## Back to the Lab

The sciences have been having a great time this year. Besides getting to do labs up to three times a week, the students get to learn a lot more. Because of the longer periods, the teachers can cover additional topics and provide more in-depth information on those subjects.

This is the second year for block scheduling at MHS, and it has had both positive and negative effects on the way the faculty has to teach. According to Unified Science II teacher, Mr. Pelich, "Block scheduling has had a very positive effect on the way I teach. I get to know the students better quicker. The students come to class more often. We do not get to cover all of the areas we did when we did not have
 block scheduling, but the areas we do cover we can go way more in-depth."

The ninth-grade proficiencies have added a major new concern for the science department. A great thing about the science curriculum here at Madison is that it is designed to prepare the students for these proficiency tests. From the basic courses to biology, chemistry, and physics, each area of study will probably appear in the questions found on the tests.

One highlight of the year for the department was having their colleague Mr. Fickenscher recognized as the Lubrizol Lake County Science Teacher of the Year. That award brought him a $\$ 1,000$ grant, and along with grant money he received from other sources, he is helping them establish a computer lab with special science software. Mr. Fickenscher commented, "I am very proud to be associated with MHS and the MHS science teachers! I hope to make our department better each year and continue to make science more interesting for our students."

## Adding Up the Year

We all know how stressful math classes can be, with all of those numbers running through your head the night before a big test. Whether you're studying for Integrated Math, algebra, geometry, or pre-calculus, it can all be tough. The math department has done a lot to provide the best opportunity for every student to succeed. They added two new teachers to the department this year: Mr. Bartholomew, a firstyear teacher, and Mrs. Meshginpoosh, a former Blue Streak herself, were the newcomers. Mr. Bartholomew taught Algebra II and Integrated Math I and II; Mrs. Meshginpoosh taught Integrated Math I, Algebra I, and geometry.

Three teachers from the department--Mr. Morgan, Mrs. Collins, and Ms. Egnot-had the opportunity to attend a national math conference in Florida where they gave a presentation on math-related activities appropriate for ninety-minute block classes. The English classes completed another great year at MHS, with the students learning new styles of writing and reading some new stories along with the old favorites. The new face among the staff of ten teachers in the English department was Mr. Feola, who came from Mentor. He quoted, "I enjoyed my first year here. The students helped me feel at home and I hope to stay here for a while."

The freshmen teachers-Mrs. Kilpatrick, Ms. Pope, and Mr. Smith-team taught once again, working in cooperative groups with a science, math, and social studies teacher to provide better guidance to incoming students. The upper level classes, in just their second year of block scheduling for all the required classes, still required some adjustments. The addition of more elective classes stands out as one benefit of block scheduling. In English, students can take "singleton" classes in Shakespeare, drama, creative writing, Modern Novel, speech, and journalism-and the department hopes to add more special interest classes in coming years. The teachers also hope to schedule more field trips (in this year's only trip, some seniors went to Cleveland to see a performance of Macbeth) and special events (like the Great Lakes Theater Festival's actors-in-residence program) to make better use of the block classes.

## Conjugating
