MHS Eats Up the PAC Streaks End Strong Season 7-3


The Madison football team made their first year in the Premiere Athletic Conference a memorable one. The Streaks defeated Cleveland South, Lorain Southview, and Austintown Fitch, all Division 1 teams. The Streaks also sent a message of their strength and skill by beating Geneva, Edgewood, and Riverside, all old N.E.C. rivals.


Madison senior Kevin Clark rushed for 1,413 yards, while Madison's air game improved incredibly with junior quarterback Josh Haldi passing for 1,250 yards. Jim Smith racked up 749 yards, while senior Adam Johnson completed the

one-two punch, receiving 365 yards.

With this strong showing, the Streaks placed seventh in the computer polls and barely missed the state playoffs. Madison also had the privilege and the challenge of facing off against the number-oneranked Division 2 team in the state of Ohio, Chardon - and they did not come away scoreless. The Streaks' three losses all came from P.A.C. opponents: North, South, and Chardon all defeated the Streaks, but our team kept their composure, giving all they had whether they won or



Although the JV team played fewer games than their varsity and freshmen counterparts, they still had a competi-



commented Mike Callow. The team is looking forward to another successful season.





Both squads participated in a car wash this summer for money to buy new equipment. They topped their whole summer off by attending the Eastern Cheer Association Cheerleading






The Madison boys' cross country team suffered a hard season with a loss of their top runners from last year, but





Hitting the Greens Golf Tees Off for a Great Season



On Their Way to Seniority Juniors Tie Up Another Year



Sophomores Soaring Class of 2001 Moves on to Future




projects to complete at one

After years of work building his teams, head coach Bob Peterlin was



tainly set high goals for the underclassmen to follow, tying up this century by laying a foundation for winning seasons into the new millenium.











PAC Pride Blue Streaks End Season on 70p




Swimmers Test the Waters Ending a Fun Season




Streaks Tie Down PAC Wrestlers Wrap Up Another Successful Season

Tying Down the Competition



coach, Terry Heitenan, the Blue Streaks got serious about the game and took it to a higher level. The team won many games with their excellent defense and pitch-




Coach Heitenan had this to

where they placed second out of six teams. Next year the team, led by seven seniors, should improve their chances of winning the PAC title.






came together as the season progressed!"




"...At the Old Ball Game!" Varsity Baseball Grows Stronger







Running into a New Century Girls' Track Runs Away with Title





First PAC Champs Madison Boys Tie Up a Great Year
















The Freshman Blocks Setting the Pace for MHS

Many schools in Ohio, including our neighbor, Perry High School, are modifying the way students go about their school day. This year at MHS, block scheduling consisted of two periods, each 82 minutes long, for one semester — compared to seven periods.


riods, 52 minutes long, for a full year.

As students and faculty agree, there are many pros and cons to block scheduling. It gives teachers more time to spend with their students, so creativity and hands-on activities have greatly increased. A few freshmen teachers have combined classes to connect the different subjects, like English and science.

Mrs. Moskowitz offered her opinion: "Block scheduling has been beneficial this year. I have had fewer students fail this year than in previous years, fewer disciplinary problems have occurred, and it has been more fun, because I get to bring creativity into the classroom."








Academic Challenge put to-

Year after year musicals remain very popular. This year's cast showed great talent in their acting, singing, and dancing. The drama club had











Office Ties New Faces in MHS Office




Technology Advances Library, Computer & A.V.



Science and Math Teaching Skills for New Century

Math and science are a major part of the MH5 curriculum, and students need two credits in each subject to graduate. This year the math department excelled in many math competitions: Geoff Gehring and Megan Hrbek won "The Madison Mathematics Competition"; Megan also placed highest for MHS in the OCTM Contest; and Melanie Fisher ranked 334 out of 20,250 Ohio participants in the American High School Mathematics Exam. Math teachers have also incorporated technology — Geometer's Sketchpad, graphing calculators, and computer simulation

— into their classes to enhance the students' learning.

Working more with their hands than with computers, the science programs performed dissections and worked on research projects. The Biology 2 class created and conducted their own experiments, while the Biology students built 3-D models of cells. The coming block scheduling promises a good outlook for the science department: they are planning to have new courses such as Marine Biology. All the science classes will be interrelated, preparing students for the new century.





















Talk the Talk / Walk the Walk



MHS physical education and health classes are taught by







Headlines of the Century Yearbook & Newspaper Say It All









Business, SBH, JOGS Academic Alternatives






Keeping It Loud Bands Bring Down the House






ACC offers a variety of fields including administrative office services, auto body, building remodeling and repair, community & home ser-






























A Tie-In to "Real Life" Senior Projects End the Year

This year MHS followed through with a recently established practice of allowing seniors to earn credit for life experiences outside the high school. Students who have passed all courses first semester and maintained good grades during the third quarter, who have met all the requirements of graduation, who have demonstrated good attendance, and who have shown good citizenship throughout their years at MHS are eligible to participate.

Each student must develop his own proposal and find a community contact willing to work together on the project. This year twenty-two seniors

participated, gaining invaluable experience in many fields, from law to medicine to education to agriculture, among others. Abbey Eddington, for example, worked at Middle Ridge Gardens, where she was put in charge of a designated field of asparagus, working in the field and keeping records of the marketing and sales. Her community sponsors, Tom and Sue Woodworth, even donoated one-quarter of her profits to MH5. Amber Pinkney, who worked with a fifth grade class at Homer Nash Kimball, raved about her experience: "I woke up every day looking forward to going to school!"















