

















... The Changing of Faces



































Coming Together Team work equals success













Developing the film... Bringing the 2003 Yearbook to a close

The theme **Capturing the Moments** embodies many *ideas*. It shows people being *quiet*, being *crazy*, being *competitive*, being *proud*, and being *real*. We have dedicated 240 pages to show the different ways students made the past year into what it was. Even though the 2003 school *year* came to a close, every student can still run through the rolls of *film* inside their mind, bringing to life the *memories* and magic that defined the year. From the *first* football game of the season to commencement rehearsal, the *days*, *weeks*, and *months* of the the year flew by.

There was that crush that you *fantasized* day after day about. There was the friend who you *passed* notes with during English class. There were days where you *thought* of ideas on how to cut class or stay home from school. There were all those minutes lost, *waiting* in line for lunch day after day. There were those classes that you *thrived* on, that *challenged* you to achieve your full potential. And there were those classes that you spent catching up on sleep missed the night before. There were teachers who made *learning* fun no matter what the topic was. There were days where you *laughed* so hard that your stomach ached. Student portraits and some other event photos were taken by the MHS school photographer, Eileen Findak. The cover design was produced by Jostens Design Consultant, Bob Eyester in August 2002.

Ad prices were increased to help cover the addition of extended full-color throughout the book. For the first time, the entire senior portrait section was produced in full-color. The cover, theme idea, deadlines, and yearbook ladder were created during Jostens Yearbook Camp 2002 at Hidden Valley Resort in Pennsylvania. The camp was designed to generate theme ideas and offer educational classes to learn more about Jostens yearbook programs. Advisor Ms. Julie Thurston and Co-Editor-In-Chief Brad Eckert attended the 3-day workshop.

Headline font was set in **Dancing Comfort**, with Subheadlines being captured in **Essence Bold**. Captions were set in Chase and Body Text was created in Lynn. The yearbook staff would like to extend special thanks to Mr. William Fisher, Ms. Kathy Jackson, Mrs. Eileen Findak, the Board of Education, and all the teachers, parents, faculty, and staff who helped create this year's book. Thank you, also, to the student body for helping the staff **Capture the Moments of 2003**.


