# Challenges for the Future 

 Math and Scienceearn Bligh MarksTo graduate from MHS，a student must take two math and two science credits．Many stu－ dents take more than required because they find these subjects interesting and exciting．When asked about her math class，Samantha Saarela replied，＂Mr．Wagner＇s algebra class is intellec－ tually stimulating．He has a plethora of ideas．＂In addition to preparing seniors for the AP math test，Mr．Morgan arranges for some of the MHS students to compete in the American Mathe－ matics Examination．Matt Barchok，who won the competition his junior year along with his partner Eric Smeby，commented，＂It＇s not like anything they teach you in math class；every problem pushes you to the limit．＂

Being in a science class has similar advantages toward becoming a well－rounded individual．Stu－ dents learn not just about science，but how to
apply what they＇ve learned to real situations．As senior Kandy Seibold said，＂Mr．Pelich＇s anat－ omy class is interesting．It teaches us how to depend on ourselves，not just on the teachers．＂ Each year，the anatomy class dissects a number of animals，including rats and cats．The biology classes study the life of various animals and their surroundings，while earth science classes learn about the various rocks and soil and the water cycle．The chemistry classes investigate the re－ lationship between chemicals and the formation of compounds，and physics classes study speed， movement，acceleration，and force．

English E Social Studies Join Curricullum

The 1997-98 school year enjoyed some bright new changes. One impor tant one was a cross-curricular experi ment to show students the connections between their English and social studies courses. Working together, Mr. Herrholtz and Ms. Jackson correlated their junior English and government classes in their study of the Constitution, the students' rights, and the issue of censorship. Both classes studied the Ray Bradbury novel, Fahrenheit 451 - for its social statements and its literary value. Their work culminated in an assembly for National Banned Books Week. The program was directed mostly by the students, who presented their research on relevant subjects and their opinions for and against
censorship. Several students also read poems on the subject. Two guest speakers also joined the students: attorney Mr. Bob Gambol spoke on the legal issues and superintendent Mr . Stan Heffner spoke on the school's position on censorship.

Another change came when Mr. Jim Herrholtz left his position as government teacher to take over as assistant principal when Mr. Brown left. Mrs. Helen Mitchell stepped in temporarily and did a great job taking over his classes. Ms. Sharon Eiseman also joined the social studies staff this year, teaching world geography, economics, and government classes and leading the Model UN program to victory.

In business classes, such as accounting, typing, and Business Law, Mr. John Miller claims that students learn skills like keyboarding, salesmanship, and accounting to help with their daily lives in the future.

Home ec. classes like Parenting, Life Planning, Family Relations, and Quest focus on similarly useful skills. Mrs. Ashton, Mrs. McMahon, and Mrs. Delahunty teach much more than how to be a homemaker. As senior Lindsay Galea commented, "I plan to start a family early and the personal experience I got through my home ec classes will help me get the skills I need to have a family and career.'

The JOGS (Jobs for Ohio Graduating

Commenting on his coaches, Bill Whaley said: "Mr. Fortuna and the other coaches' intensity level was the highest I have ever experienced through the four years of wrestling with them.'

The Streaks compiled a 16-2-1
regular season record and finshed seventh in the Division I state poll ranking. After winning their fifth NEC title, Madison moved on to the Division I sectionals at Mayfield. They blew away all the competition, placing first in overall points. Of the ten who advanced to the finals, four walked away with first-place finishes: Chris Shears (119), Gary Skoch (125), Ryan Wirtzberger (135), and Bill Whaley (160). At the State meet, Ryan Wirtzberger placed second and Joe Hernan received an honorable mention. Chris Shears and Gary Skoch placed fifth.
