

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

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


Change Becomes Us

Left behind after the 2004-2005 school year are the memories of change. Change is inevitable. It's something that cannot be changed. Do not fear, let change become you!














"As a freshman, spirit week was nothing. I didn't really participate in dressing up or anything. This year as a senior, I was more involved," said senior Jimmy Smith.






"I thought Winter Formal was a fun experience. I enjoyed dressing up and spending the night dancing with my friends," said freshman Melinda Klug.

After tallying up the votes, seniors Hee Joon Um and Stacey Bukovac were crowned the 2005 Winter Formal king and queen.



























Take It to the Slopes











Business and Technology Getting Technology With Technology Try to imagine life without technology




























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These are the Changes in Our Lives



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
