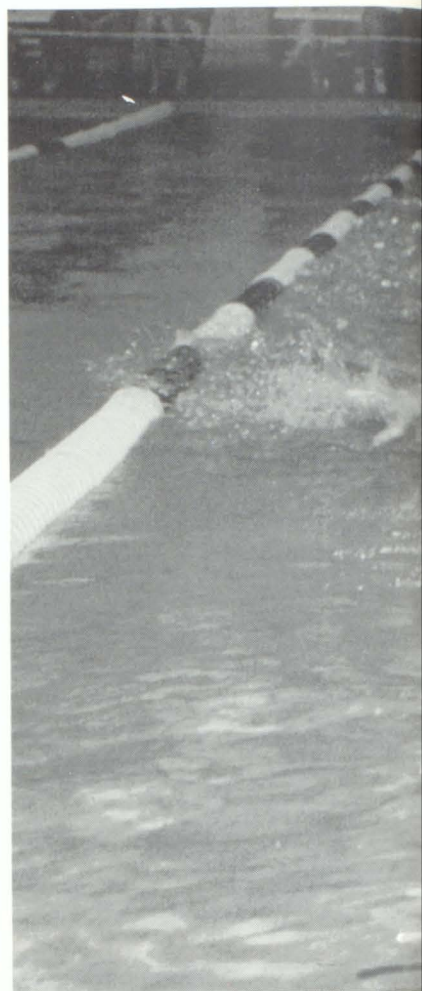
shared the hopes the team next year will do as well as they did this year.

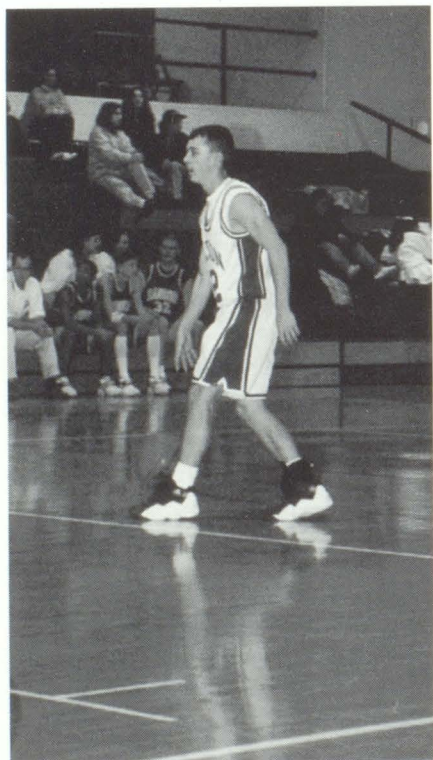
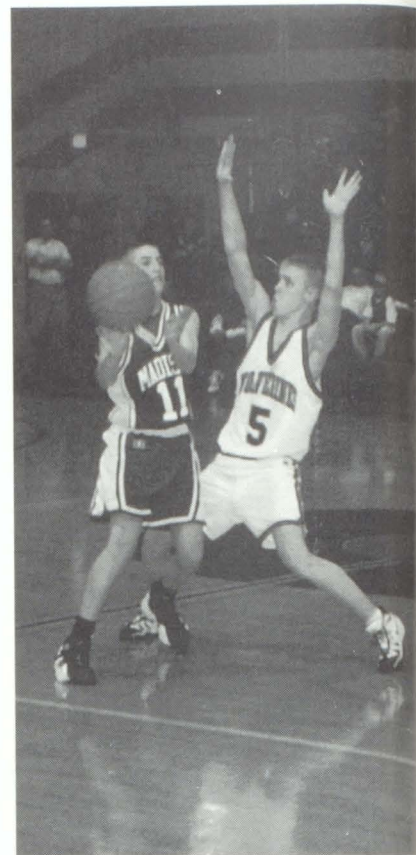
JV and Freshmen Excel to a Great Season

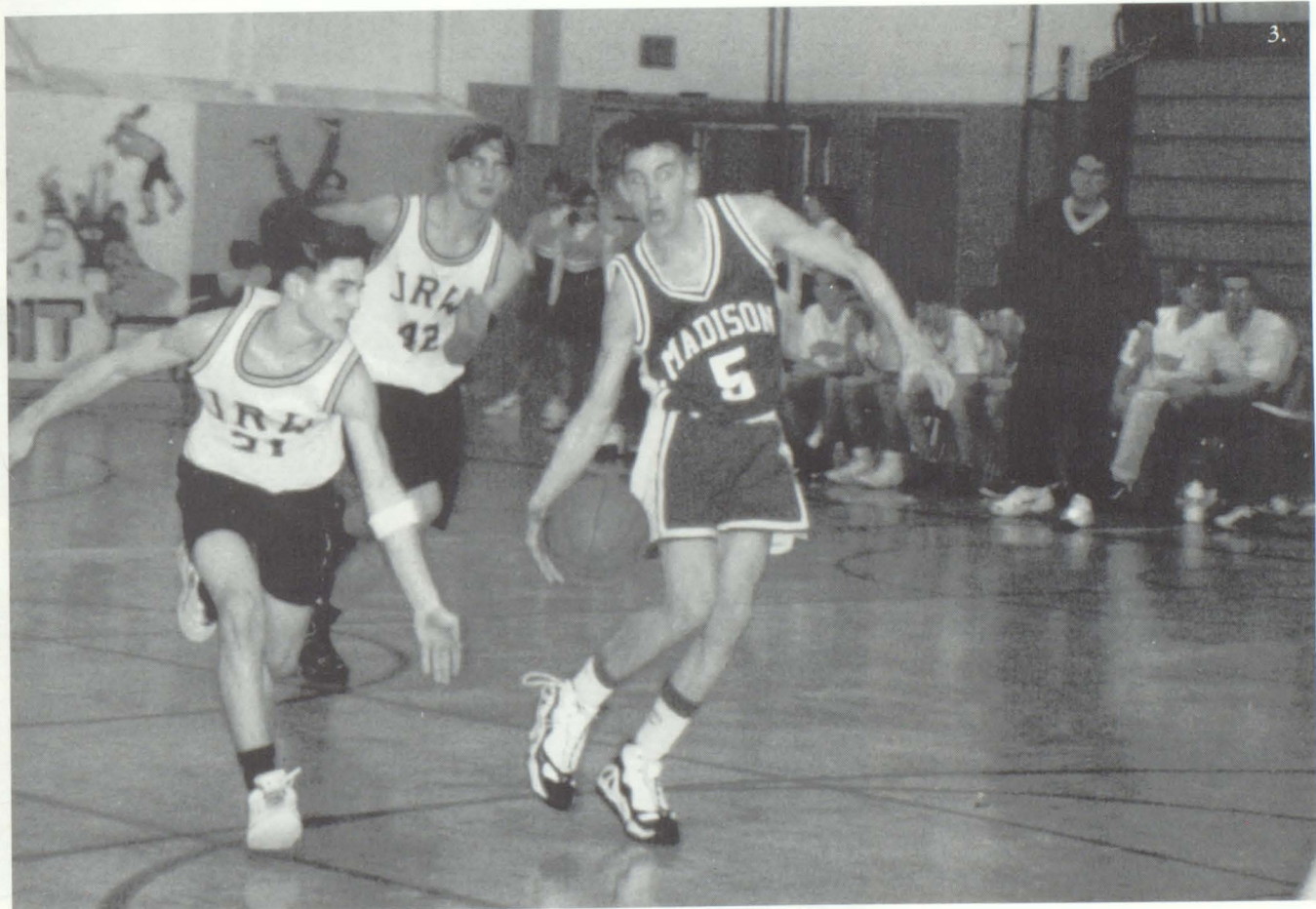

Boys Strive to Victory

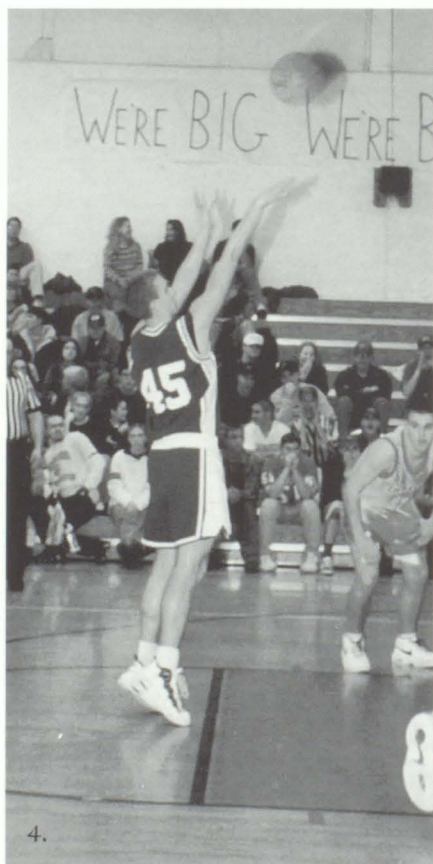
Streaks Score Successful Season Despite Average Record

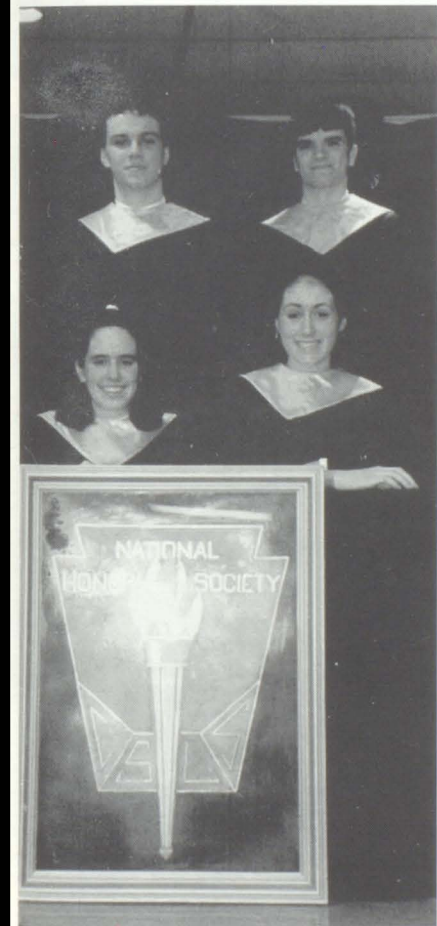
New and Old Members Accept the Challenge

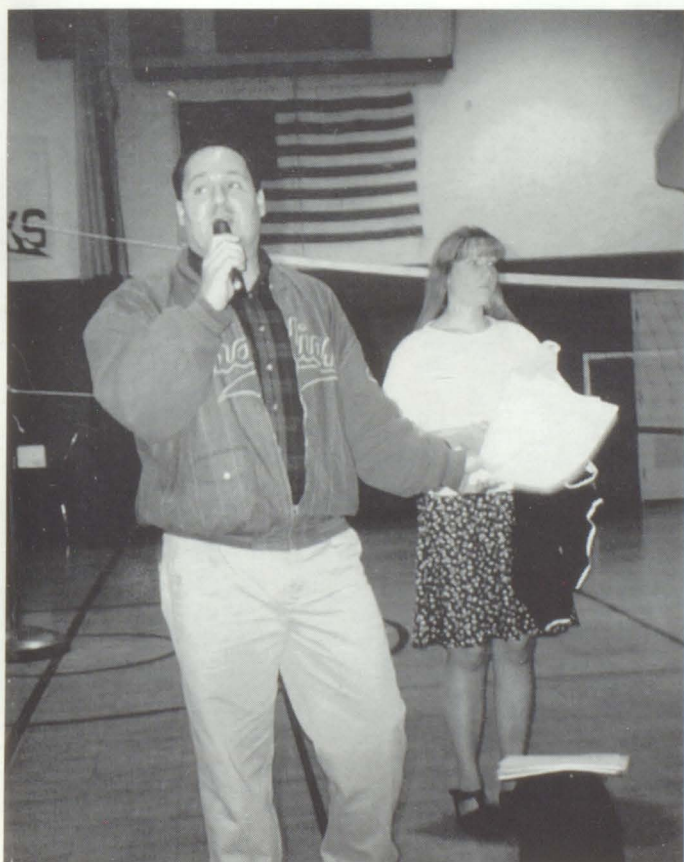

All Darren's efforts were not in vain, though, because through all the time he invested in the project, the next class that decides to try to deliver such a permanent gift will already be ten steps ahead.



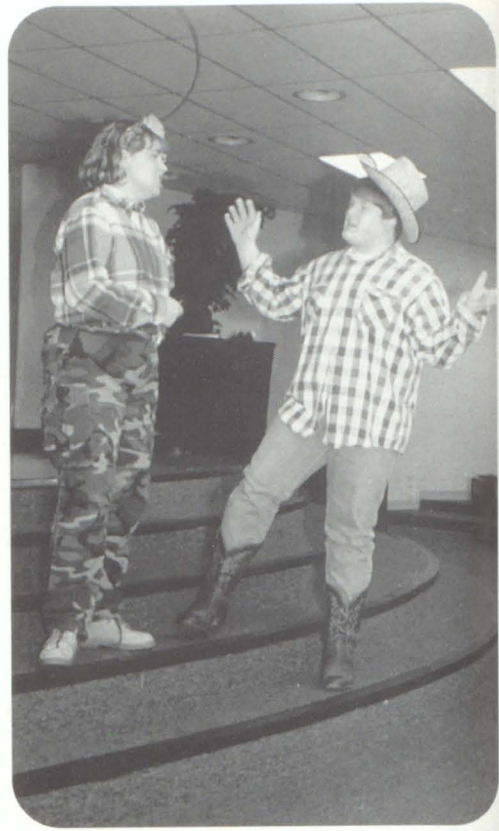

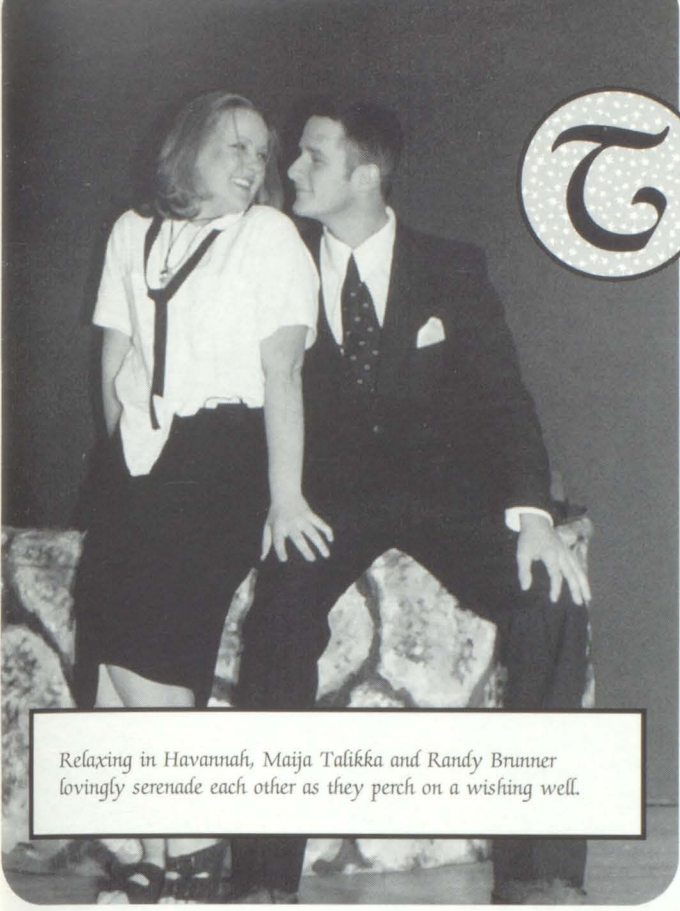

Key Club Boosts School Spirit

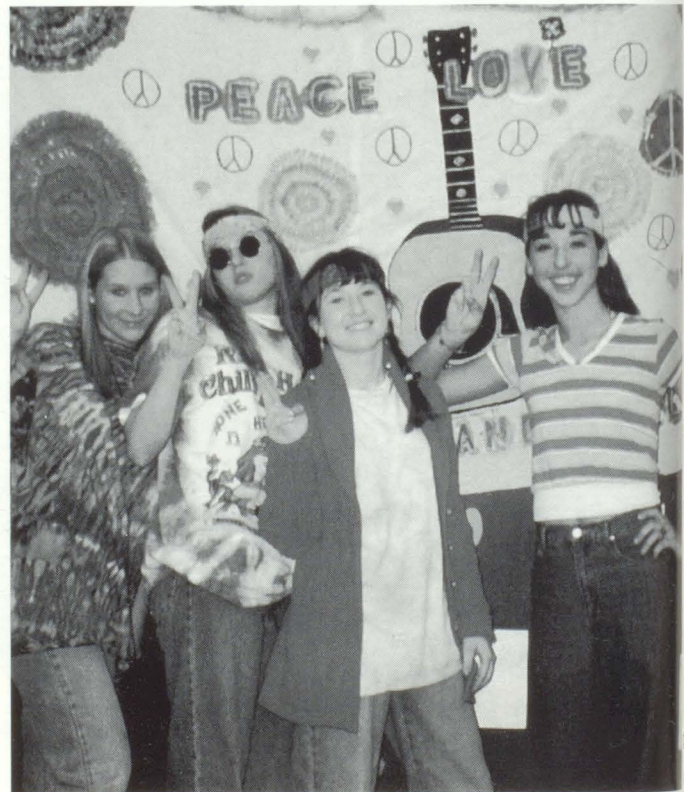
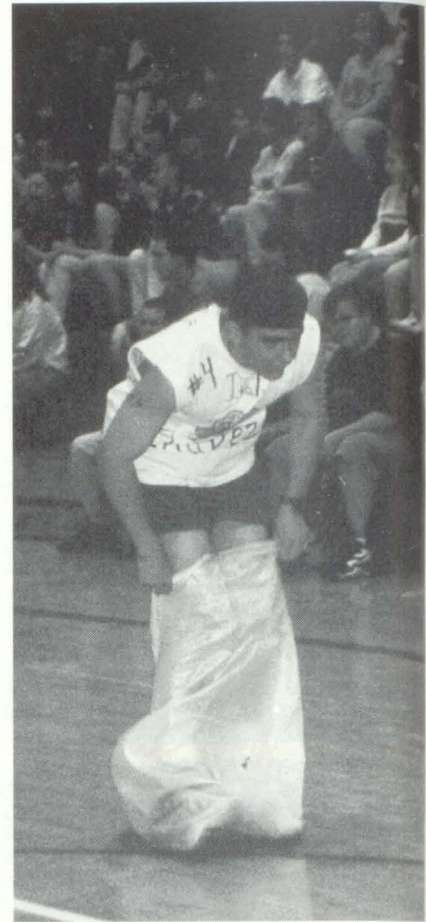

One of Key Club's biggest activities is spirit week. During spirit week students dress accord-

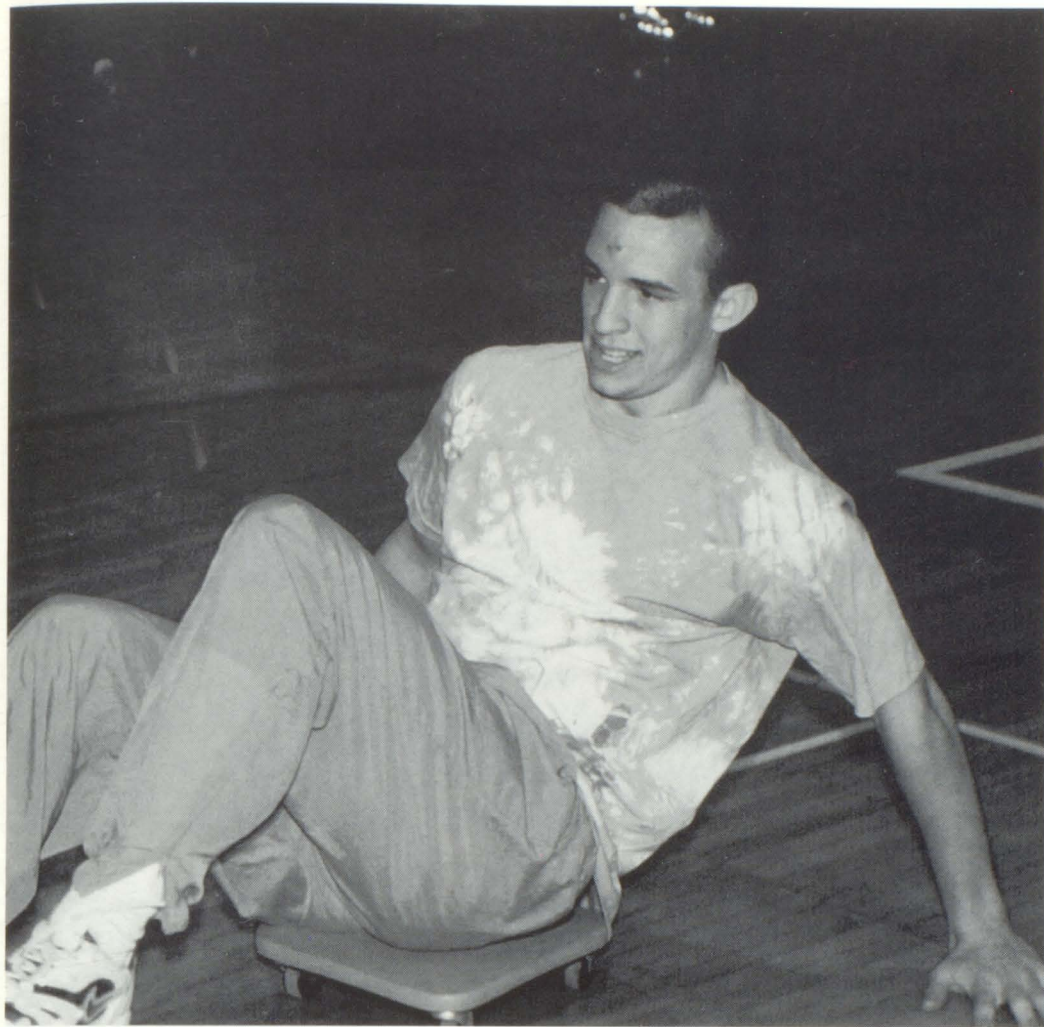

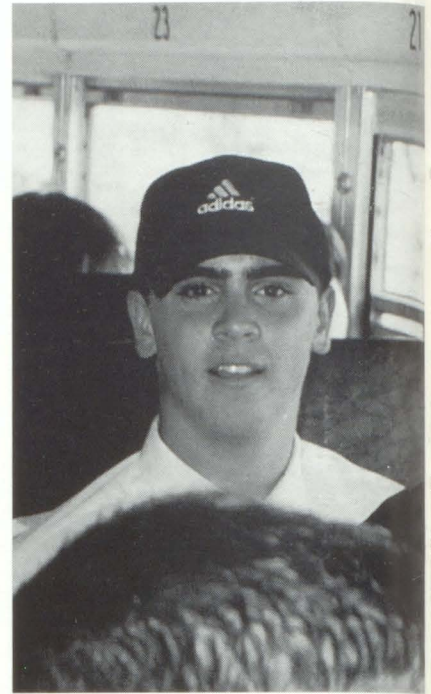


Model UN

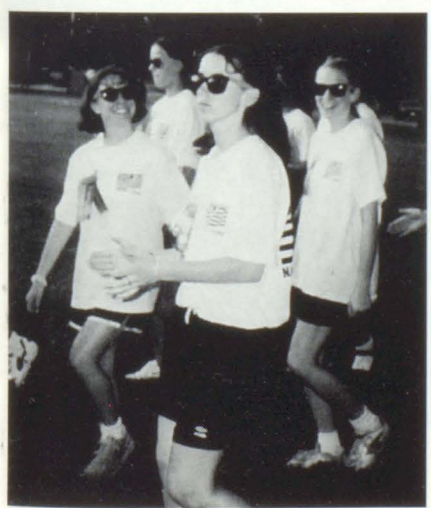
Girls' and Boys' State

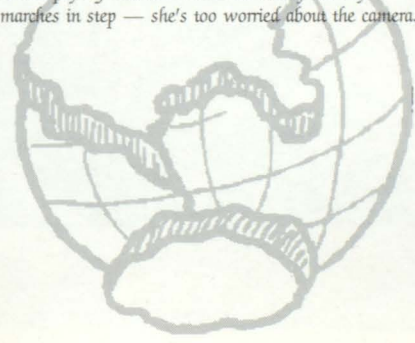
After they were selected and arrived at

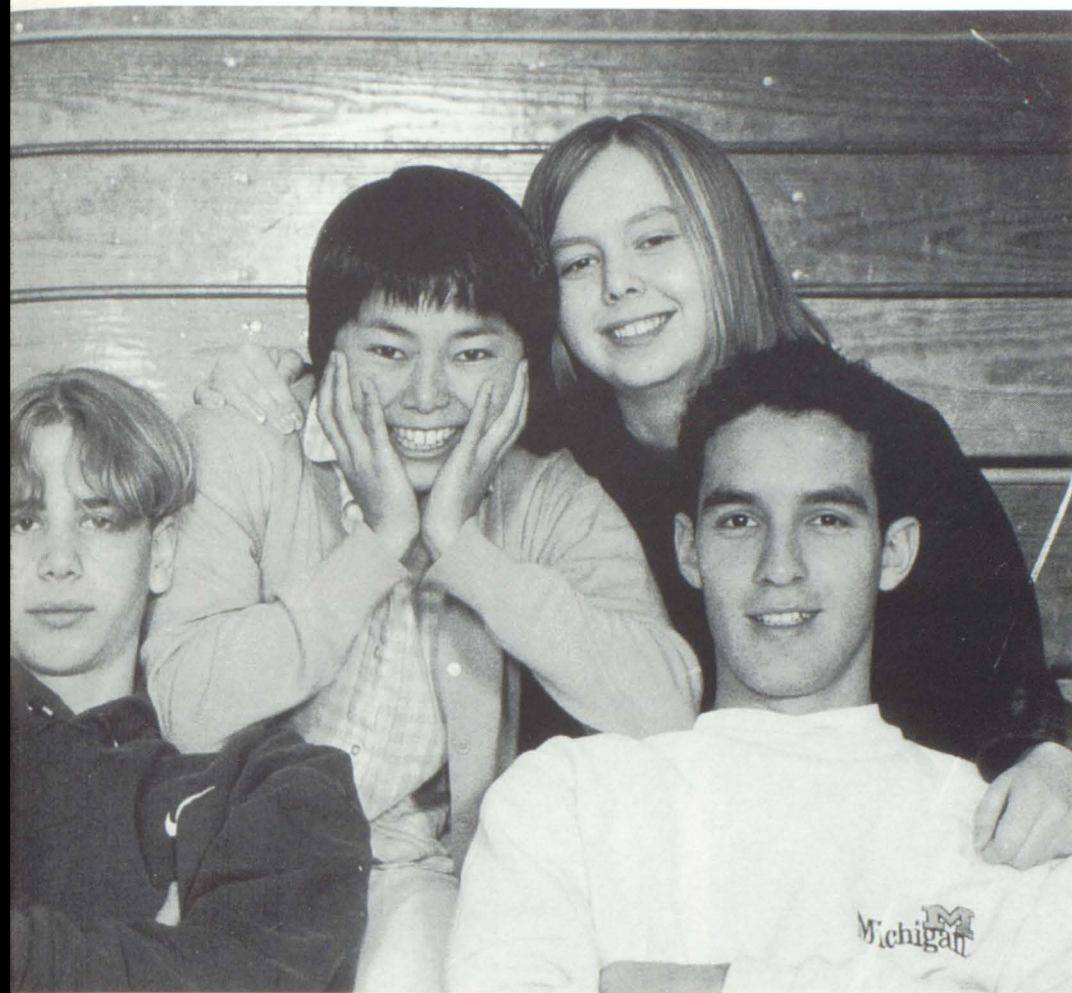

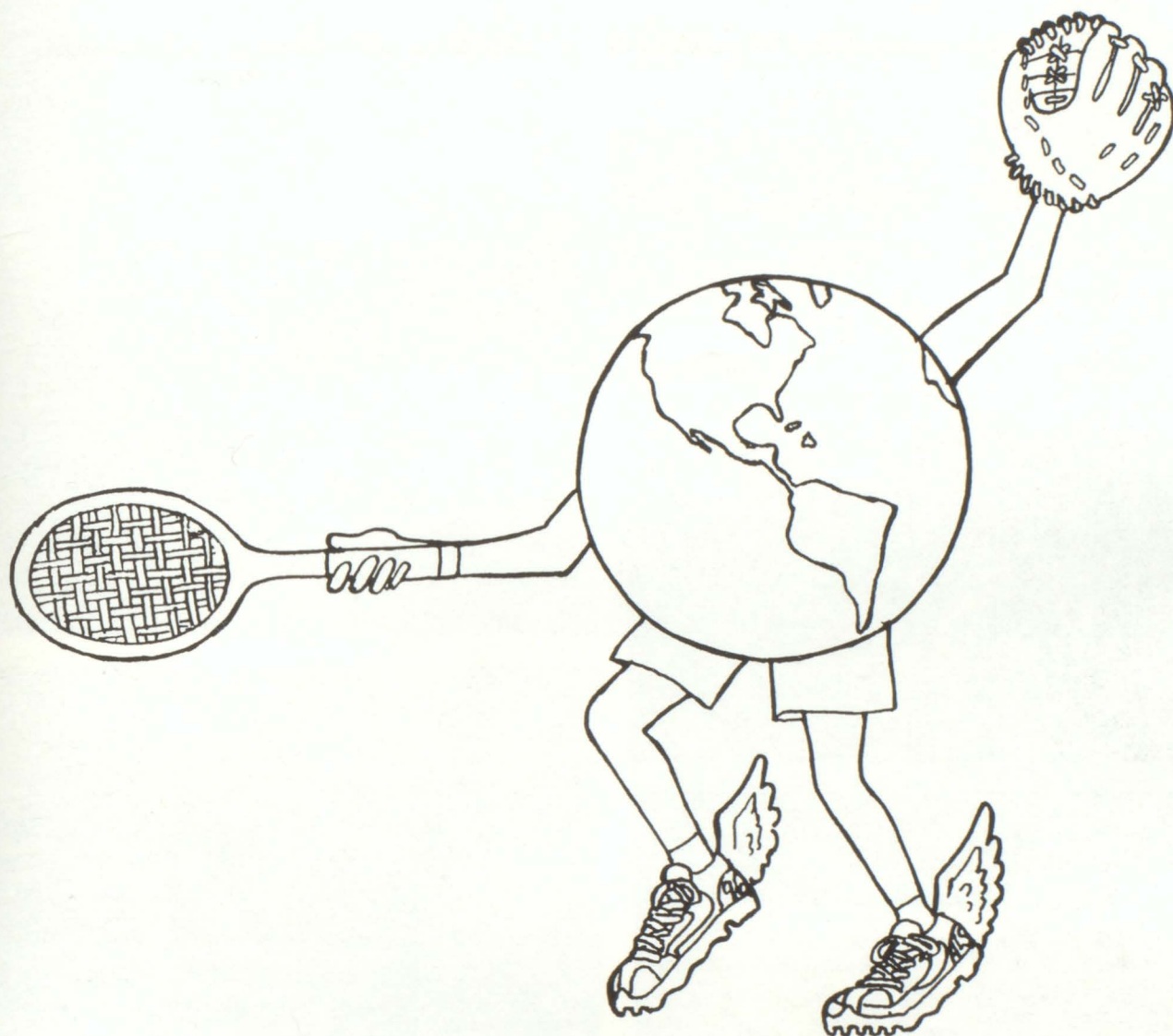

BB Greet New Faces & Challenges

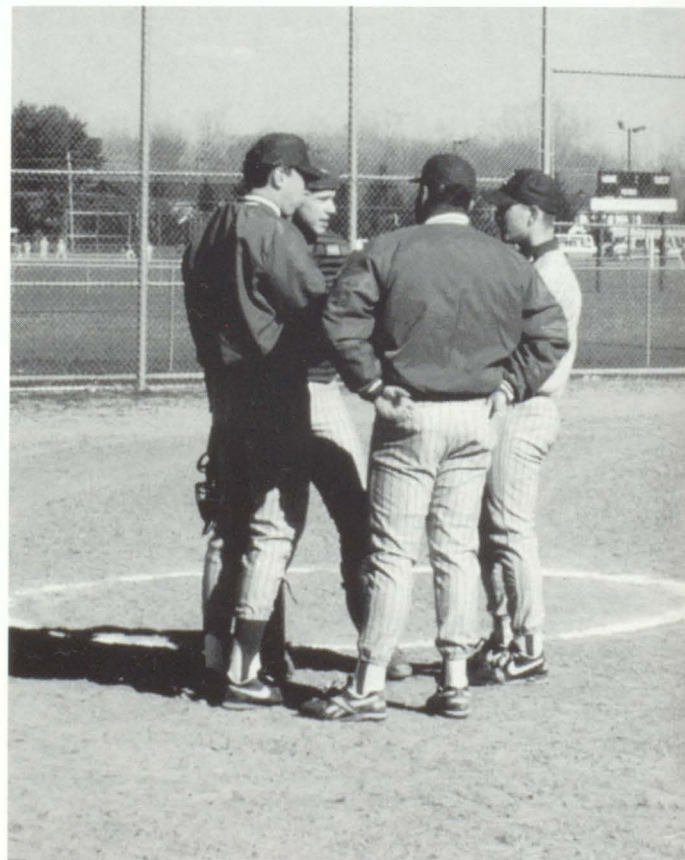

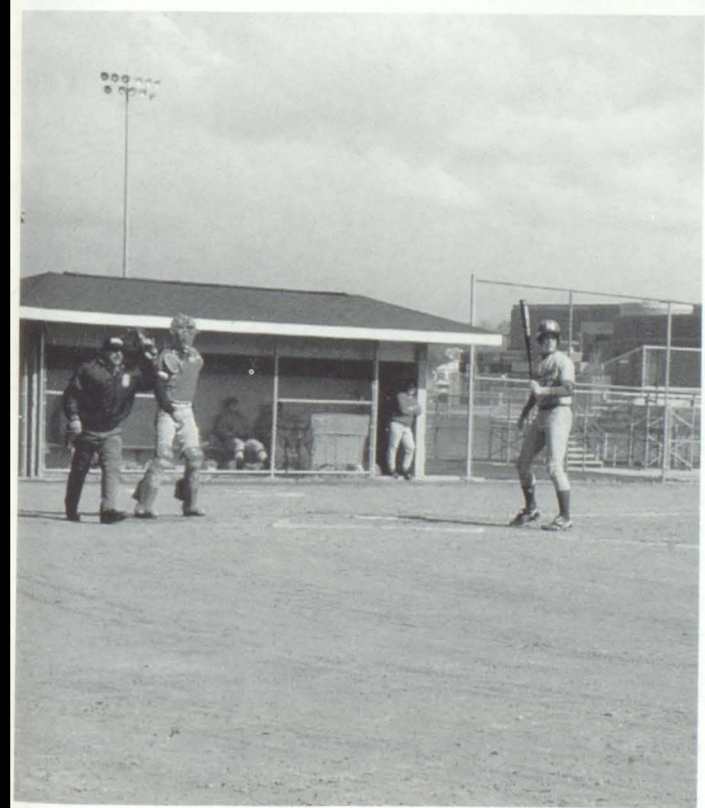

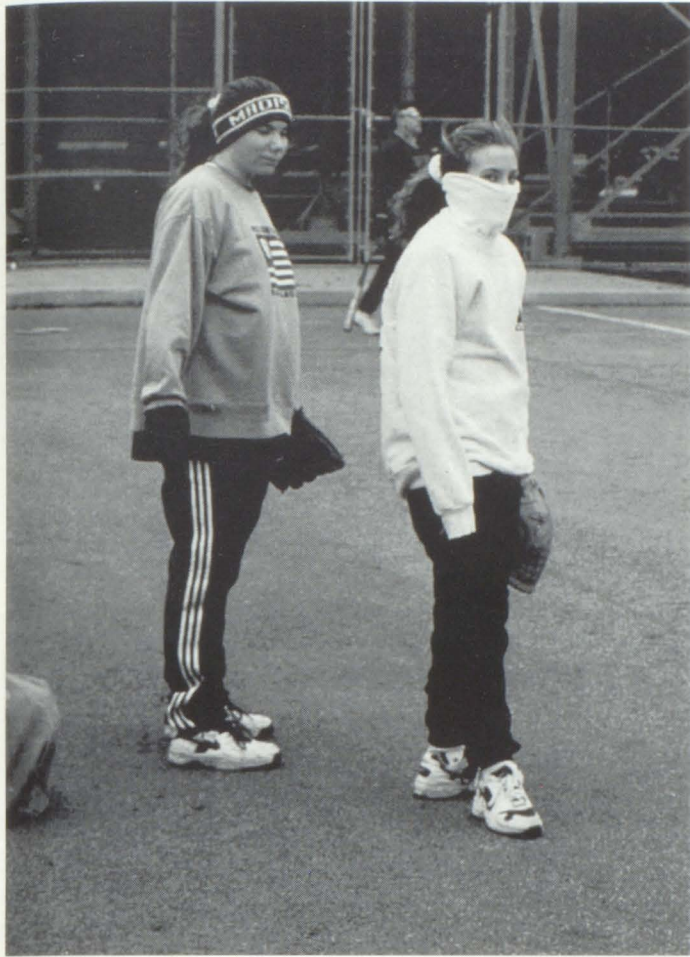

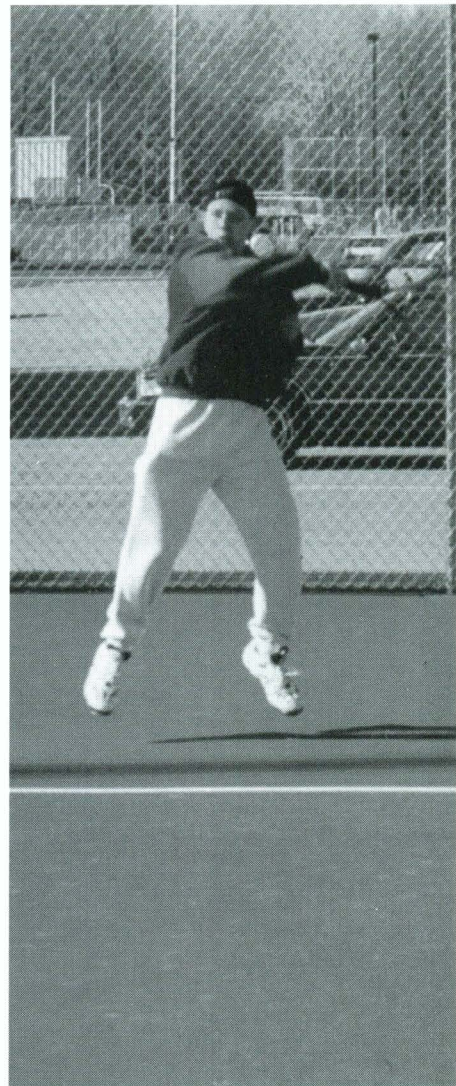
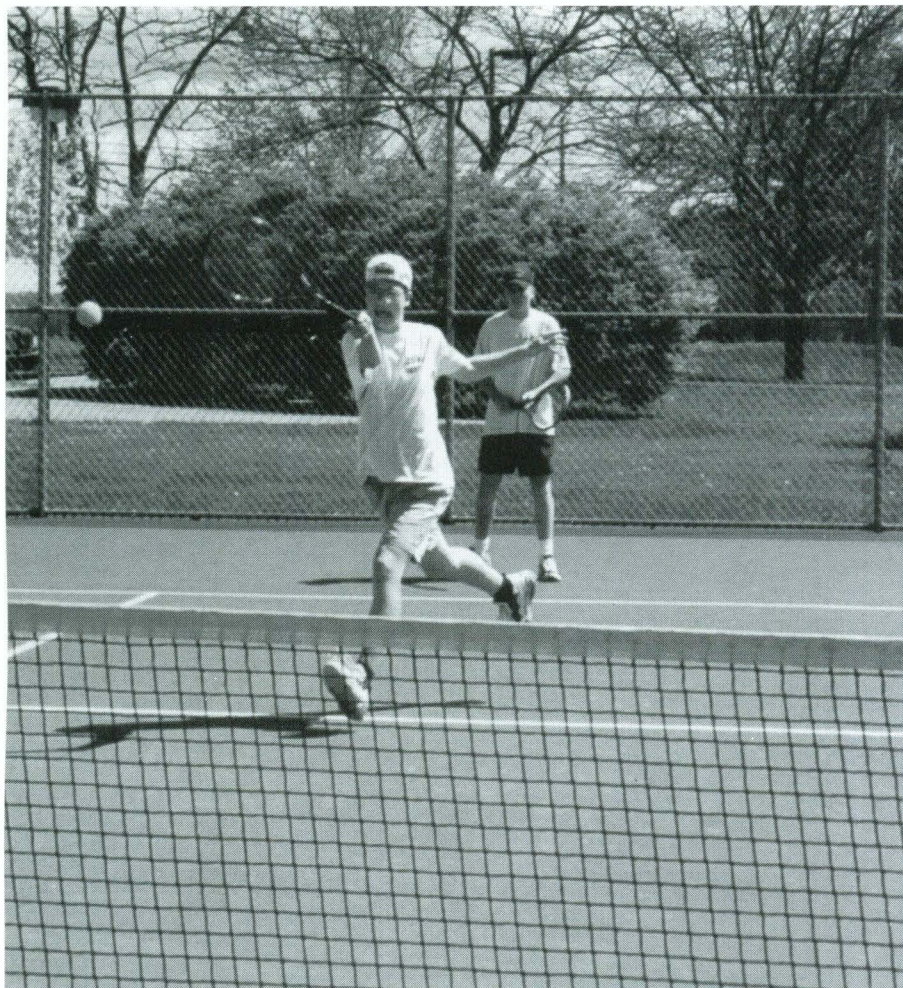
Tennis Serves Up Victories

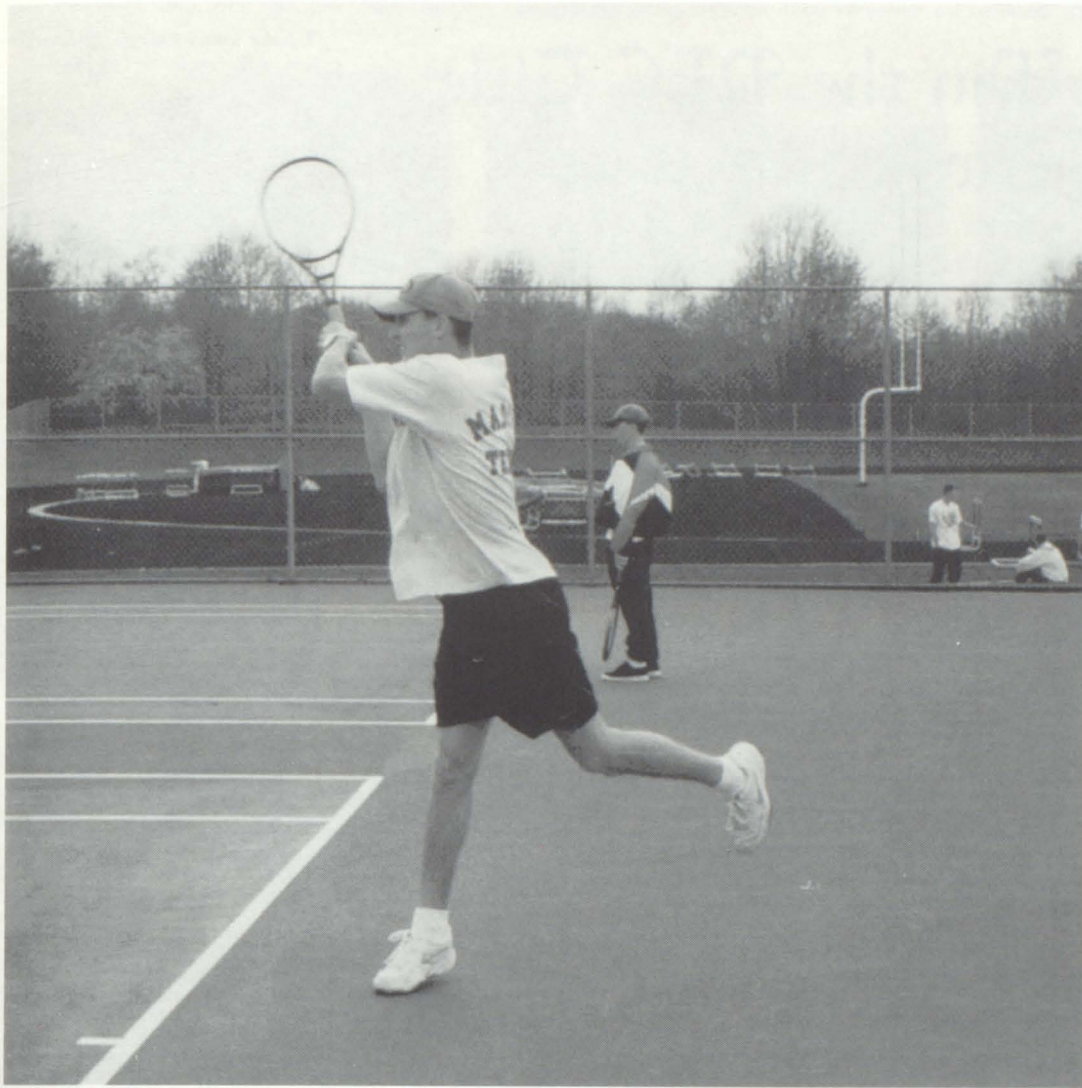

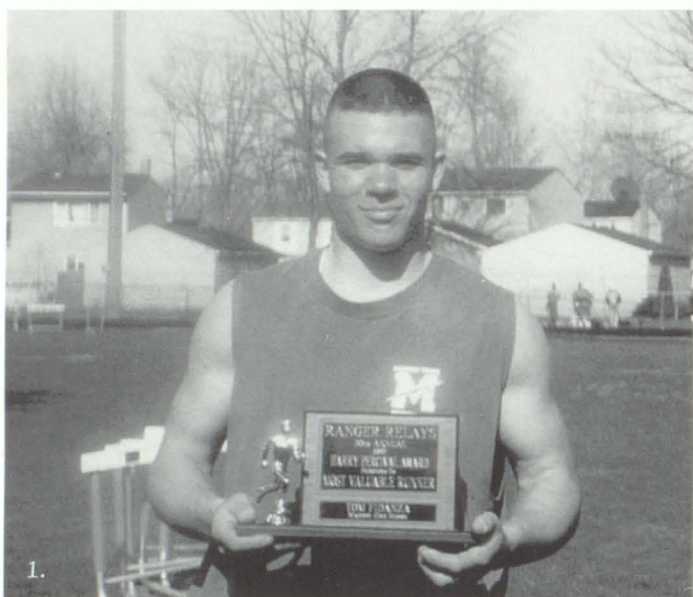

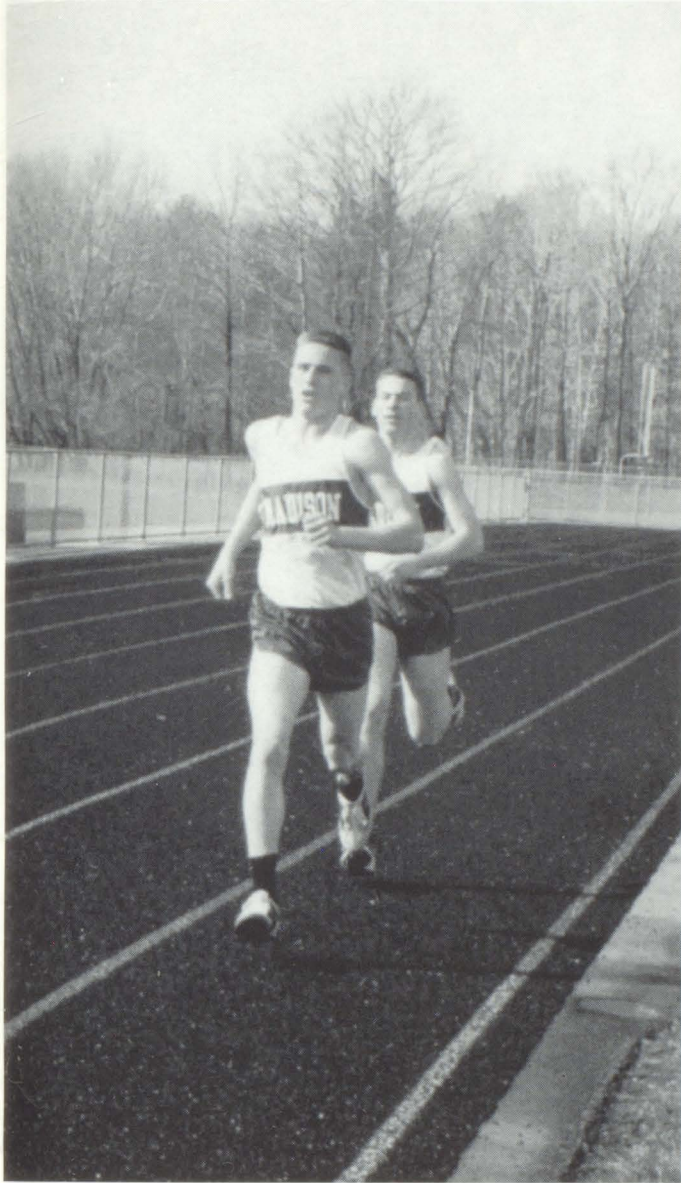

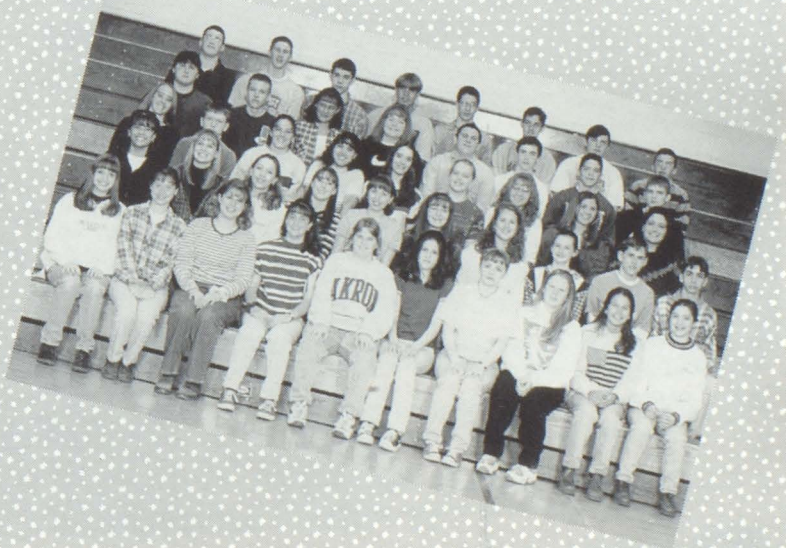

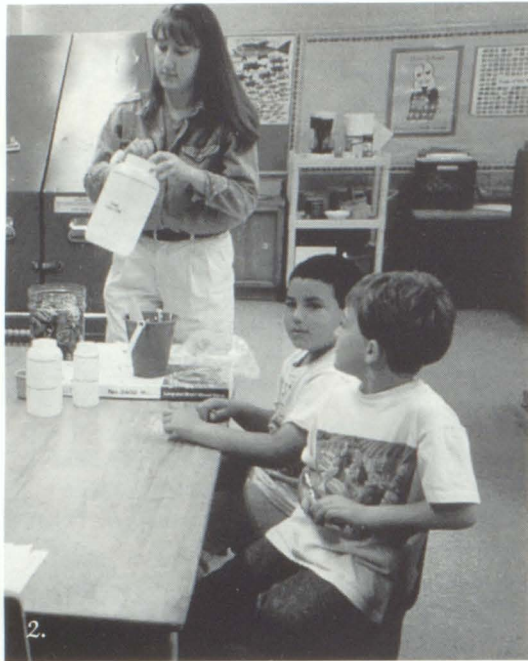

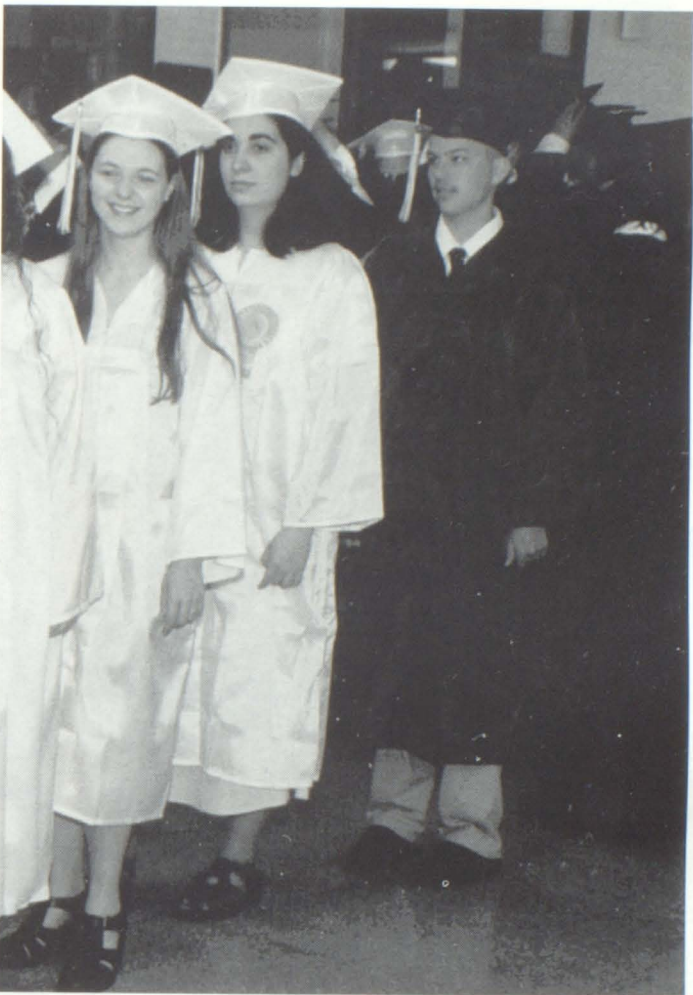

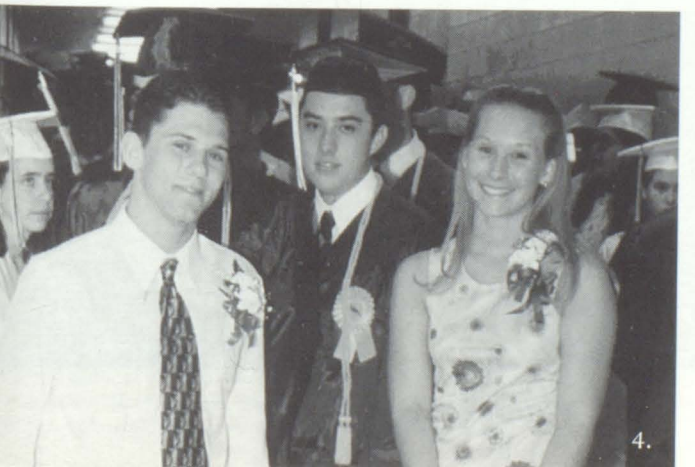

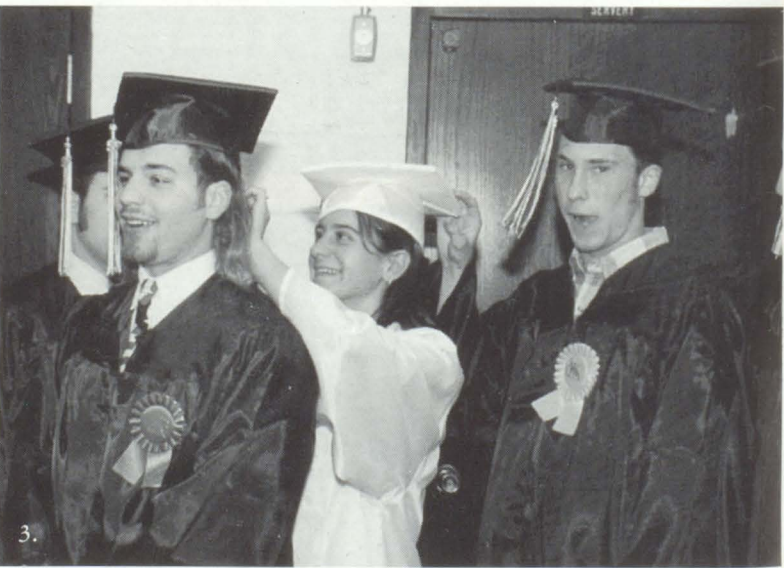

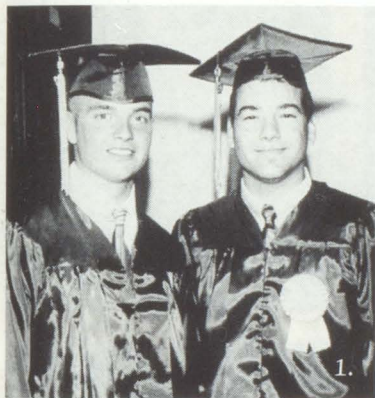

Chosen by his peers to present the class message, Shawn Kelly spoke of the past, present, and future world of the seniors: "One year from now we will all be different places, experiencing different things...but we will all have something in common. No matter how different our lives may become, we will always have a foundation here at MHS. We have learned more here than most of us realize...Besides the classroom, we have learned about life."



Commencement speaker Mr. Dave Foote addressed "the citizens of tomorrow," advising them to maintain high morals and a positive attitude. "The decisions that you make will take our schools into the 21st century. You are the leaders of the future. You need to remember the things that brought a basis to your education and a firm foundation."

Co-valedictorian Katrina Gambol asked her classmate to maintain high goals for themselves: "Today, as I stand before you, I challenge all of you to challenge yourselves. Attempt to absorb all the information that life has to offer so that one day you too may dare the next generation to test themselves and continue a chain of scholarship that will never end."

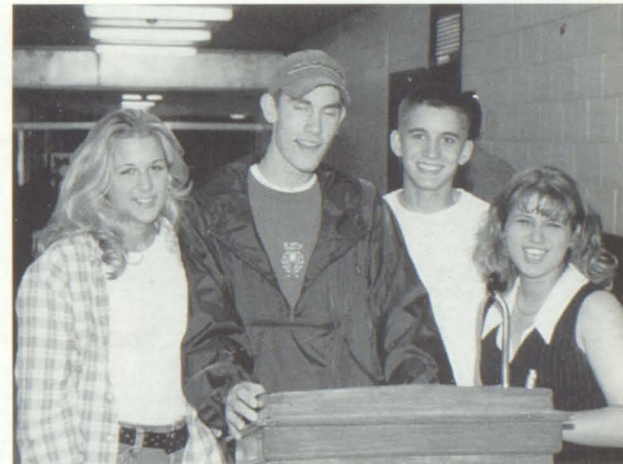

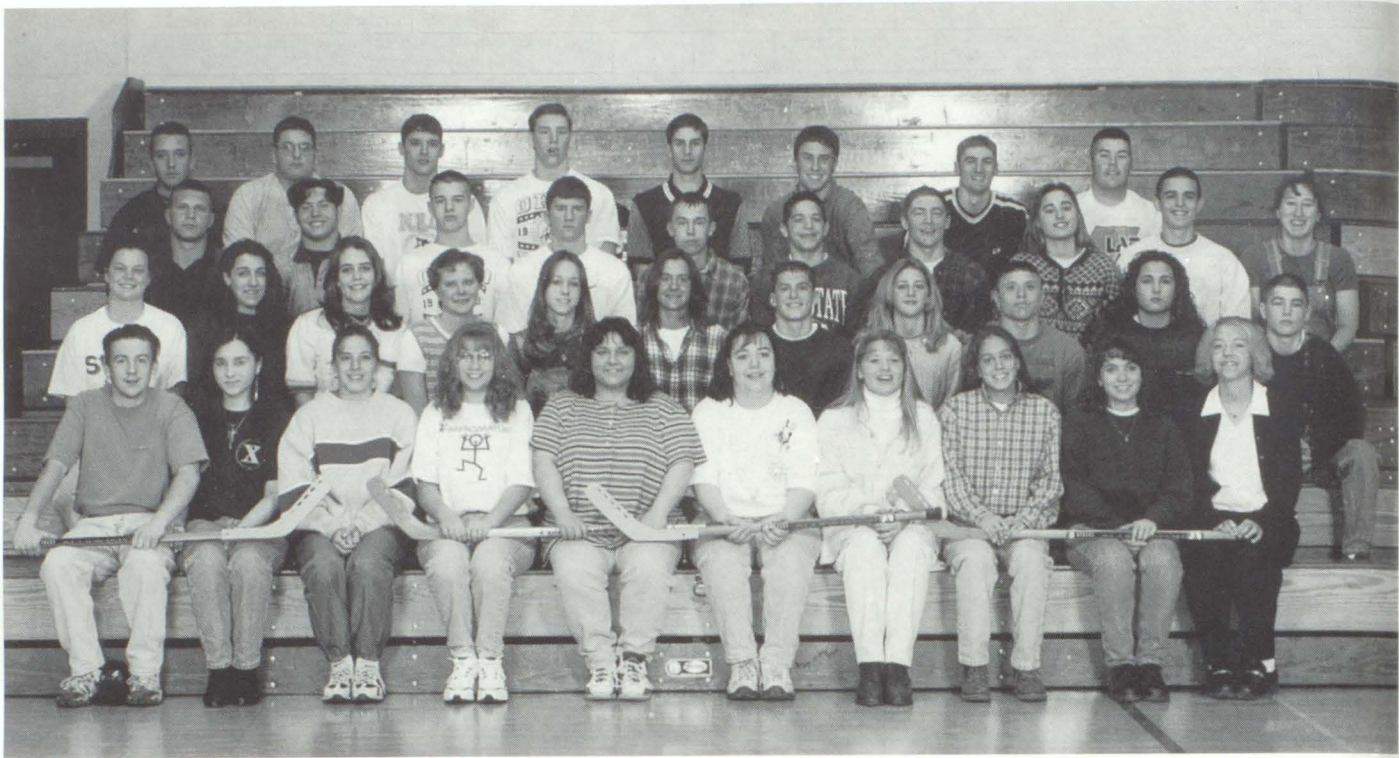

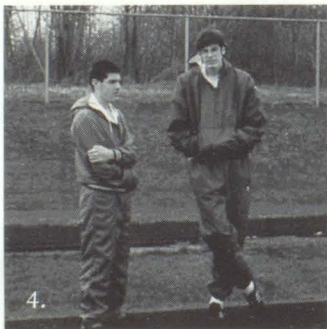

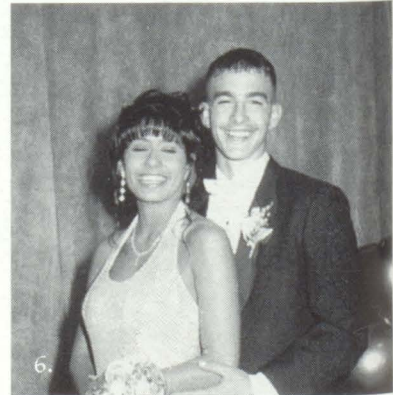

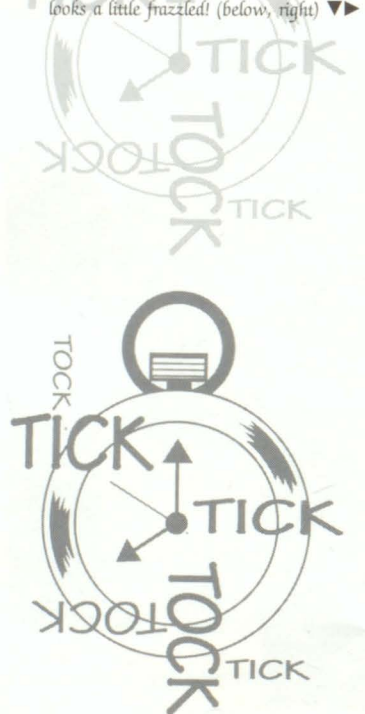

Six hundred copies of Volume 68 of the Cauldron, entitled This Is Our World, were printed by the Taylor Publishing Company in Dallas, Texas. After much "round-table" discussion and after generating a long list of possibilities, the yearbook staff selected their theme This Is Our World in hopes that they could capture what life was like at Madison High School, in Ohio, in their world in 1996-97. They worked diligently to maintain that theme in the words of their headlines and in the round shapes of the initial letters in those headlines. Most copy was set in a 10-point Chancery font, with headlines in Freehand Script. Copy was submitted on IBM disks using Taylor's UltraVision program. The cost of the yearbook was \$45 (\$35 / \$40 presale). This year for the first time the MHS audio-visual department and the TV production classes produced a video yearbook, which could be purchased for an additional \$10.

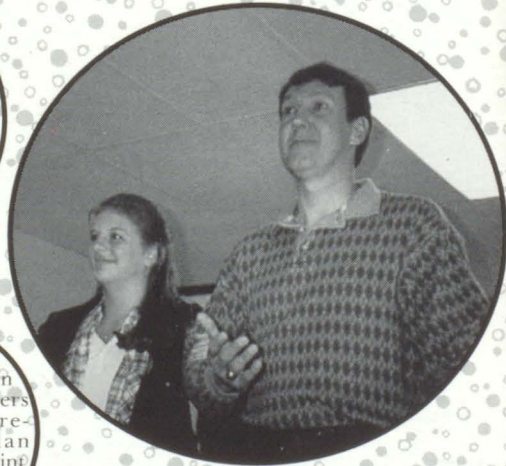
